

DR. PAUL P. CARBONE

Dr. Paul P. Carbone, Class of 1949, has been a nationally recognized pioneer in cancer research and treatment for more than 30 years.

His potential was spotted early in his years at White Plains where he was Co-Editor of the yearbook and where his high school classmates named him both "Most Intelligent" and "Most Likely to Succeed". Dr. Carbone graduated from Union College and Albany Medical School before completing a residency in internal medicine with the U.S. Public Health Service in Baltimore and San Francisco.

Dr. Carbone then spent 17 years at the National Cancer Institute where he achieved national recognition for his work in the treatment and cure of Hodgkin's disease, development of new chemotherapy drugs and adjuvant treatment of breast cancer.

Following retirement from the Public Health Service in 1976, Dr. Carbone joined the University of Wisconsin Medical School as Head of Clinical Oncology. For 19 years, from 1978 to 1997, he served as Director of the University of Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center, one of only 28 nationally recognized comprehensive cancer centers. He is now Professor of Medicine Emeritus and is Associate Dean of the Medical School for Health Star.

Among the many national awards he has received are the Lasker Prize for Medicine in 1972, the Medal of Honor for Clinical Research from the American Cancer Society and the 2000 Folkert O. Belzer Lifetime Achievement Award for outstanding and enduring contributions to academic medicine.

Dr. Carbone has been President of the two most prestigious cancer research societies in the country -- the American Society of Clinical Oncology and the American Association for Cancer Research.

Still very active and productive, Dr. Carbone is Editor-in-chief of **Oncology**, the international journal of cancer and will be a visiting professor at the National University of Singapore until 2003. He continues to see cancer patients and do research on the prevention of cancer with drugs and education.

Married to Mary for 40 years, they have 7 children and 13 grandchildren.
