District Adopts 2018-2019 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 2018-2019 fiscal year budget on June 13, 2018. Real estate millage was set at 84 mills, which was an increase of 3 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2018-2019 index of 3.8% which was required by Act 1 participating districts.

2018-2019 K-12 School Calendar





Elementary Unified Arts

Unified Arts is made up of the Library, Art, Music, Physical Education and Computer & Technology Departments. While we have our own curriculum, we also work closely together to provide differentiated, cross-curricular activities for all students in grades K4-6.

This year we had eight days of Differentiated STEAM activities for the students. These were held on different days throughout the year, and included activities like "Candy Cane Package Challenge", "Angry Bird Catapult", "Weather Unit", and more!

Here are some highlights of our year:

Library classes are built around nurturing the love of reading. To help support this at home, we continued our free book give-away. Third grade even started a Reading Club. Reading is essential to everything we ever do, so we encourage YOU to keep reading every day!

Other Library sponsored events included the fall Artsy Smartsy Maker Faire and the spring Science Fair.

Music classes are designed to be hands-on learning experiences. Students created music, sang, and played a variety of musical instruments. Students were exposed to different genres of music, learned about the evolution of music through the years, and discussed the impact historical and cultural events have on music. The culmination of all we've learned is the Fernstock Festival,

where students create, produce, and perform a work for peers, families, and friends. Fernstock 2018 was held on Thursday, May 24.

Looking ahead: next year will mark the 25th Anniversary of Fernstock! If you are alumni, keep your eyes and ears open, we are hoping to include YOU!

This year we had a good number of 4th, 5th, and 6th grade students involved in Beginning Band, Band, and/or Chorus. Three 6th grade Ferndale Area students participated in the PMEA District 6 Band Festival; Jonathan Huffman on trumpet, and Kyla Sidor and Mattie Lushko on flute.

Another yearly tradition for the Music Department is our annual "Salute to Our Veterans" unit. Each grade level is given a patriotic/military song to learn. This means not only learning the lyrics and melody of the song, but its origin and place in history; the circumstances under which it was written. The students are then filmed singing their song, and it is played for our military friends and family during the annual Veterans' Day luncheon event.

This year we were glad that we could include K4 into the unified arts cycles! K4 learned all about colors, shapes, various types of lines, how to draw through direct instruction (step by step), how to properly use scissors, glue sticks, etc. We really tried to work on our fine motor skills and most importantly have fun!!

Continued Unified Arts

The Art Department focuses its curriculum on a number of cross-curricular topics. We cover Science through the study of animals and their habitats, Geography and Social Studies through the study of other countries and traditions, Reading by basing our artwork on a particular story, Math by incorporating various math skills into our artwork by measuring, finding the area of an object, using fractions, creating agamographs, radial relief origami, optical illusions, and much more! We also focus on Artists and learn a little about Art History. We have covered artists such as Vincent van Gogh, Henri Rousseau, Henri Matisse, George Rodrigue, Wassily Kandinsky, Frida Kahlo, Diego Rivera, Keith Haring, Grant Wood and many more!

This year we really tried to incorporate more STEAM based thinking. STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math. Students competed in challenges in the art room such as cup stacking, straw rockets, marshmallow toothpick towers, paper airplanes, marble runs, angry bird catapults, tin foil towers, and much more! Some students even got to compete in the First Lego Team competition! These students worked hard and had to think creatively on how to solve problems to achieve a particular outcome. We look forward to next year and creating more STEAM like approaches for art class!

The Health and Physical Education Department continued its commitment to providing more activity time during the school day. "Jump Rope For Heart", a fundraising school event for the American Heart Association was held again this year. Mrs. Babik was out for the end of the school year, as she welcomed a son, Reid Michael to the world! Miss Eisenhuth filled in for Mrs. Babik, and "kept the ball rolling".

We are not done yet! On Friday, May 25 the kids participated in Field Day. Field Day is an all day event where students get to participate in fun relay games and team challenges. Ferndale Area Elementary "likes to move it, move it!"

Computer Education: Computer class curriculum is designed to meet the needs of all elementary students from K-4 through sixth grade. This is our first year integrating the K-4 students into the Unified Arts curriculum. During the school year the K-4 students developed basic computer skill while exploring the ABC Mouse website. In this way, K-4 students were given the opportunity to learn skills that will help them as they move from grade level to grade level.

The remainder of the students at the elementary explored curriculum that covers up to date important topics of today's constantly changing, technology driven world. This school year students have learned about Internet Safety issues, explored gaming with ABC Mouse and ABCYA, researched different countries and cultures

during Ethnic Fest, and completed coding puzzles. Students participated in the "Hour of Coding Challenge" using the code.org website.

Working with the Art department, the computer department helped develop a First Lego Team that competed in the 2018 Robotics competition held at the Greater Johnstown Vocational and Technology Center.

This year we had eight days of Differentiated STEAM activities for the students. These were held on different days throughout the year, and included activities like "Candy Cane Package Challenge", "Angry Bird Catapult", "Weather Unit", and more!

The Unified Arts Department held its fourth annual Ethnic Fest. Ethnic Fest is a cross-curricular social studies unit. Students learned songs, singing games (in the culture's native language!) and dances. They also created cultural art projects, participated in national sports of each country studied, and learned about folktales from each culture. Some highlights include a 6th grade's Native American Pow Wow, 3rd grade's Japanese Cherry Blossom Festival, 2nd grade's Scotland Highland Games, the 4th grade's English Renaissance Faire, and much more.

The Unified Arts also continued with its annual Earth Fest education unit. This unit allowed students to learn about the different biomes, habitats, and animals of Pennsylvania. They also learned about human habits and behaviors that negatively AND positively impact our state's flora and fauna! This interdisciplinary/crosscurricular approach included songs, singing games, art, audio-visual collaborations, PowerPoint presentations, and hands-on activities, as well as presentations by guest environmental specialists.

Finally, to all of our graduating 6th grade students, we wish you success, joy, fulfillment, and continued growth both educationally, and personally. We are so proud of the fine young ladies and gentlemen you are becoming, and we look forward to hearing more about you as you continue on life's amazing journey! They competed in three rounds of mathematics competition, the sprint round, target round and team round.



Peer Leaders

This year the Senior High offered a voluntary program to our students that allows older students (grades 9-12) MENTORS an opportunity to work with younger students (grades 7-9) MENTEES. The purpose is to give the younger students a peer connection that helps them transition through Junior High.

Archery Competition

Tashaun Moore started shooting archery on January 15 in the high school's elective archery class. After 3 weeks of shooting at the tournament distances, 10 meters and 15 meters, Tashaun shot 284/300. At this point, I had a feeling that Tashaun had a special talent when it came to archery. After a little tweaking of his shooting mechanics, Tashaun improved his personal best to 293/300.

A few short weeks later the archery club/team participated in a qualifying tournament at Windber Area High School, which was necessary for the club/team to do in order to qualify for the state tournament. Tashaun shot a 286/300 at the Windber qualifier and that score was high enough to qualify him for the state competition at Penn State University.

On March 9, Tashaun, Nate Pudliner, Hunter Kinsey, and I departed from Ferndale Area for Tashaun to compete in the state tournament. This day was not an ordinary day. The school day started off with a 2-hour delay, which made things interesting. We left for State College at 9:15 a.m. (supposed to leave at 9:00 a.m.) and arrived at Penn State at 10:48 a.m. Tashaun's shooting time was 10:50 a.m. At this point, I told Nate Pudliner (since he was on two previous trips to State College) to take Tashaun and the bows and get him to the registration table and tell the people in charge I would be right in that I was parking the car. The boys ran in, got Tashaun registered and got him to his assigned target. Once he arrived at his target, Tashaun was then moved about 20 targets away because they put two students from the same school together. After this chaotic and stressful start, Tashaun finally got to shoot and did not disappoint. He completed his flight and shot 297/300. After a few hours of waiting for the rest of the flights to be completed, Tashaun ended up winning the individual high school male championship out of 409 archers and the top overall high score out of 799 archers.

Tashaun's first place finish at the state tournament qualified him for the NASP National Tournament in Louisville, Kentucky. At the national tournament, Tashaun competed in two tournaments, an IBO 3D animal tournament and the bulls-eye tournament. In the 3D tournament he shot a 289/300 (first time ever shooting this type of tournament), which earned him a 26th place finish. In the bulls-eye tournament he shot a 295/300, which earned him an 11th place finish. By placing in the top 30 in both tournaments, Tashaun earned a trip back to the NASP World tournament in June, in which he will compete against the top 30 archers from the United States.

Finally, Tashaun's 11th place finish earned him an invite to be part of the 2018 NASP All-Star Team, which takes the top 16 archers from the U.S., and they will compete against Canada and South Africa. This All-Star tournament will take place July 8-11 in Calgary, Alberta, Canada.
