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



### **COMPUTING & ICT**


Pupils in Years 7 and 8 will be concentrating on programming & coding during their Computing & ICT lessons this half of term, with Year 7 working with the BBC micro:bit and Year 8 the Raspberry Pi.

#### What is a BBC micro:bit?

The BBC micro:bit is a pocket-sized computer that introduces the pupils to how software and hardware work together. It has an LED light display, buttons, sensors and many input/output features that can be programmed and physically interacted with.

### Is the micro:bit a computer or a microcontroller?

You might also hear the micro:bit referred to as a microcontroller. The board contains a microcontroller that can be programmed to perform specific tasks, but it also has input and output devices like buttons and an LED display which makes it more than a microcontroller.



A microprocessor plus memory, storage and physical input/output devices makes it a computer, and the micro:bit is just a pocket-sized one.

### Projects to be looked at will be:

- Rock, Paper, Scissor
- Graphical Dice
- Thermometer
- Step Counter
- Name Badge









#### What is a Raspberry Pi?

The Raspberry Pi is a credit-card sized computer that plugs into a computer monitor or TV and uses a standard keyboard and mouse. It is a capable little device that enables people of all ages to explore computing, and to learn how to program in languages like Scratch and Python. It's capable of doing everything you'd expect a desktop computer to do, from browsing the internet and playing high-definition video, to making spreadsheets, word-processing, and playing games.

What's more, the Raspberry Pi has the ability to interact with the outside world and has been used in a wide array of digital maker projects, from music machines and parent detectors to weather stations and tweeting birdhouses with infra-red cameras.

### Projects to be looked at will be:

- Connecting input and output devices
- Setting up and using the camera module
- Reaction Game
- Traffic lights sequence

Just prior to half term, Year 6's took part in some ratio painting as an introduction to the topic. Great fun was had, and a good understanding gained. We even managed to keep the paint on the paper!

This week the children had to make their own pop-up toy using a variety or resources. The children had great fun making their favourite animals and characters from their favourite books and films.


