

MEDICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR CAMP

ALL MEDICATIONS AND ACCOMPANYING PAPERWORK MUST BE TURNED IN BY **APRIL 3rd**

(It takes a significant amount of time to process all the forms and medications for our campers.)

Any medication whether prescription or over the counter (Tylenol, Claritin, Advil, etc.) requires a completed medication administration authorization form.

Attached is the [Medication Administration Authorization Form](#) to be completed by the parents and your licensed medical provider.

One medication per medication authorization form.

Only medically necessary medication will be accepted. Vitamins and dietary supplements, unless prescribed for a medical condition, will not be accepted.

No sprays whether aerosolized or pump activated—NO SPRAY sunscreen, bug repellent, or deodorant, etc.

Send only enough medication for the duration of camp.

The morning of departure give your student their usual morning medications at home. Do not include these in your medication count for camp.

If there has been no change in your student's medications since Camp Hamilton we can use the forms already on file, however we will need the associated medication(s) delivered by April 3rd.

Your student may self-carry and self-administer inhalers, ointments, eye drops, and nose drops and SOME oral medications with approval from your licensed medical provider and the building nurse. Medication Authorization forms must still be completed by your licensed medical provider and parent and turned in for building nurse review and approval. Contact your building nurse for discussion and authorization.

Special Note regarding Epi-Pens:

If your child requires an Epi-Pen for any reason, be sure to print the Epi-Pen specific administration form here [Authorization to Administer Epi-Pen](#) and complete the form so that your child can **self-carry** his/her/their epi-pen. This is critically important for camp outings. Like all other medication forms, this **must be signed by parent AND physician**. This form is also due by ****APRIL 3RD****, however it is not necessary to deliver the Epi-Pen as that should be packed in your child's day pack for camp.

If you are a parent chaperone you may bring and administer your own child's medication. You do not need to complete the Medication Authorization form. You do not need to bring the medication to school for the nurse to review. **Parents can only administer medication to their own child—no exceptions!**
