

#### The Rhythm of Another School Year

Where does the time go? It seemed like only a few months ago that construction had started on the western wing of the elementary. At that time the builders were battling the elements; a winter that did not want to let go coupled with unprecedented rainfall. I remember the barricades going up to keep kids safe from the construction zone and the crazy amount of mud as far as the eye could see. But alas, here we are, with six beautifully done classrooms, mercifully allowing us more space for the increased size of our K-12 student body. This year's student seat count has risen to 765 students. Although our revenue worksheet shows our resident population decreasing a bit, our open enrollment into the district has increased, easily covering the somewhat bigger senior class that graduated last spring. For the first time in our history, our Hispanic population has outpaced our caucasian population by 1%. As a school and barometer for the community in general, Abby's capacity to adapt to such diversity is a true testimony of 'who' we are and how we operate. I could never be prouder of our students, our staff, the Board of Education, and ultimately, the community we serve!

The following areas will hopefully bring our District readers up-to-date in regards to the Budget, our Facilities, and New District Programming and Staffing. Without further ado, I encourage you to continue reading in order to stay in the know!

#### District Budget Update

During the October regular meeting, the Board of Education certified the 2018-2019 tax levy in the amount of \$1,367,088. The 'All Fund Tax Levy' approved includes past approved referendum debt and a fund 80 tax levy (\$2,113,688). As most everyone now realizes, establishing the tax levy prior to October 15th is more of a guessing game than anything else. Regardless, the basic premise for how schools are operated is the same; revenues come from basically two sources: taxes and state or federal aids. Abbotsford remains a highly aided district (approximately 82% of our total revenue limit comes from aids). Being highly aided is due in part to high poverty and lower property values as compared to the rest of the state of Wisconsin. Abbotsford's taxpayers' contribution toward the total operating revenue comes in at approximately 18% of the total revenue limit; again, this does not include previously approved referendum debt from 2009 or the fund 80 tax levy of \$65,000. Abbotsford's final equalized valuation for this year actually went down by \$1,133,653 from last year thereby causing a slight increase in state aids. This was a bit of a surprise to us considering that both Marathon and Clark counties equalized values were predicted to go up by 3-4%. The end result of these numbers in addition to referendum debt and the fund 80 levy is a slight uptick in the mill rate of approximately

13 cents per \$1,000 of property value or \$13 for a \$100,000 home. Should you ever desire more information about the district's finances or how the levy is calculated, do not hesitate to give me a call or drop me an email. It would be my pleasure to develop your understanding of school finance.

#### **District Facilities**

In regards to our district's facilities, the Board of Education continues to position us in a 'good place'! If one had come to tour our facilities a year ago at this time, you would have seen students crammed into very small places, operating in small groups in the hallways, or meeting in the cafeteria for a class or two. With the addition of six classrooms and additional small spaces for student interventions, the district's staff and students' needs are being met. I shudder to think, however, what we will do if our numbers continue to grow. I am sensing, however, that the growth ceiling has just about been reached, mainly due to the fact that housing within our district's boundaries is almost non-existent. With that said, we are attempting to stay one step ahead in our thought process at all times, understanding that 'change' is a constant and we must always be prepared. On a side note, the district continues to be proactive in school security initiatives, roof and floor maintenance, increased cooling initiatives for the older parts of our building, and overall energy efficiency. If you haven't seen our facilities since the recent construction project, make an appointment with one of our offices to get a tour.

#### New District Programming and Staffing

I am excited to update everyone as to new instructional programming and staffing within the district. As previously mentioned, Abby has an extremely unique student population that challenges us to think outside the box at just about every turn. Although I would be the first one to tell you that we have a long way to go, I'm also proud to speak to the many advances we've made as a team in only two short years since my arrival the fall of 2016.

Starting with staffing, we have been able to assist our regular education specialists by adding several much needed bilingual aids, a dual language instructor for our early elementary grades, and a newly created English Learner (EL) Services Coordinator. It goes without saying that many of our newcomers these days are primarily Spanish speakers. Our goal is to get them up to speed in English as expediently as possible, without them having to sacrifice their native language. It is a known fact that this language barrier affects student test scores and the state Report Card, not because these newcomers don't have the appropriate levels of knowledge content in English, science, math and social studies, but rather because the language barrier precludes them from being able to adequately express 'what' they know in Eng-

lish. In addition to our efforts to grow content knowledge for this population in the aforementioned content areas, Spanish speaking students have been at times erroneously identified as having exceptional learning needs. Starting this year and into the future, our goal is to keep these students in their content specific classrooms vs. pulling them out more often than not for English language interventions. In the education realm this is called 'pushing in' services versus 'pulling out' for services. With more bilingual aids in our buildings, our classroom teachers can spend more time doing what they do best, which is 'teach' content. Don't get me wrong however, our teachers still work tirelessly at developing new instructional strategies, innovating whenever possible, and growing professionally to meet our ever-changing student needs in all areas.

2018-2019 also kicks off its inaugural year of Dual Language programming. Dual Language programming is EN-TIRELY voluntary to parents and their students and is available this year to students in 4K-K (only this year) and 2nd grade. You might wonder what this entails? Well, in a nutshell, Abbotsford is offering content learning entirely in Spanish for at least two subjects per day over the course of six years of elementary education (K-6). The intent of Dual Language programming is to fill one section at each elementary grade level with 50% primary Spanish speakers and 50% primary English speakers. The goal is to have our primary English speakers be nearly fluent in Spanish while our primary Spanish speakers nearly fluent in English by the end of their elementary career. Next year's Dual Language programming will be available to interested parents and their students in grades K-1 and 2-3. In 2019-2020, the District will be transitioning out of dual language programming for 4K. The optimal Dual Language environment is to maintain the same student involvement from one grade level to the next. By the end of the District's full implementation of elementary Dual Language programming, the only time for 'voluntarily' placement of a student in Dual Language will be primarily at the Kindergarten level.

The reason for removing 4K from the Dual Language programming continuum for 2019-2020 is primarily to reduce the overall need for hiring additional fulltime teachers. Alternatively, to meet the needs of Abbotsford's 4K classrooms, part-time bilingual aids will be provided for each classroom to ease the transition of these students into full school-day educational programming. In 2020-2021, the final two grade levels of 4-5 will be added to complete the full Dual Language programming experience for grades K-6. I would be remiss if I did not applaud the Board of Education's forward thinking by sanctioning our district's move toward this extremely progressive and prestigious type of Dual Language programming. The fact is that only a small handful of school districts across the state of Wisconsin offer this type of programming and the vast majority of those programs are provided only to the more well to-do populations. We are indeed very fortunate to be able to offer elementary grade level Dual Language programming

in little, rural Abbotsford! Who knows, based on popularity and need, we may need to expand into the future some version of this programming to the middle school!

Finally, in the realms of staffing and programming, the district has been able to morph from an English as a Second Language (ESL teacher) environment to an English Learner (EL) Services environment. This provides the district a 360 degree perspective of 'what' we are doing to meet our students' and staff's needs, 'how' we are progressing in regards to student achievement; and finally, 'why' the district requires ongoing innovation and ingenuity to meet the needs of a diverse student population. Amber Kraus, formally our grades 9-12 Spanish teacher, has taken on this newly revised role with tremendous 'gusto', boundless determination, great vision, and practical knowledge and experience. We are excited about the new direction the district has taken!! On a side note, in place of Ms. Kraus, Santiago Esquivel, an exchange teacher from Mexico, is teaching our 9-12 Spanish courses. Santiago and his family are on a three-year visa as part of International Teacher Exchange Services or ITES. We are very fortunate to have found such a qualified teacher and welcome him and his family to our community.

I hope you found this update beneficial. If you have any questions about what I've shared here, give me a call or stop in as my door is always open, and I'm excited to make time for these types of conversations.



Reading is a highly complex process. Readers must build a system of strategic actions for processing texts A–Z+ that begins with early reading behaviors and becomes a network of strategic actions for reading increasingly difficult texts. The F&P Text Level Gradient<sup>TM</sup> should be seen as a continuum of progress for readers.

Fountas and Pinnell's goal is to support the child's development of selfinitiating actions they will be able to apply to a range of texts of similar difficulty. With daily teaching, the teacher helps the child climb the ladder of text difficulty with success. The goal of guided reading is to bring the child to the level of complex texts appropriate for the grade. In doing so, teaching must begin with where the child is able to engage with some success, so that there is a point of contact, thereby engaging the child's development of a self-extending system for processing texts.



I want to thank you for your help and support in reporting to our office upon entering the building to receive a badge before entering other parts of the school. This is one very important step in the District's Safety Procedures. It has been great to see our visitors throughout the building. We continue to strive to meet the needs of all students. There are mental health counselors available in our building four days a week to meet with students. Please check with a school counselor for more information.



## **AES Students Blasted Off with Reading!**






## Self Defense Taught in PE Class







### From the Counselor's Office for Parents of Students in 12th Grade

#### Parents of Students Entering 12th Grade

How to Help Your Senior

"The senior year is when everything comes together. It is also the year in which students see the rewards of their hard work and planning."

#### Fall

- UW system schools began accepting applications September 1<sup>st</sup>. It is best for your son or daughter to obtain and complete college applications early. Your child should apply online at apply.wisconsin.edu.
- In September, we will had a financial aid night to discuss filling out the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) form. Students should fill out the FAFSA as soon as they can after October 1, 2016. The FAFSA form is available online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Your son or daughter and you will need a FSA ID <a href="https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/index.htm">https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/index.htm</a> to sign the FAFSA online.
- The ACT is on October 27th. The registration deadline for the October ACT was September 28<sup>th</sup>. Students who need to take the ACT at a later date can sign up for the December 8<sup>th</sup> ACT by November 19<sup>th</sup>. Information is available in the counseling office or at www.act.org. There are ID requirements at registration. Make sure to read about them at www.actstudent.org.
- There are ACT prep items available in the counselor office and online at www.actstudent.org.
- If your child is interested in playing sports at a Division I school, please make sure they are meeting NCAA requirements as they have changed.
- State and national scholarships are available. During our senior meetings students were shown where to get

- scholarship materials. Students will be informed of scholarships during school announcements and online. We will also work on applications during English class.
- Abbotsford Lions Student of the Quarter applications are due to Mrs. Reynoso by October 4, 2018. Applications are available on the counseling website or in the file cabinet in the counseling office.
- Kohl Scholarship is available online <a href="http://www.kohleducation.org/studente-xcellence/">http://www.kohleducation.org/studente-xcellence/</a> and is due Sunday, November 4, 2018 at 11:59:59 p.m. Central Time.
- Students who are not quite sure of what they want to do can sign up to take the ASVAB test. The ASVAB is a free interest inventory given on November 19<sup>th</sup>.

#### Spring

- Students should review college acceptances and financial aid awards. They should also compare financial aid packages in the decision making process. If your child is positive he/she will not enroll at one or more of the colleges that accept him/her, please notify those colleges that he/she has selected another one. Keeping colleges abreast of plans might enable those colleges to admit someone else. If he/she knows which college he/she will attend, send in the tuition deposit and follow instructions for admitted students. He/she must decide which offer of admission to accept by May
- Local scholarship applications become available in the spring. Students should stop in the counselor office for applications. Because students may be eligible for more scholarships than they think, they should apply for as many as they can.

#### Reminders

Students should request letters of rec-

- ommendation from teachers and employers at least three weeks before they are needed. Provide a list of accomplishments for their reference.
- Seniors are allowed one excused day for a college visit. They should plan visits to colleges and set up interviews if you didn't get to them during the summer or if they want to return to a campus for a second time. These visits need to be approved through the counselor office.
- Keep all records, test scores, reports, and copies of applications for admission and financial aid. Do not throw anything away until at least the end of your son or daughter's first year in college. Having detailed records will save time and effort should anything be lost or should your son/daughter decide to apply in the future to other colleges or scholarship programs.
- Remember to monitor your child's applications to be sure that all materials are sent and received on time and are complete. They should stay on top of deadlines and not procrastinate; students can hurt their chances for admission by missing a deadline.
- If your child's first-choice college places him/her on a waiting list, do not lose all hope. I can also contact the college to let them know your child is still very interested. Keep the college updated on our activities.
- After the completion of the senior year, you must request a final transcript be sent to your college through parchment.

## From the Counselor Office for Parents of Students Entering 11th Grade

How to Help Your Junior

"The junior year is when students should seriously begin examining their postsecondary options. Juniors should also take college tests, make college visits, and start searching for scholarships."

#### Fall

- Students should begin the college selection process. Students went to the Education Fair in Wausau on Tuesday, October 9, as a junior class. This was a great opportunity to talk with numerous UW-Universities, private colleges, technical schools, and the Military.
- The ASVAB is a free interest inventory given on November 19<sup>th</sup>.
- · As your son or daughter approaches the final year of high school, many concerns regarding education and vocational plans begin to take on added importance. The Abbotsford High School recognizes the importance of these concerns and upcoming major decisions. We invite you and your student to meet with a counselor individually to talk over these educational/vocational ideas. This is a post high school career planning session. We will discuss post secondary educational and vocational career goals. We will also provide you with information on schools, financial aid, scholarships, and ACT/SAT testing timelines, etc.
- There will be a Junior/Parent Night on October 18, 2018. Representatives from the UW system, private college systems, technical colleges, and military will be presenting information that evening.

#### Spring

 The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction is entering into a partnership with ACT®, Inc. to comprehensively assess Wisconsin high school students: 11th grade students will take The ACT® Plus Writing and the ACT® WorkKeys® Assessment System in the spring.

- February 20, 2019 The ACT® Plus
  Writing The ACT Plus Writing consists
  of four multiple-choice tests: English,
  Mathematics, Reading, and Science; and
  a 30-minute essay test that measures
  writing skills. ACT Plus Writing will be a
  paper and pencil test in Wisconsin for the
  2019 administration.
- February 21, 2019 ACT® Work-Keys® - ACT WorkKeys is an applied skills assessment system that helps students compare their skills to the skills real jobs require. Wisconsin students will take three WorkKeys assessments: Locating Information, Reading for Information, and Applied Mathematics. ACT WorkKeys will be a paper and pencil test in Wisconsin for the 2019 administration.
- If your college-bound student is not happy with their March ACT score they should plan to take the ACT in June. The deadline for registering is at least one month prior to the test date. Students can apply at <a href="https://www.act.org">www.act.org</a>.
- Make sure your son or daughter has selected the right classes for his/her senior year. When selecting your child's senior courses, be sure they are continuing to challenge themselves academically and are preparing themselves for postgraduation activities. If your child is interested in playing sports at a Division I school, please make sure they are meeting NCAA requirements as they have changed.

#### Summer

- Your child should start narrowing the list of college choices. The summer between their junior and senior year is a good time to start visiting colleges.
- After completion of their junior year, students interested in technical schools can begin applying.
- If you and your child attend a private university open house during the summer between their junior and senior year, the

school will waive the application fee.

 Help your child choose meaningful activities for the summer months. They may want to find a summer job or apply for special summer academic or enrichment programs. Colleges value students who use their knowledge to develop their skills and interests outside the classroom.

#### Reminders

- Continue supporting your child's involvement in activities.
- Students need to think about and explore college options. Juniors are encouraged to make a college visit. Students can take one day for college visits in their junior year. Open house dates are available in the counselor office along with a sheet about making the most of your college visit. Students need to fill out appropriate paperwork prior to their college visit.
- Encourage your child to look for scholarships. A few national scholarships are available to juniors.
- Students should update their "Activities and Awards" file. Include information on all school and community activities, leadership positions, honors, employment, and volunteer work. This information will become very helpful when filling out college and scholarship applications. A copy of this information should be placed in each student's portfolio.

## School Report Cards and Data - Digging Into 2017-2018 District Accountability Coordinator - Georgia Kraus

The state report cards have been released and they positively reflect the hard work for students by the entire district! Congratulations and thank you!

To summarize, overall Abbotsford did well, with the District and Middle/High School scoring in the 'Exceeds Expectations' category and the Elementary scoring in the 'Meets Expectations'. As a district, our <u>strengths</u> are in the area of the <u>growth scores</u>, <u>closing the gaps scores</u>, <u>and on-track and postsecondary readiness</u>. Our <u>area to develop is student achievement</u>.

School report cards have many pieces that flow together to create one score:

- Student Achievement calculations are based on student performance on the Forward Exam, ACT plus Writing, and Dynamic Learning Maps (DLM) in 2017-18, 2016-17 and 2015-16.
- The Growth Priority Area measures changes in students' performance over time for students taking the Forward Exam.
- The Closing Gaps Priority Area focuses on two types of gaps: achievement gaps (for ELA and mathematics) and graduation gaps. The Closing Gaps score is based on student subgroups, not the "all students" group.
- The purpose of the On-Track & Post Secondary Readiness Priority Area is to give schools and districts an indication of how successfully students are achieving educational milestones that predict postsecondary readiness. This Priority Area has two components. The first component is either a graduation rate—for schools that graduate students (i.e. high schools)—or an attendance rate for schools with no 12th grade. The second component is third grade ELA achievement, eighth-grade mathematics achievement, or the combination of both third grade ELA and eighth grade mathematics achievement, as applicable to the school.


## 4K Pumpkin Decorating


