SIP

- The official SIP meeting is in March and due in April. Needs to be submitted before Spring Break.
- Reviewed current goals and reviewed past rates from last year.
- JSSC reviewed SIP goals on 2/7/23 and proposed we maintain the goals for the 23-24 year.
- SIP GOALS:
 - Core course pass rate for 9th grade above 90%
 - Pass rates for all subjects above 80%
 - SEL lessons to be created by counselors and SEL admin but not included in SIP anymore. Kristen Eller reviewed the JSSC proposal that we switch from MTW to Character Ed curriculum for SEL. Madsen and Cannon will evaluate and modify the Character Ed program to fit within the District's given parameters.
 - The percentage of students scoring in the "below basic" and "basic" categories on the RI will decrease by at least 10% from the beginning of the year to the end of the year.
- **Community Council agreed that our current 20 minute Eagle Time block is a good use of time and we like it!**
- Mrs. Ashton reviewed the pass rates for the whole school and by 9th graders. Based on the data from Power BI BJH is on track to meet all the goals from 22-23 school year.
- The ESSER funds are cut off at the end of this year. The proposal of maintaining academic coaches through other funds.
- Mr. Brooks explained the way that he and the counselors and maintaining the coaches caseload: through data and applying different interventions to the students who are refusing to work.
- Mrs. Ashton reviewed the JSSC discussion of late work and submitting that work. Teachers will still accept late work, however, in an effort to change the procrastination behavior of students, students will have to show the effort (tutoring, checking in with teacher, etc...). It was clarified that this policy will not trump any IEP or 504 accommodations.
- A request for academic coaching progress/data was made so we can evaluate the effectiveness of that program. That data will be made available during our next community council meeting in March.

Computer Internet Safety

- HB 213 states that Community Council is partially responsible for helping the school with internet/device safety.
- CC/school/district- in charge of device management, safe internet use and digital citizenship
- Parents can have a net-ref account to view student history. The parent account does not allow the parent to engage in net ref in the same way as a teacher
- Student history/filtering is available even if a student looks at things that should be blocked at home.
- The concern that Youtube is accessible for students daily was brought up. Youtube was blocked until last year. Youtube is still filtered based on grade level. Youtube can be blocked all together. If a teacher uses a Youtube clip in their assignment that has been embedded into the course, then students should still be able to access it.
- The different tiers of internet filtering were reviewed. Level 0 (default), Level 1 (advanced filter), Level 2 (No internet)
- **Parent University to include: Parent Net-Ref account info, Using Canvas, Different levels of internet filtering options.**
- Youtube to be used as an appropriate tool was discussed. We as a school need more parental support in educating our students to utilize tools in an appropriate way.

Computer Refresh

- Refresh happens every three years
- Allotted funds/devices is based on student body numbers
- We have to replace at least 9 staff devices with the 9900
- 166 students devices will be replaced by the district
- Before covid we purchased 36 (per math class) touch laptops
- By the end of 2023 we will not have any devices that
- Devices purchased in 2019 need to go out.
- Issuing students a new laptop their 7th grade year and having students be issued that same device each year and turn it in before summer was proposed by Lore Sharp.
- If we purchase the 166 we will have enough devices to issue every grade level those specific devices.
- If we do this computer refresh proposed we would have to fund any productivity salary out of TSSA and not Trust Land funds
- A vote on this refresh proposal will take place in March

Teen Center

- Viewmont is getting a teen center
- Viewmont CC has been challenged to find ways that our community can support the opening of this center.
- Viewmont currently has a FRF and Social Worker. Both are spread throughout the south end (

- Social worker offers individual mental health sessions for crisis intervention who maybe cannot afford that.
- Principal Lund proposed that Bountiful Junior share/pay for 25% of the social worker. BJH will not do this but continue to utilize services available at the district level.
