
The Young Authors Contest



What is YAC?

YAC is a writing contest that anyone in Grades 3, 4, 5 or 6 can enter.





There are four categories

- 1. Poetry
- 2. Personal Narrative
- 3. Argumentative (5th/6th only)
- 4. Creative Writing

Poetry

Let's take a minute and think about what poetry is ...

- 1. Does a poem look the same on the paper as a story does?
- 2. Do all poems have to rhyme?
- 3. What are some important things to think about when writing a poem?

Contest Rules for Poetry

- Any kind of poetry is OK.
- Poems must at least 8 lines long
- Typed on a Google doc
- Combinations of shorter poems may be used (for example three Haiku poems) to make the required number of lines.



Personal Narrative

- A personal narrative is a true story about a small moment in your life
- Here are some ideas for a personal narrative story
 - First and last times
 - Embarrassing moments
 - Trouble stories
- Include story elements such as a problem, solution, and theme in your personal narrative

Contest Rules for Personal Narrative

- A TRUE story about you
- Must fit on one side of one typed page
- 12 point Arial font
- 1½ or double spaced
- It can be shorter, but NOT longer than one page

Persuasive or Argumentative Writing

- This is an option only for grade 5 and 6.
- There are prompts to help you, in case you need some ideas.



Contest Rules for Argumentative/Persuasive

- Choose one of the prompts for your piece
- Typing must fit on one side of one typed page
- 12 point Arial font
- 1 ½ or double spaced
- Introduction
- Body Paragraphs with reasons and evidence
- Conclusion
- Acknowledge and respond to "counter arguments" (those who would oppose your stance)

Should video games be considered a





Prompt Two (2)

Should kids get paid for doing chores at home?

Prompt Three (3)

Should the government spend more money on exploring space or the ocean?



Prompt Four (4)

Your Own Topic. Choose to write about something you feel strongly about.

Creative Writing

- These are imaginative stories
- You must use one of the four picture prompts
- When you use a picture prompt, remember, the idea is NOT to just describe the picture
- Use story elements (character, setting, problem, solution, theme)

"HOOK" the Reader

Avoid beginning with... Instead begin with...

- "Once upon a time..."Action
- "One day..."
- "Hi, my name is..."

- Dialogue
- Internal thinking

Rules for Creative Writing

- Based on one of the picture prompts
- Must fit on one side of one page
- 12 point Arial font
- 1½ or double spaced
- Indicate which picture you are using

The winning entries are published in a book. This book is called an anthology, and it contains ALL of the stories, poems, and personal narratives that have been written by the this year's contest winners.


This is how your Google Document should look!
