District Adopts 2017-2018 Budget

The Ferndale Area School Board adopted the 2017-2018 fiscal year budget on June 14, 2017. Real estate millage was set at 81 mills, which was an increase of 3 mills. After review, the Pennsylvania Department of Education approved the tax rate. The increase was less than the 2017-2018 index of 3.9% which was required by Act 1 participating districts.

New Truancy Law

Act 138: What Families Need to Know About Attendance!

On November 2, 2016, Act 138, PA's new truancy law was signed into legislation. The purpose of the new law is to improve overall school attendance through "a comprehensive approach to consistently identify and address attendance issues as early as possible through credible interventions."

Act 138 now recognizes TRUANCY as having *unexcused* absences for <u>3 OR MORE SCHOOL DAYS during the</u> <u>current school year</u>. The term "<u>HABITUALLY TRUANT</u>" was used when students missed 10 days of school. THIS IS CHANGED TO <u>6 OR MORE DAYS OF UNEXCUSED</u> <u>ABSENCES FOR THE CURRENT SCHOOL YEAR</u>.

What does this mean for families?

The law states that school districts are required to notify the parents or guardians when <u>3 unexcused absences</u> have been accumulated.

When <u>6 or more</u> UNEXCUSED absences are accumulated, the school MUST refer the child to a school based or community based attendance improvement program OR contact Children and Youth Services/Juvenile Probation based upon the age of the child.

Citations may still be filed by the school against the parent/ guardian to a magistrate.

The cost of fines is also increasing with Act 138. The first fine is \$300, the second is \$500 and the third and subsequent infractions are \$700.

What about excused absences?

District Policy No. 204 cites the following as reasons for **excusable absences**:

- illness
 quarantine
 family emergency
 educational trips
- recovery from accident court attendance (mandated)

A maximum of <u>10 days of excused absences are permitted in</u> one school year. After 10 days, an excuse from a licensed physician is required or absences become unexcused.

YOU HAVE THREE DAYS AFTER THE ABSENCE TO TURN IN AN EXCUSE OR THE ABSENCE IS LEFT IN THE RECORD AS UNEXCUSED.

New Immunization Law for the 2017-1018 School Year

The Pennsylvania Department of Health has new regulations regarding immunizations effective August 1, 2017 and must be implemented for the 2017-18 school year. Required immunizations listed below must be complete by the first day of school or your child may risk being excluded from school. The PA Department of Health is allowing for a five-day window to complete except for 7th grade students needing their first Meningococcal (MCV) vaccine (required on the first day of school), but it is highly recommending this be done as soon as possible.

Effective August 1, 2017 the PA Department of Health will **require students in all grades** to have the following immunizations for attendance in school:

- 4 doses of tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis (1 dose must be on or after 4th birthday)
- 4 doses of polio (3 doses if third dose is given on or after 4th birthday and at least 6 months after previous dose given)
- 2 doses of measles, mumps, rubella (MMR)
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 2 doses of varicella (chicken pox) or evidence of immunity

On the first day of 7th grade, the following additional immunizations are required:

- 1 dose of tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis (Tdap)
- 1 dose of meningococcal conjugate (MCV)

On the first day of 12th grade, the following additional immunization is required:

• 1 additional dose of meningococcal conjugate (MCV) If the dose was given at 16 years of age or older, only one dose is required. To be immunized for 12th grade and college, dose must be on or AFTER 16th birthday.

If a student is missing any of the required vaccine doses, he/she must obtain the next or final dose within the first five days of school beginning in the 2017-18 school year or risk being excluded from school.

• If the next dose is not the final dose or if it is not medically appropriate to receive the immunizations, a medical plan must be completed and signed by your physician outlining the dates scheduled for immunizations. This medical plan will be reviewed every 30 days and must be followed or your child will risk being excluded from school.

Exceptions include:

- If first dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV) was administered when your child was 16 years of age or older.
- Medical exemption that must be signed by a physician.
- Religious/philosophical/moral or ethical convictions that must have a signed exemption by parent/guardian and on file at the Ferndale Area High School.
- Please note that if your child is under exemption status, they are at risk for exclusion if an outbreak occurs.

As the beginning of summer comes for all to enjoy the warm weather, the sun on our faces and a lot of time outside, I want to reflect on what transpired throughout the three seasons spent in our elementary school and the growth that occurred in all aspects of development for our students.

We look at the elementary school as the building block of a child's future. It is here that we help to shape young lives physically, emotionally, academically, socially and morally. When your son and/or daughter walks through the door of Ferndale Area Elementary School, we strive to make certain that they feel safe and loved.

Academically, we continue to strive to meet the needs of all of our students by differentiation, intervention and enrichment. Students are given instruction based upon their own strengths and weaknesses. Group and individual work is conducted to develop independence and higher level thinking. It is with our high standards in providing the best foundation in education; we strive to give our students the best that we can give in instruction. There is no cookie-cutter curriculum, no set schedule of teaching subjects only on the surface and no "hoping that the students will pick it up later in life." Rather, the faculty and staff search for curriculum that will teach concepts based upon their students' needs, to take the time necessary to teach the skills and intervene or enrich to continuously challenge the students. It is with this type of response to our students that I know that we are a quality school with a quality education. It is with admiration of our school that I tell everyone that I am a part of Ferndale Area School District and wear our colors with pride.

Guidance Department

This has been a very busy and fun year in the Ferndale Area Elementary Guidance Department. Guidance lessons were presented in each classroom once a month for Grades K-5. We discussed topics such as being a good friend, the difference between a buddy and a bully, making good choices, being thankful, kindness and challenging each student to complete random acts of kindness throughout the building. We also made thank you cards for all of our teachers in honor of teacher appreciation week and thanking them for all that they have done for us throughout the school year.

We have had many outside agencies present programs to our students in various grade levels. Grades 3-6 participated in an internet safety course presented by the PA Attorney General's office. They encouraged students to be mindful of what they see and post on the internet as well as potential consequences. The presentation also touched on cyberbullying and its effects on students. Grades 3, 4, 5 participated in the Too Good For Drugs Program presented by the Learning Lamp. This program encouraged the students not to use drugs, and focused on making good choices and decisions throughout their lives.

Published Authors

Students across various grade levels worked hard throughout the year to create books. The books were then sent to a company, and our students became published authors! On Wednesday, April 19, we hosted our Young Authors' Night. We had a wonderful turn-out to support and congratulate these young authors. We would like to thank the parents, guardians, families, and friends for a great evening!



Grade 6 has also been very busy. The sixth graders participated in the Botvin LifeSkills Program which is a 15 week program designed to encourage them to make good choices and decisions. The Learning Lamp also presented a gambling prevention program titled "Wanna Bet?" This gives the students an opportunity to learn the probability and mathematics involved in gambling, as well as to encourage prevention. The sixth graders participated in an assembly which was conducted through the District Attorney's Office on drug prevention. This was presented to all sixth grade students throughout Cambria County. Finally, the sixth graders were excited to take a trip to the Junior/Senior High School. A great presentation was given on what to expect, the clubs and activities they can participate in, as well as a tour of the building. The students were excited to meet some of their upcoming teachers for next year and are looking forward to the transition to the Junior/Senior High School. All in all it was a great year!

Flags at Grandview Cemetery

Fourth grade looked forward to placing flags on veterans' graves at Grandview Cemetery once again this year. This was our fifth year doing this. It is such a moving experience for us to honor our veterans in this way. Each child placed at least a dozen flags this year.

Our students learn so much through this experience. Many of them take the time to look at the veteran's name, birthdate, date of death, and what years he or she served. We discussed proper behavior in the cemetery, and the children also showed proper respect if there was a burial taking place or someone was visiting the grave of a loved one. It also gave us the opportunity to discuss the different wars that our country has fought. A highlight was when we placed flags on the graves of Civil War Veterans.

We want to thank Mr. and Mrs. Vuckovich for including us in this VFW project for all these years. It is truly an honor.

Elementary Unified Arts

Unified Arts is made up of the Library, Art, Music, Physical Education and Computer & Technology Departments. While we have our own curriculum, we also work closely together to provide cross-curricular activities for all students in grades K4-6. Here are some highlights of our year.

LIBRARY EDUCATION

Library classes are built around nurturing the love of reading. To help support this at home, we continued our free book give-away. Third Grade even started a Reading Club. Reading is essential to everything we ever do, so we encourage YOU to keep reading every day!

Other Library sponsored events included the fall Artsy Smartsy Maker Faire and the spring Science Fair.

MUSIC EDUCATION

Music classes are designed to be hands-on learning experiences. Students created music, sang, and played a variety of musical instruments. Students were exposed to different genres of music, learned about the evolution of music through the years, and discussed the impact historical and cultural events have on music. The culmination of all we've learned is the Fernstock Festival, where students create, produce, and perform a work for peers, families, and friends.

Band and Chorus made beautiful music all year long! Fernstock 2017 was held on Thursday, May 25.

This year we had a good number of fourth, fifth, and sixth grade students involved in Beginning Band, Band, and/or Chorus. Five sixth grade Ferndale Area students participated in the PMEA District 6 Band Festival; Mychael Bier and Jaedyn Hoffman on clarinet, Jullian Novotny on trumpet, and Gavin Arone and Ethan Chandler-Christie on Percussion.

We also had ten students participate and perform in the PMEA District 6 County Chorus Festival: Gavin Arone, MycKayla Barley, Mychael Bier, Leah Grassa, Jaedyn Hoffman, Leah Grassa, Alexis McKendree, Ja'Kiyrah Simms, Sahmara Tillman, and Irelin Urban.

Another yearly tradition for the Music Department is our annual "Salute to Our Veterans" unit. Each grade level is given a patriotic/military song to learn. This means not only learning the lyrics and melody of the song, but its origin and place in history; the circumstances under which it was written. The students are then filmed singing their song, and it is played for our military friends and family during the annual Veterans Day luncheon event.

ART EDUCATION

Mrs. Sendek welcomed her second child, Carter Allen Sendek this year! Mrs. Marley was in for Art for the first part of the year. Upon Mrs. Sendek's return, Art classes learned about various artists, and created a work based on that artist's style. We also used our Library's resources by using illustrators' works to inspire our own art projects. The Art Department also started implementing STEAM related projects into the curriculum this year.

Next year, the Art and Music Department will return with its second Annual Talent/Art Show! Stay tuned for details!

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

The Health and Physical Education Department continued its commitment to providing more activity time during the school day. Students had the opportunity to participate in before-school activities such as running club (participants collectively ran 1,257 miles this year!!) volleyball, soccer, hockey, and 3v3 basketball. This year the Fun Fitness after-school program had more participants than ever before! Students ran, lifted, and played their way to healthier lifestyles. FAES students also had an opportunity to participate in the American Heart Association's Jump Rope for Heart Campaign. This year the community raised \$5,581.40 to fight heart disease! To celebrate, Chief Rigby brought in lights, and he and Officer Krupa jumped and danced to the sweet mixes Mrs. Babik spun. We are not done yet! On Friday, May 26, the students participated in Field Day. Field Day is an all day event where students get to participate in fun relay games and team challenges. Ferndale Area Elementary "likes to move it, move it!"

COMPUTER EDUCATION

Computer class curriculum is designed to meet the needs of all elementary students from kindergarten through sixth grade. The curriculum covers up-to-date important topics of today's constantly changing technology driven world. This school year, students have learned about Internet Safety issues, explored gaming with ABCMouse and ABCYA, researched different countries and cultures during Ethnic Fest, and Completed Coding puzzles and the Hour of Coding Challenge using the code.org website. The Computer and Art Departments were instrumental in helping to develop the Lego League Team. This was our second year competing in the Lego League Robotics Challenge. This is Mr. Burket's second year as computer instructor in the elementary school and believes that he is lucky to be able to have the support from so many fine individuals. Mr. Burket has always believed that learning is continued growth during a lifetime of effort.

UNIFIED EDUCATION

Collectively, the Unified Arts Department held its third annual Ethnic Fest. Ethnic Fest is a cross-curricular social studies unit. Students learned songs, singing games (in the culture's native language!) and dances. They also created cultural art projects, participated in national sports of each country studied, and learned about folktales from (Continued Elementary Unified Arts)

each culture. Some highlights include a sixth grade Native American Pow Wow, third grade's Japanese Cherry Blossom Festival, second grade's Scotland Highland Games, the fourth grade's English Renaissance Faire, and much more.

The Unified Arts also continued with its annual Earth Fest education unit. This unit allowed students to learn about the different biomes, habitats, and animals of Pennsylvania. They also learned about human habits and behaviors that negatively and positively impact our state's flora and fauna! This interdisciplinary/crosscurricular approach included songs, singing games, art, audio-visual collaborations, PowerPoint presentations, and hands-on activities, as well as presentations by guest environmental specialists.

Other events scheduled included the annual Field Day, celebrating the end of a successful school year, and the annual Fernstock Festival.

Finally, to all of our graduating sixth grade students, we wish you success, joy, fulfillment, and continued growth both educationally, and personally. We are so proud of the fine young ladies and gentlemen you are becoming, and we look forward to hearing more about you as you continue on life's amazing journey! From the Desk of the Jr/Sr HS Principal...

2016-2017 was a year of adjusting and reflecting. I began my first full school year at Ferndale Area Junior/Senior High School, having begun my tenure the previous school year in April. I was adjusting to some new tasks and events, but I was also reflecting on some familiar tasks and events that I encountered in the previous school year.

As a school, we were adjusting to some changes implemented previously, such as our One-to-World initiative that put an iPad in each student's hands again this year. We adjusted to some course changes, and we reflected upon previous courses and how we could improve and implement additional components to enhance and add real-world value to our curriculum. The staff at the Jr/Sr High School had worked diligently on aligning their curriculum to the recently implemented Common Core Academic Standards, and now the goal was to improve and reflect on past years to drive our curriculum and classes to new levels to engage students and increase their knowledge.

Additionally, we added a new staff member this school year, a School Social Worker, Mrs. Monica McIntyre, while we officially "lost" a staff member in Mrs. Laryssa Bremer, Guidance Counselor, who transferred to the Elementary School. Mrs. McIntyre worked with the Jr/Sr High School Guidance Counselor, Mrs. Lori Dodson, to provide the necessary guidance and support to enhance our students' experiences in and out of school. We also reflected on past practices and utilized that knowledge and skills to add new features and components to better serve our students.

This year our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) Team of staff and students utilized the positive Buzz around the Hive to add incentive days and rewards for students who display positive behaviors throughout the school day. Students earn a Bee Note from their teachers who catch them doing the right thing. Those Bee Notes could be traded in for rewards, such as items from our school store, or attendance at an incentive event such as Homecoming Activity Day, Quads, or the Dodge Ball Tournaments.

Lastly, we have adjusted to being in the spotlight for numerous activities; athletics, extracurricular activities, clubs, organizations, and vocational showcases. We are reflecting on what we did to bring the spotlight upon ourselves, and we are adjusting our programs objectives and goals to remain in the spotlight to continue to receive accolades from community and educational organizations.

As the building principal, I work closely with the entire staff and faculty at the Jr/Sr High School. I am impressed with the amount of talent and effort that all of our faculty inputs to enrich and enhance the school, the students' educational placements, and the extracurricular activities that we are a part of during the school year. I see many people going above and beyond to give our students that extra effort that they deserve. FALL SPORTS

The Varsity Football team had a much-improved season from previous years finishing the regular season with a record of 4-6. The team qualified for District 6 playoffs as the #12 seed. This was their first playoff appearance since the 1995-96 school year. In the first round, they defeated #5 seeded Williamsburg on the road by the score of 21-12.
