The health and safety of the Ferndale Area School District and the staff and students remains, as always, the top priority for the organization. The FASD Leadership Team and Pandemic Team continue to take critical steps making decisions that protect the health and safety of our organization in the ongoing response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In response to the expiration of statewide mitigation orders, FASD has identified organizational standards and expectations which outline the protocols expected of all staff members as the organization transitions forward. Protocols include the following:

- Self-screening for COVID-19 symptoms
- Following communicable disease reporting procedures
- Practicing hand hygiene and respiratory etiquette
- Optional use of face coverings / adherence to health and safety plans of locations served
- Cleaning and disinfecting one's workspace
- Maintaining physical distancing protocols to the maximum extent feasible
- Staying informed of CDC's guidance relative to travel
- Monitoring communication and confidentiality
- Participating in required training (current employees as well as new hires as part of their onboarding process)
- Staying informed and maintaining best practices

- Expectations are based on the latest mandates issued by the Governor's Office, the Pennsylvania Department of Health (DOH), the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), the Department of Human Services (DHS), and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The Leadership Team and Pandemic Team will continue to monitor communications. As conditions change related to COVID-19, protocols are subject to change.



We all know the story: March of 2020 when the world as we knew it as educators would be turned completely upside down. Administrators were preparing for state assessments, teachers were working double time to get information into the minds of their students, and then BAM! schools across the Commonwealth are closed. And there lies the end of the 2019-20 school year. Teachers were at a loss in the modes of instruction. Administrators were in a mad scramble to make plans and initiate them. Parents were blind-sided with remote/virtual learning that no one was prepared for even in the age of technology. How will we instruct our students? How will we make certain that they have enough food to eat during the week when school meals may be the only ones they eat and monitor those that may be living in conditions that need the attention of the school? How do we as educators go without being able to say good-bye to this year's class?

In the end, our small school district prevailed. Teachers were on the forefront of a virtual world that was foreign to them. In a short amount of time, they learned how to Zoom, use Google Classroom from Kindergarten to Grade 6. Having the opportunity to sit in on a Scavenger Hunt with a kindergarten class was a light to the overbearing fear that we could not make remote learning work. Enthusiastic children were running around their homes looking for the treasure that fit the poetic clues. Amid the 15 students all talking at the same time, a smile was across the face of this teacher as she enjoyed the time together just as much as the children. Other classrooms were filled with eager students wanting to 'just talk', to their teacher.

The Food Service Director and her staff fed our 500+ students daily. Buses roamed the neighborhood to deliver the food, drop off packets of student work or pick-up completed work for teachers. The secretaries spent hours upon hours making copies, organizing mailings, and keeping the building upbeat for those that arrived at our door. Teachers created makeshift classrooms in their homes displaying their creativity in their DIY skills. I will never forget seeing a teacher using her shower walls as a dry erase board!

Fast forward to summer and administrators began preparation and planning for the 2020-2021 school year. Reopening phase plans were written, committees were created, plans A, B, C and D were discussed for those "just in case" scenarios. Everyone was rushing to order devices and to prepare services to Be Ready and to Pivot on a dime. The following questions had to be answered: How will we bring students into the building safely? How do we instruct? How do we make certain that we can follow protocol? How do we care for those students that need our attention? A lot has changed since March. During summer break, teachers and administrators in our district came together as a team. We brainstormed, formed committees and worked TOGETHER for the sake of the profession that we love-educating children.

A troublesome issue for me in this New Age way of educating is the concept of 'how do we engage our students and prepare them for future goals?' Teachers in my building spent the entire summer learning to navigate the following: A new reading series (we did not see a pandemic coming when we adopted it!); becoming familiar with a new learning management system; the ins and outs of Zoom meetings; the proper manner in which to sanitize items; creating "pods" for the children and how to keep themselves safe. Secretaries, the district nurse, and the maintenance team all worked diligently to prepare for whatever would come their way in the months ahead. And now, the classrooms have been transformed to an area that they can learn and enjoy the experience of school even during a pandemic. Rainbow-colored sit spots were placed on the floors of the primary classrooms and colorful tape created "private islands" for students in the upper grades to social distance, while videos were created of proper handwashing and mask wearing. We moved classrooms furniture out of rooms to provide ample space for social distancing and filled two trailers! And yet students, teachers, staff, and administration were determined to make the year a success.

Additionally, students proudly displayed artwork reminding all the rules of staying healthy. Decorations filled the halls just like they do every year and students and teachers donned the most fashionable masks creating an atmosphere of people just going with the flow. My, how resilient children really are compared to the adults.

Fast forward to fall, 2020-2021 where the mode of instruction has continued to change and evolve, so much so, it would make the faint of heart swoon. But my teachers and staff have continued to hold dear our profession of educating children. Administrators constantly cheer on all involved, from janitors to office professionals to cafeteria staff to paraprofessionals, nurses, school counselors, students and families. They are reminded of their resilience and small victories are met with air fives, parties and Zoom scavenger hunts again (this time it is even the older grades enjoying the hunt.

Even though there are days in the building when the tension is so thick you could cut it with a paper cutter, we never forget to smile, think of the positives and forge forward. Administration is under pressure trying to be the beacon of light, giving hope to everyone that things are going to get easier. Teachers are met with fruit baskets and a "Have a 'Beer' on Me" (root beer soda) party and are listened to when they just need an ear. I enjoy giving them daily reminders of positivity on my Quote of the Day board. I also like being a voice of reassurance to the children, reminding them that things are going to get easier. All educators are hoping that the current situation will become less stressful to everyone involved.

Now there is a new way to educate our students, one that no one saw coming. We must step back and recognize how we, as a community, are rising to this new challenge. (continued from page 5)

And we need to look to our students, as they are the future. They continue to show us their resilience. Remote learning has taught them unique ways of problem solving and critical thinking. It has also allowed them to impart this new-found knowledge to their teachers, to administrators and to their families. The attendance of most Zoom classes is at 95%. Why is this so? I believe that it is because of the love and engagement of my teachers and staff. Classrooms that have met their attendance goal celebrated this small victory with an ice cream party.

And lest we forget that we, as educators, have also become resilient. We have become creative in the way that we teach and assess our students. Bitmoji classrooms, virtual field trips, scavenger hunts from home all help to ease the tension for all parties involved in how we educate students today. We have made certain that families have enough food to eat during the week by sending food with the hybrid students and delivering full meals when completely remote. We now have better communication with families and look at education through a very different lens. We are able to monitor those that may be living in conditions that need the attention of the school and reassure the families that it is going to get easier.

When one becomes an educator, it is not for the glory or the money, it is for the love of educating young people. In the book, Rising Strong: The Reckoning, The Rumble, The Revolution (Brown, 2015) the author discusses the question: "Are THEY doing their best?" This question can be asked of everyone involved in learning. But truly what is someone's best? Can we be the judge of others or believe that it is in our character that whatever the situation may be each one of us is doing our best.

Resilience is key this year more than ever before in my book. And resilience is what you get when you open the door to all to shine their brightest.

Our resilient students have had such a busy year thus far! While library class was definitely different this year than in the past, we still were able to learn a lot through reading various genres of books. In addition to that, students were also challenged through many research and STEAM activities along the way.

We kicked off the 2020-2021 school year researching the Monarch Butterfly Migration. Students in K4-6th grade learned various facts about this remarkable event that occurs every fall and spring. We even had a monarch migration right here in the library hallway with many K4-2nd grade student-made butterflies displayed! Our upper-leveled elementary students made their own flip books to showcase their knowledge.

When we went virtual a few times, students learned all about our great state of Pennsylvania through engaging activities revolving around our wildlife, a study on Pennsylvanian authors, and a neat virtual road trip to the Crayola Factory. We read "The Crayon Man: The True Story of the Invention of Crayola Crayons" and "K is for Keystone: A Pennsylvania Alphabet."

During the winter months, our K4 and Kindergarten students dove into a penguin research unit. First Grade students learned all about the polar bear. Older elementary students learned all about biographies and even selected an influential individual to learn about his/her life. Various grade-level biography projects were proudly displayed down the library hallway.

March kicked off Read Across America where students took part in a March Madness Bracket to reveal what Ferndale Area Elementary's favorite book is. We spent from March-April reading all of the contenders and voting along the way. We are getting close to revealing the overall winner after weeks of voting!

Currently, our younger yellow jackets are participating in spring read alouds followed by creating a spring display for the library hallway. Our older yellow jackets are working on problem solving by using prior knowledge and applying it to their grade level STEAM challenge. Third Grade's challenge is to build a house for the three little pigs using only toothpicks. Fourth Grade is learning all about worms in order to help to Save Fred. Fifth Grade students are using teamwork to design a contraption to house an egg for an egg drop contest. Lastly, Sixth Grade students are using teamwork to design and build a load-bearing bridge out of toothpicks and marshmallows. We are going to be testing to see who's bridge is the strongest. All of these challenges are of course based on a book that we have read together.

As we get ready to close out the 2020-2021 school year, I want to thank my hard-working students for handling change in such a positive manner. As I told them many times, this is the year of pivot. I know it wasn't easy, and special activities were missed out on. They were rock stars! Thank you families for coming together to try to make virtual learning work for your child/children. It takes a village to raise a child, and I think we did the best we could this year around every challenge thrown at us. Lastly, thank you to FAES staff and administration for giving me this opportunity to be able to teach our young learners. I had a blast being able to incorporate my passion for project-based learning and Library. FASD is a special place to "bee."

WELCOME TO ART CLASS!

This year has sure been a crazy one! Our students have endured a lot and have still managed to amaze me in all that they accomplished!

K4-1st graders have been working hard on Earth Day Projects and even a little surprise for Mother's Day.

2nd graders have been busy watercolor painting and creating spring bird pictures. We will be starting our STEAM Area Robots soon.

3rd graders learned about the artist Henri Rousseau and created a toucan drawing that they are working hard on finishing with watercolor paints.

4th graders finished up their optical illusions using concentric circles and alternating patterns. They then worked on a 3-dimensional sculpture project in which they used model magic to create a pencil topper and painted them with watercolor paints.

5th graders are working on a pencil sculpture. They created an armature and used plaster to cover it. They will be finishing them off with metal tooling and tempera paint. They are so excited about these!

6th graders finished up their Optical Illusions in which they used shading and alternating patterns to create the illusion.
