- This is a renewal levy and represents NO new taxes.
- This 2.6 mill levy has been renewed every 5 years over the last 25 years.
- This levy generates \$854,281 per year for the district's operating expenses.
- The term "emergency renewal levy" is required by Ohio law for this type of operating levy. This is the same name given to this levy since it was first passed over two decades ago.

Students Learn About Manufacturing Career Opportunities at "Made in Marion Expo"

On October 18, over 300 students from River Valley High School and Middle School joined local manufacturers and other Marion area students for the 2022 Made in Marion Expo. The Expo was created as a way for Marion manufacturers, supporting logistics, and utility companies to share what is made in Marion, Ohio, and the impact Marion, Ohio, makes on the world. This experience also helps students consider local career opportunities that they may not otherwise realized were options.

During their visit, students moved through 22 stations around the Veterans Memorial Coliseum. At each station, manufacturers shared information about their business and how items are designed, assembled, or shipped from their facility. Many sessions included hands-on activities for students to get more familiar with how things are made in today's manufacturing environment. Junior and senior students from the Tri-Rivers RAMTEC center provided hands-on, engaging robotics activities for students. Students also had the opportunity to tour the Marion Technical College Mobile



Training Lab, where they could get hands-on with a real industrial CNC milling machine.

In addition to the face-to-face experience at the Coliseum, teachers were provided with a website of resources and activities. Students could complete a scavenger hunt developed by RVMS teacher Michelle Owings and explore local manufacturers through video tours, links, and images. Students can also download the Smart MFG 2 app that uses augmented reality technology to give them a chance to design and manufacture a drone. The website also links local manufacturing job postings to help students explore career pathways for future planning.

Middle School Focuses on Real World Application for Learning

An education isn't just about learning to read and complete math problems. Those things are certainly important, but without a way to apply this knowledge to the real world and a future career pathway, the process of attending school would not be as valuable. At River Valley Middle School, the staff is partnering with local businesses and other organizations to provide students additional opportunities as they approach high school and after for the real world.

The RVMS Agriculture instructor, Mr. Albert, attended a water and soil workshop sponsored by Grow Next Gen, Feed the World, Ohio Corn Education, and Ohio Soybean Council. At this workshop, he received a free soil and water testing kit that has allowed his students to learn about the importance of soil and water quality in agriculture. Mr. Albert would like to thank our local farmers for their contributions to Grow Next Gen, Feed the World, Ohio Corn Education, and the Ohio Soybean Council.

In our Visual Art program, Mrs. Carey has again teamed up with the Marion County Engineer's Office to paint a plow. Art students are currently painting a snow plow that will be used by Marion County this winter to plow our roads. This gives students a project where they have to work with the requirements of an outside customer, just like a professional designer or artist would do.

Our Career Explorations classes led by Mrs. Owings have had many guest speakers provide experiences. Guest speakers Devin Durain from Heart of Ohio Homeless Shelter and Jenni Hypes from Love INC. shared about their Nonprofit organizations. Students learned about Hospitality from Casey Hoffman by going and touring The Brickyard on Main. In Career Explorations 2, classes are working on a classroom economy simulation where they pay bills, such as rent for their desk and electricity.

Students Find Success in Fall Sports at RV

The tennis team and cross country teams both finished seasons with successful campaigns that saw a lot of student-athletes gain valuable experience for their future both as students and into their years beyond high school. Cross country, specifically, is a team made up of all underclassmen, meaning their future as a group is very bright.



The volleyball team had a successful season that ended in a close tournament loss to Bexley, but saw numerous team and individual accomplishments. Of note, both Eden Osborne and Haleigh Creps set individual records

within the program for seasonlong digs and kills respectively. Morgan Nemeth also registered her 1000th career assist. Also of note, Creps was the September 2022 Fahey Bank Athlete of the Month, the week of 9/18/22 State Player of the Week from the National Volleyball Coaches Association, and also was the MOAC player of the year.





Boys and girls soccer finished up their seasons playing well. The girls were able to win a tournament game at Highland to secure a place in the district tournament, while the boys lost a close one to Hamilton Twp., but had numerous other quality wins over the course of the season, including the inaugural "Iberia Cup" against Galion at Historic Crew Stadium.

The 2022 football season ended with a game against Perkins High School, after a 5-5 regular season secured the Vikings the 14 seed in the region 14 OHSAA playoffs. RV Boys Soccer Gets a Big Win in a Big Stadium

The River Valley boys soccer team defeated Galion Tigers 3-1 in an MOAC match-up on Saturday, October 8, 2022. While that doesn't seem to stand out as a huge game, it was arguably the biggest game in the history of the Viking boys' soccer program.

This game, now known as the "Iberia Cup," wasn't played at Galion. River Valley was the home team on the scoreboard, but the game was not at River Valley either. The game was played at the Historic Crew Stadium, the first soccer-specific professional stadium in the United States. This former home of the Columbus Crew has hosted many significant games in its 23 years. The MLS Cup, MLS All-Star Game, and several US Men's National Team World Cup Oualifiers are some of the most significant events that have taken place



at this stadium. In 2003, the eyes of the world were on this 22,000seat venue, as the Women's World Cup saw six matches played here.

However, on this crisp autumn day, the cavernous stadium played host to a fierce MOAC match-up. "It was a surreal moment. Playing in that stadium is a dream come true," said Viking junior captain Gabe Douce. Freshman Ian Burns had his own plan to prepare for the game. "I was kind of nervous, but we tried to treat it as just another game," Burns said. "I just figured if I played my best, I knew we would be fine. It wasn't until after the game that I realized just how big of a deal this game was."

For Junior captain, Noah Williams, a special game like this meant that he and his fellow Vikings had to show up looking the part. Channeling Joe Burrow, Williams made it clear that he wanted everyone to know the Vikings meant business getting off the bus by what he called "bringing the drip." "Hey, it's what the pros do," Williams said. "I feel like it made the experience more special for the team. It was different from the usual warmups we would wear on the way to a normal game."

Williams clearly won the "drip" contest, arriving in a navy and gold leaf suit, Hollywood sunglasses, bottomed off with sequined gold shoes.

Treasurer's Talk

As we near the end of 2022, we would like to thank our community for your continued support. We are grateful for all you do to support River Valley students, staff, and fellow community members.

Triennial update letters were recently released from the County Auditor's Office. To deepen the understanding of property taxes and how they may impact your family, below we have shared a few key terms and some basic Ohio tax information:

- Millage/Mill: Amount of tax payable per dollar of a property's assessed value and is defined as one-tenth of a percent or one-tenth of a cent (\$.001). Mills are often communicated as cost per \$100,000 of home property value. For example, our Emergency Levy renewal on the ballot in November is a 2.6 mill operating levy, equating to an estimated \$91 annually per \$100,000 of home market value or \$35,000 assessed (taxable) value. (\$35,000 X .0026).
- Inside Millage: Unvoted property tax authorized by the Ohio Constitution and established by the General Assembly, which may not exceed 10 mills in any taxing district. River Valley's inside millage is 4.2 mills. River Valley has never moved inside millage.
- Outside Millage: Millage that voters have approved.
- Effective Millage: The rate of taxation, expressed in mills, multiplied by the property's assessed value. Once a levy is voted in, a school district cannot collect any additional money due to valuation increases from a reappraisal or triennial updates on that levy. Since 1976, House Bill 920 established reduction factors that prohibited an inflationary increase in the amount of taxes levied against real property.
- Millage "Floor": Minimum millage level, or floor, that millage rates cannot fall below established by Ohio law. The current minimum level is 20 mills. Once a district's total millage is reduced to 20 mills, it cannot be reduced any further, hence the 20-mill floor. The 20-mill calculation includes the current inside millage and current outside millage.

In Ohio, school districts have a full-voted millage rate, which is the rate initially approved by the voters in the community. Due to state law, the County Auditor reduces voted millage over time to an effective millage rate. Ohio law has also established a 20 mill floor that operating mills cannot go below. River Valley is at this floor.

There are common types of levies that school districts can pursue to generate property tax revenue, such as:

- · General Levy: property tax used for any school district purpose but primarily for either operating expenses or permanent improvement funding. Proposed as a specific dollar amount of new revenue.
- Emergency levy: property tax that is a limited operating levy for a maximum of 10 years proposed for a specific dollar amount. Because the dollar amount of taxes charged by the levy must stay constant, the millage rate increases or decreases as property values change. It can be renewed for the dollar amount originally requested.
- Bond levy: property tax levy used to provide a school district with local revenue for construction purposes. Remain in place until the debt (principal and interest) is fully paid, typically 20 or more years.
- Incremental levy: property tax phased in for the full amount of the millage increase. Limited levy, with a maximum term of 10 years. Imposes additional millage on a regular schedule throughout the life of the levy.
- Growth levy: property tax levy designed to compensate for reductions in state funding caused by appreciation in real estate values. Growth cannot exceed 4% per year.
- Income tax: levied at a percentage on district residents' income or on an estate's taxable income. School district income tax uses as its base the same taxable income as reported for state income tax purposes. It can be a limited or continuing levy and can be proposed in combination with a property tax levy, bond levy, or reduction in property taxes. School districts are permitted to levy income taxes on earned income only, which is what voters passed for River Valley in 2019 at a rate of 1%. Earned income excludes investment and retirement income.

River Valley Hosts Ohio Technology Summit

On Friday, October 14, River Valley Local Schools was closed for staff professional development. Typically, during these days, our teaching staff have learning assigned from the district they must attend or complete. However, on this day, things were a bit different. Instead of creating a one size fits all day, RV schools hosted an educational technology conference where outside speakers and subject matter experts applied to present on various topics.

During the day, teachers could attend over 40 different presentation sessions. We also had an outstanding keynote speech from Natalie Wexler, author of The Knowledge Gap. In addition to the available learning sessions, exhibitors included the Ohio Academy of Science, the Ohio Oil and Gas Energy Education Program, VEX Robotics, and many more.

Hosting this type of event on our campus provides an excellent opportunity for our staff to see a large variety of learning options and educational technology tools in a cost-effective way for the district. Sending an educator to a typical conference can cost over \$1000 when travel, registration, meals, and hiring a substitute are considered. By hosting the Ohio Technology Summit at RV, these expenses were significantly reduced, and we could invite staff from other districts to attend and participate in the learning experience.



From the response of our staff, it seems like this new format was well received. One teacher shared, "I loved the interactive seminars! I loved the different types of presenters. I am not confident in technology, but this summit gave me SO many awesome ideas!" Another person commented, "Best PD we've had in a very long time!" Our goal is to ensure our professional development is a meaningful experience for our staff that improves learning and the classroom environment. The Ohio Technology Summit is one way for us to get that done efficiently and effectively.
