Superintendent's Message

Fairless Community,

It is truly a great day to be a Falcon! Happy Fall to each of you, and I hope this newsletter finds you well. The 2020-21 school year is off to a great start, considering we are in the midst of the COVID pandemic. We are so happy to have the children back in our buildings again, even with the many pandemic protocols and procedures we have in place. I am so proud of the efforts by the staff to create an environment within our buildings that is accepting and warm for our students. I cannot say enough about how our students are being very strong, resilient and consistently wearing their face coverings. They are doing an outstanding job adapting to all of the new procedures. We are going to overcome this pandemic, and there will be a day when ALL of our students are back in our classrooms, without face coverings, and beaming smiles. Approximately 80% of our students are in our school buildings face-to-face each day, and 20% are being served through our digital academy. Our digital students are also being served by Fairless teachers.

All of our fall sports teams are engaged in their seasons. We do wish that we could be fully open for all fans to come and cheer on our student athletes, but this too will happen again. We have been successful in providing live streaming of our Fairless events, due to attendance restrictions. Our school district is in the midst of constructing new facilities. This is a very exciting time for the students and community. We continue with plans for the new high school, and are still on track to begin construction in the spring of 2021. Some highlights on the new high school; student parking and drop-off will be in the front of the building, and bus drop-off and staff parking will be in the back of the building. An auxiliary athletic wing will include a weight room, wrestling room, auxiliary gymnasium, locker rooms for stadium events, public restrooms, and concessions. These additional facilities will also be available to serve our Fairless Youth programs. The building will also have an auditorium with state-of-the-art lighting, stage rigging, dressing rooms, scene shop and direct backstage access from the vocal and instrumental music classrooms. Completion of the new high school is set for late fall 2022.

Due to the location of the new high school, we needed to find a new location for the baseball field. A new Terry "1" Griffith Baseball Complex is being constructed behind Fairless Elementary. This new complex will feature fan seating, press box, concessions, home and visitor dugouts and equipment storage. The new field will not be completed in time for the 2021 season, so we are making other provisions for next season.

I wish you a great fall, and look forward to updating you in the winter newsletter.

FREE LUNCHES FOR ALL STUDENTS



Several months ago, when the Coronavirus pandemic began causing closures across our community, the Fairless Alumni Association & Fairless Helping Fairless Board of Directors made the decision that now is the time to give, not ask. We believe that now, more than ever, our local businesses, sponsors, donors, and supportors who have given so much to the Fairless community need us to be there for them. With your help, over the last ten years the Fairless Alumni Association & Fairless Helping Fairless has been able to give back \$280,000 to our community During the pandemic, we worked hard to make sure that our financial resources were stretched as far as possible while still serving our core mission. Since March, with all of your support and financial help, we have been able to support the Fairless community in the following ways:

- 1.) Invested \$6,100 in direct food aid to families which will continue through this summer.

We had a weeklong agenda of activities aimed at promoting


