#### Creating a Culture of Success

In my past several newsletter articles I have provided you a glimpse into progress on key goals to which the District has committed itself in 2018-2019. From adding six classrooms to our facilities to expanding Dual Language Immersion programming to our elementary students, remaining static has not been an option. It is true that over the past couple of years many changes have been made to build a culture of belonging, growth, and sustainability, but nothing is more important than building a culture of success.

As with any vision, seeking to move an organization toward greater success, one must always be prepared for the proverbial "one step forward, two steps back" scenario. Undoubtedly, a growing student population has presented such challenges, but overall we've met those challenges head on and continue to be proactive vs. reactive.

This spring the board approved moving our instructional support staff to full time to better accommodate our growing student population, but also to provide more stability to these much needed staffing positions. Additionally, we continue to expand our Dual Language Immersion programming through third grade in 2019-2020 with the final stage of implementation to occur in 2020-2021. In response to greater class sizes at first grade, the board added an additional section to next

year's second grade. In short, next year the elementary will have two grade levels at four sections: 2nd grade and 3rd grade. As a district we remain committed to a culture of success within the midst of change. As always, we are mindful of our commitment to the community to remain fiscally sound into the future.

As we wrap up this school year we recognize that change is inevitable. The staff has experienced a lot of change as well as we have attempted to upgrade and modernize curriculum, provide up-to-date technology and instructional resources, make available relevant and timely professional development, and create greater flexibility within the context of staff benefits. Our federal and state governments continue to make mandates of us that on the surface detract from what our true mission is, "to educate and prepare our children for an ever-changing tomorrow."

Our resolve remains firm as we continue to forge into this future of continual change.

In the meantime, summer is peeking at us from around the corner. Some students will leave on June 7th and not look back while many others will return only a couple of days later to start summer school. Regardless, we will finish the 2018-2019 school year strong while keeping our eyes on what comes next.

## Greetings from the Elementary Principal

The 2018-19 school year has flown by. The students have shown much growth and have taken part in many learning activities. In late May and early June, the students will be taking part in Olympic events, graduations, many outdoor field experiences, the PTO Carnival, and award assemblies.

There will be some changes to our school next year. Four Year Old Kindergarten will now be 5 days a week. Each grade from Kindergarten through 3<sup>rd</sup> will have a section that will be Dual Language. With enrollment continuing to grow, the elementary will have four sections of Grade 2 and Grade 3.

With the ending of the school year, we turn our attention to summer school. Summer school runs from June 12<sup>th</sup> through June 28<sup>nd</sup> and August 5<sup>th</sup> through 9<sup>th</sup>. If you wish to have your child enroll, please stop by the elementary or middle/high school office for registration forms. We will also have open swimming in July from 9:00-11:30 am. Please be on the lookout for exact dates. There will be open gyms for students entering 7<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grades and other evening courses.

Please have your child check out opportunities before the school year ends or contact the office. Summer school can be very beneficial to your child academically and can also help them stay active throughout the summer.

Prairie Fire Theatre will be coming to Abbotsford again this summer the week of June 10-14. This year's play is "Sleeping Beauty." All activities will take place in the high school commons, Elementary Art and Music Rooms, and North Gym. If you would like your child to take part, please sign up through our summer school program. Rehearsals will run from 1:00-5:30 on Monday through Thursday. On Friday, dress rehearsal will be at 2:00. The performance will begin at 6:00 on Friday. Even if you don't have a child in the play, come out and watch the show. There is no charge.

If you wish to enroll a student to our school, or know of somebody who does, please contact us for enrollment forms. The elementary building will have office personnel available for two weeks after school is out in June and again in August. The district office

will be open throughout the summer, and you can pick up forms there as well.



release. Students, have a safe and enjoyable remaining days.



## Bittner named Abbotsford Lions Club Student of the Quarter

Bittner carries a rigorous class schedule that includes UW-English, Physics, Calculus, Personal Finance, Intro to Animal Science, Spanish IV, Band, and Choir. She has participated in many cocurricular activities, including Spanish Club (Treasurer), National Honor Society (Vice-President), FBLA, FFA,

FCCLA, Forensics, Senior Class (Secretary) Jazz Band, Show Choir, and One-Act Play. She is a member of the volleyball, basketball, and softball teams.

EL Learning Services Coordinator, Amber Kraus, highly recommended her for the Student-of-the-Quarter award. "Megan is a self-directed student who will work on a task to completion. As an independent Spanish student, she has experience with tasks that are beyond her skill level, but she has never allowed that to intimidate her; she knows how to ask for help when necessary and is not afraid to try new things," Kraus stated. "Her transcript is filled with as many college preparatory and college credit courses as she could fit into her schedule; Megan's positive attitude and drive to succeed make her one of the stars of her class."

Bittner's volunteerism attests to her belief in community service. She has been actively involved by assisting at the Abbotsford Lion's brunches, Red Cross blood drives, bell ringing for the Salvation Army, Jump Rope for Heart, caroling at nursing homes, and community cleanup days.

When asked to identify an outstanding feature of the community, Bittner applauded numerous positive attributes of the Abbotsford community and school.

"The most outstanding feature though is Abbotsford school's outreach for mental health awareness. At least once a week, we do an activity where we work on our own mental health and, as a school, we help others feel better about themselves. The support of peers and the staff is inexplicable."

Every time someone throws a plastic bottle into the garbage instead of recycling it, the atmosphere changes. Moose and elk are coming into Wisconsin looking for safe haven. Bittner works part-time at the Abbotsford County Market and is a life-guard at the Abbotsford School pool. After graduation, she plans to attend either UW-Eau Claire or UW-Stevens Point, majoring in actuarial science with a minor in Spanish.

# Play, Read, Talk

You can help students learn! As we head into summer I wanted to share tips on how you can help students continue to grow and learn. Many of these are common sense and are applicable to all of us.

1.Movement: We see advertisements by professional sports advocating for children to be more active. Not only is this movement, and play good for physical development. The gross motor movement also helps support the good chemicals for thinking, focus, learning, and memory. It is suggested that students need 30-60 minutes per day of exercise. This exercise can take the form of pow-

er walks, games, running, dance, team sports, and swimming to name just a few.

2.Reading: Reading is a simple and important way for people to expand their vocabularies. Reading can take many forms including narratives, newspapers, magazines, comics, and non-fiction. Over the summer student, reading levels tend to drop. To keep up and even build reading levels and vocabulary have students read or read with them. Helping students find reading material they are interested in can help them to read at a higher level.



## 4K Farm Visit







I wish one day that poverty would end and everyone would have pencils, erasers, water, and basic essentials."

Rocha works part-time as a Customer Service Representative at the Abbotsford County Market and a Member Service Representative at the Taylor Credit Union in Abbotsford. After graduation, he plans to get an associate degree as a Medical Assistant, hoping to advance within the medical field.







Each family will have their own unique log in and password to access the system. Once in the system, you will only see and have access to your child(ren)'s information.


How do I get Family Access? You can contact either the elementary school or the middle/high school for your log in and password. Once you receive this information, you can follow the instructions below.

From the internet you will need to access the School District of Abbotsford's web site. You will do this by entering <a href="https://www.abbotsford.k12.wi.us">www.abbotsford.k12.wi.us</a> in the address area. For future access made easier, bookmark this site. To View Skyward Family Access Portal, hover over Community along the top navigation tab, then click on the 3rd button down – Family Access.




if password is blank, please use the password you've created. If this doesn't work, contact the office and we will generate a new password for you.

From this screen you can check out the school calendar, look at your student's general information, look at the grade book, check current attendance, look at your child's schedule, check for any discipline matters, look at your lunch account balance/information, or other information about your child. You also have the ability to create a new password, which may be easier for you to remember, and change your e-mail address. 
