At Risk Indicators for Dropping Out of School 2018-2019

State At-Risk Criteria

- 1. is in prekindergarten, kindergarten or grade 1, 2, or 3 and did not perform satisfactorily on a readiness test or assessment instrument administered during the current school year;
- 2. is in grade 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, or 12 and did not maintain an average equivalent to 70 on a scale of 100 in two or more subjects in the foundation curriculum during a semester in the preceding or current school year or is not maintaining such an average in two or more subjects in the foundation curriculum in the current semester:
- 3. was not advanced from one grade level to the next for one or more school years;
- 4. did not perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument administered to the student under SubchapterB, Chapter 39, and who has not in the previous or current school year subsequently performed on that instrument or another appropriate instrument at a level equal to at least 110 percent of the level of satisfactory performance on that instrument;
- 5. is pregnant or is a parent;
- 6. has been placed in an alternative education program in accordance with Section 37.006 during the preceding or current school year;
- 7. has been expelled in accordance with Section 37.007 during the preceding or current school year;
- 8. is currently on parole, probation, deferred prosecution, or other conditional release;
- 9. was previously reported through the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) to have dropped out of school;
- 10.is a student of limited English proficiency, as defined by Section 29.052;
- 11. is in the custody or care of the Department of Protective and Regulatory Services or has, during the current school year, been referred to the department by a school official, officer of the juvenile court, or law enforcement official;
- 12. is homeless:
- 13. resided in the preceding school year or resides in the current school year in a residential placement facility in the district, including a detention facility, substance abuse treatment facility, emergency shelter, psychiatric hospital, halfway house;

Proposed Local At-Risk Criteria

- 14. Has a chronic attendance issue and/or is at risk to not graduate with their cohort
- 15. Previously coded at-risk with a State criteria 1-13 and gained entrance to AIMS/GOALS alternative education program. No longer qualifies at-risk with State criteria 1-13.

RESOLUTION TO CONSIDER ALTERNATIVE GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, pursuant to Education Code section 28.02541, a district may graduate and give a high school diploma under alternative requirements to individuals who entered the ninth grade before the 2011–12 school year and have met all applicable graduation requirements for the year they entered ninth grade, but have not performed satisfactorily on an assessment instrument or part of an assessment instrument required for graduation.

WHEREAS, in accordance with 19 Administrative Code section 74.1027, a district may permit eligible individuals to qualify to graduate and receive a high school diploma if they meet the alternative requirements under 19 Administrative Code section 74.1027(c) or board-approved local alternative requirements under 19 Administrative Code section 74.1027(d) that allow an individual to demonstrate proficiency in the content related to the examination for which the individual did not perform satisfactorily.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

The Board of Trustees of Little Elm Independent School District by adoption of this resolution approves the following local alternative requirements developed by the District that will allow eligible individuals to graduate and receive a high school diploma as authorized under Education Code section 28.02541.

To be eligible to graduate and receive a high school diploma under these provisions, an eligible individual must demonstrate proficiency to the satisfaction of a local graduation committee in the content areas related to the assessments on which the individual has not performed satisfactorily. Proficiency shall be established through one or more of the following factors:

- 1. The individual's grade in each course in the subject areas applicable to the assessments on which the individual has not performed satisfactorily;
- 2. The individual's score on each assessment instrument on which the individual has failed to perform satisfactorily;
- The individual's performance on any projects or work samples in the subject areas applicable to the assessments on which the individual has not performed satisfactorily (including any projects or work samples identified and assigned by the local graduation committee to be completed by the individual);
- 4. The individual's participation in offered remediation;
- 5. The individual's school attendance rate:
- 6. The individual's transcript of course work;
- 7. The individual's completion of career and technical education program courses; or
- 8. Any other academic, work, or life experience determined to be relevant by the local graduation committee.

NAMING FACILITIES

CW (LOCAL)

The Board shall have complete authority and responsibility for the permanent naming of District facilities.

Regarding the temporary naming of areas, such as the athletic field or entrance at the Little Elm ISD Athletic Complex, based on an advertising agreement, see policy GKB(LOCAL).

The term "facility" shall refer to a new or existing school or Districtwide complex owned and operated by the District.

Guidelines

The following guidelines shall govern the permanent naming or renaming of new or existing District-owned. A facility may be named for a person, in honor of a historic event or place, for a subdivision or geographic area, or for a major donor/sponsor. [See GKB(LO-CAL)]

Named for a Person

The Board shall consider naming a facility or a portion of a facility for a person who meets the following criteria, as applicable:

- 1. The person has made or is making significant contributions to the District and represents virtues or characteristics that serve as a role model to students, staff, and the community.
- 2. The person has made or is making significant contributions to public education and has a significant connection to the District as a student, an alumnus, a staff member, an administrator, a donor/sponsor, or a supporter.
- 3. The person has made substantial contributions to his or her field of endeavor or to society in general.
- 4. The person made significant contributions during his or her term as a member of the District's Board and is not a current member of the Board at the time a decision on the naming of a facility is under consideration.

Extensive research shall be conducted on a proposed honoree before a final decision is made regarding naming a facility or portion of a facility for a person.

A name may be reused for facility naming purposes in the event a facility is consolidated or demolished.

Named for Event or Place, Subdivision, or Geographic Area The Board shall consider naming a facility in honor of an event or place, subdivision, or geographic area subject to the following:

- 1. If more than one community will be served by a particular facility, the facility shall receive a "neutral" name.
- A facility named for a historic event shall have major significance to the District, the city of Little Elm (or other municipality served by the District), or the state of Texas.

NAMING FACILITIES

CW (LOCAL)

Named for a Major Donor/Sponsor

The Board shall consider naming a facility in honor of a major donor. Specific District guidelines shall be developed for corporate or individual sponsorship of schools. The guidelines shall specify required levels of monetary or in-kind donations, as well as appropriateness of the sponsor.

Recommendation Process for Naming New and Existing Facilities Except in circumstances where a new or existing facility may be named for a major donor/sponsor, the Board may request the Superintendent to solicit names for a specific facility from the community and direct the Superintendent to establish and publicize a manner in which the community can submit recommendations, including, but not limited to, electronic submission via a District-created proposal form.

Nominations

A person who wishes to submit a name for consideration should identify the facility and provide a clear, concise explanation of why the name should be honored.

Nominations must be made by the method specified by the District.

Selection Committee The selection committee shall be comprised of seven District community members, each nominated by a sitting Board member, and a minimum of four District employees as selected by the Superintendent or designee. The committee shall be chaired by the Superintendent or designee.

Committee Meeting

The committee shall review all submitted names and supporting documentation and shall conduct background research to determine whether the names meet the requirements of this policy.

Recommendation

If there is evidence of adequate support from the public for a specific name, or in the absence of credible opposition to the name, the committee shall submit the name to the Board for its consideration.

The committee shall select a name to be recommended to the Board through decision-making consensus. Decision-making consensus is defined as the apparent preference after each committee member has had an opportunity to participate in the discussion.

Little Elm ISD Wellness Policy

Little Elm ISD ("LEISD") is committed to the development of every student. LEISD believes for students to achieve personal, academic and developmental success, we need to create a positive, safe, and health-promoting learning environment throughout the school year.

This policy outlines LEISD's approach to ensuring environments and opportunities for all students to practice healthy eating and physical activity behaviors throughout the school day while minimizing commercial distractions. Specifically, this policy establishes goals and procedures to ensure that:

- Students in LEISD have access to healthy foods throughout the school day—both through reimbursable school meals and other foods available throughout the school campus—in accordance with Federal and state nutrition standards:
- Students receive quality nutrition education that helps them develop lifelong healthy eating behaviors;
- Students have opportunities to be physically active;
- Schools engage in nutrition and physical activity promotion and other activities that promote student wellness;
- School staff are encouraged and supported to practice healthy nutrition and physical activity behaviors in and out of school:
- The community is engaged in supporting the work of the District in creating continuity between school and other settings for students and staff to practice lifelong healthy habits;
- The District's SHAC committee advises on guidelines for management, oversight, implementation, communication about and monitoring of the Wellness Policy goals and objectives by conducting a wellness policy assessment at least every three years or as needed.
- This policy applies to all students, staff, and schools in the District.

Guidelines and Goals

LEISD will maintain nutritional guidelines and wellness goals in consultation with the local school health advisory committee ("SHAC"). The SHAC consists of representatives from the Child Nutrition Department, school administration, the school board, parents, and the public. A part of LEISD's mission is to provide nutritious, quality meals and encouraging students to develop lifelong skills and knowledge to make healthy food choices. The mission shall be accomplished through nutrition education, physical education and activity, and food served in our schools.

Local Wellness Policy Page 1

The District shall ensure that nutrition guidelines for reimbursable school meals shall be at least as restrictive as federal regulations and guidance and that all foods available on each campus are in accordance with the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act of 2010.

- Comply with all policies in Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act as well as any applicable Texas regulations.
- Encourage healthy food and beverage options at concessions at school-related events

Specific goals for nutrition promotion and education, physical activity, and other school-based activities that promote student wellness. LEAs are required to review and consider evidence-based strategies in determining these goals.

Nutrition Education

LEISD shall implement, in accordance with the law, a coordinated school health program with a nutritional education component and shall use health course curriculum that emphasizes the importance of proper nutrition.

In addition, it shall be the goal of LEISD, that students receive nutrition education that fosters the adoption and maintenance of healthy eating behaviors.

Physical Activity

The District shall implement, in accordance with law, a coordinated school health program and that the state-mandated time for daily/weekly physical education is provided. Students in high school shall meet the physical education component as required for graduation. The district will provide an environment that fosters safe and enjoyable fitness activities for all students, including those who are not participating in competitive sports.

Time allotted for moderate to vigorous physical activity will be consistent with state standards and district board policy and regulations, to include at a minimum:

School-Based Activities

The District establishes the following goals to create an environment conducive to healthful eating and physical activity and to express a consistent wellness message through other school-based activities:

- Schools will set schedules that allow a minimum of 10 minutes to eat breakfast and 20 minutes to eat lunch. This time will not include the time a student waits in line.
- Schools will not use foods or beverages, as rewards for academic performance or good behavior, and will not withhold food or beverages (including food served through school meals) as a punishment.
- Teachers and other school personnel will not use physical activity (e.g., running laps, push-ups) or withhold opportunities for physical activity (e.g., recess, physical education) as punishment.
- Wellness for students and their families will be promoted at suitable school activities.
- Employee wellness education and involvement will be promoted at suitable school activities.

Nutrition Guidelines and Other School-Based Activities:

Child Nutrition Programs comply with all federal, state and local requirements. Child Nutrition Programs are accessible to all children. LEISD's goal is to promote nutritious choices of all food brought into the school for student consumption.

Nutrition

Standards and nutrition guidelines for all foods and beverages sold to students on the school campus during the school day that is consistent with Federal regulations for:

- School Meal Nutrition Standards
- Smart Snacks in School Nutrition Standards.

School Meals

Our school district is committed to serving healthy meals to students, with plenty of fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and fat-free and low fat milk; moderate in sodium, low in saturated fat, and zero grams *trans* fat per serving (nutrition label or manufacturer's specification); while meeting the nutrition needs of school children within their calorie requirements.

All students and employees will be provided with access to clean, safe, potable drinking water free of charge at every District facility in cafeteria and eating areas, classrooms, hallways, gymnasiums, play yards and athletic fields, and faculty lounges throughout the school day and at before and after school activities.

All schools within the District participate in USDA child nutrition programs, including the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), the School Breakfast Program (SBP), and Snack Program (SP). All schools within the District are committed to offering reimbursable school meals through the NSLP and SBP programs and other applicable Federal child nutrition programs that meet or exceed current USDA nutrition standards established by local, state, and Federal statutes and regulations.

Competitive Foods & Beverages

The District is committed to ensuring that all foods and beverages sold and served outside the school meal programs (i.e., "competitive" foods and beverages) during the school day will meet the USDA "Smart Snacks in Schools" nutrition standards, at a minimum. These standards will apply in all locations and through all services where foods and beverages are sold, which may include, but are not limited to, a la carte options in cafeterias, vending machines, school stores, snack or food carts, and clubs and organizations.

Fundraisers

Generally, foods that do not meet the standards cannot be sold to students on campus during the school day. Organizations planning fundraisers of foods that do not meet the standards must work with their school administration to determine if their fundraiser can be allowed as one of the school's limited exempt fundraisers. It is important to remember that the standards do not apply during non-school hours, on weekends, and at off-campus fundraising events, though local policies may still apply. USDA has created Fundraisers Guidance for Schools to be used as resources that are also available at www.usda.gov.

Foods and beverages that meet or exceed the USDA Smart Snacks in Schools nutrition standards may be sold through fundraisers on the school campus during the school day. Foods that are not meant for consumption on the school campus (e.g. cookie dough to be prepared at home) may be sold at any time during the school day.

Exempt day

Each campus will have one (1) exempt day for fundraising. The sale of prepackaged foods items as fundraisers that do not meet the nutrition standards are allowed on the exempt day. The standards do not apply during non-school hours on weekends and at off-campus fundraising events.

Free Foods provided to students

Standards for all foods and beverages provided, but not sold, to students during the school day (e.g., in classroom parties, classroom snacks brought by parents, or other foods given as incentives).

- All foods served to students during the school day will meet the HHFKA Smart Snack standards. The smart snack calculator is a tool that is used to determine if food or beverages meet the Smart Snack standards. The calculator is also available or by visiting www.healthiergeneration.org.
- All foods brought from outside sources must be purchased from a commercial food service establishment (grocery store, delis, etc.)

Snacks

Schools will assess if and when to offer snacks based on timing of school meals, children's nutritional needs, children's ages, and other considerations.

Celebrations and Rewards

Schools should limit celebrations that involve food during the school day. Activities should be held after the campus lunch service.

All foods brought from outside sources must be purchased from a commercial food service establishment (grocery store, delis, etc.)

Field Trips

Campus-approved field trips are exempt from nutrition policy. All meals provided by LEISD CN department will meet the nutrition standards.

Marketing

Only foods that meet the nutrition standards can be marketed as meeting the Smart Snack rules.

Monitoring

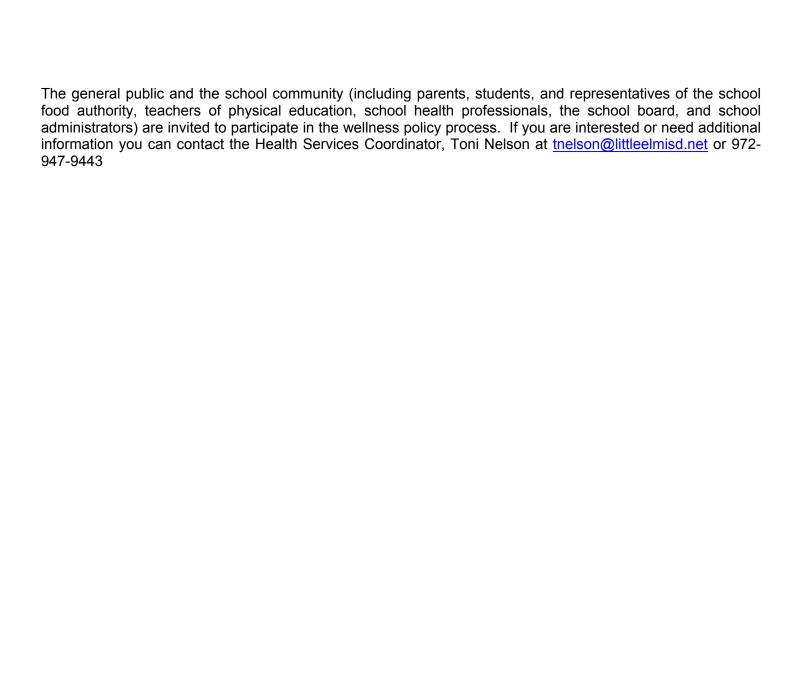
The campus personnel is responsible for documenting all receipts and nutritional information for items sold on the campus during the school day. This information must be readily available for review during an Administrative Review of the Child Nutrition program.

Implementation, Assessment & Leadership Responsibility

The School Health Advisory Council in coordination with the local school administration, the Assistant Superintendent for Human Resource & Student Services shall oversee the implementation of this policy and shall develop administrative procedures for periodically measuring the implementation of the wellness policy and ensure each school complies with the policy. The responsible party at the campus for implementation of the local wellness policy will be the campus principal. The assessment of the LWP will be performed as changes are made or at least every three years. The assessment will be updated and posted on the District web site.
