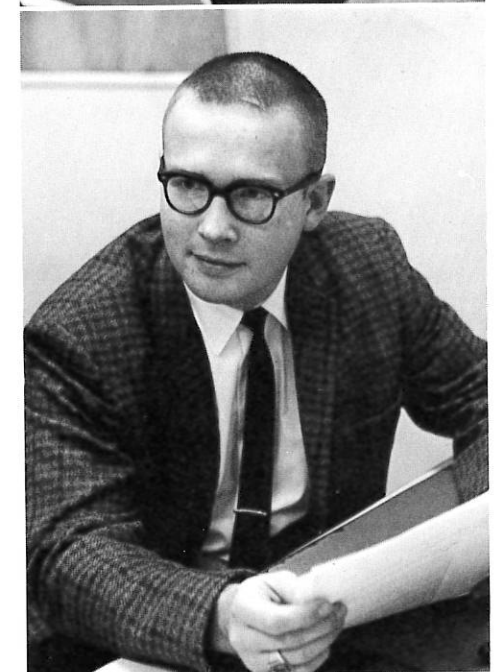
Special services play an important roll in student's academic life at FLHS.

BUSINESS EDUCATION MEANS A BRIGHTER FUTURE

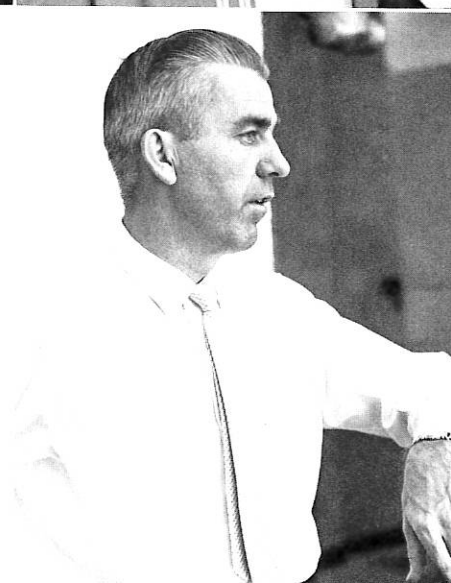
Because many students will enter the business world after graduation, FLHS has a large commercial department to prepare students for office jobs.

Freshmen are required to take a half year of business relations and the second half of the year is devoted to the fundamentals of typing. The advanced typing course is offered for students wishing to increase their skill and accuracy.

Office Practices further develops a student's typewriting ability in addition to teaching him to operate business machines such as the adding machine, mimeograph, calculator, and dictaphone.

A two year shorthand course is offered for students who wish to get the better secretarial jobs after graduation.

Bookkeeping is another commercial course for students aspiring to be accountants. Throughout the year, two practice sets are completed where the fundamentals of keeping journals for large companies are learned.

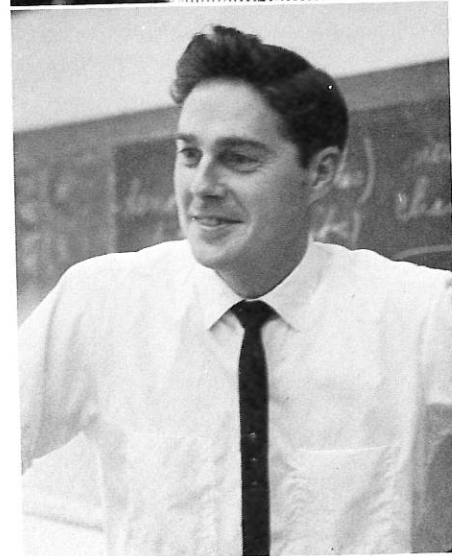

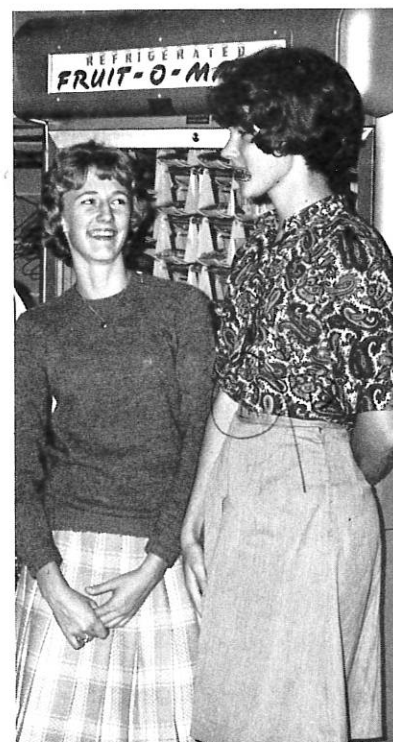
Other than English, two languages are offered at FLHS. They are Spanish and Latin.

SKILL WITH TOOLS MEANS A PROSPEROUS FUTURE

Industrial art courses, offered to boys in junior and senior high school, prepare them for the future by teaching them basic skills.

In the seventh grade, boys are required to take industrial arts, where they learn to work with leather, plastics, metal tooling, and drawing.

Eighth graders learn, for the first time, the fundamentals of electricity and its applications, along with woodwork, drawing, and crafts.

The freshmen acquire added skills in industrial arts by spending a third of the year working with the machines, and learning how to use them properly. The next twelve weeks are used to further the students' knowledge of electricity. The remaining third of the year is spent in drawing.

Senior high students are offered a choice of various shops. They become more familiar with the use of machines. They may study general metals, which includes lathe and bench metal work, or architectural drawing, or cabinet building. Advanced students may even design to scale a model of their favorite home.

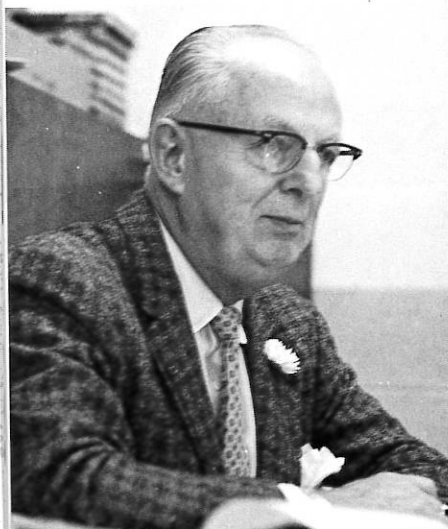

Preparing students for the problems of future participation in world affairs is the task of the social studies teachers at FLHS. Students are given an understanding of the past, present, and future problems of the world.

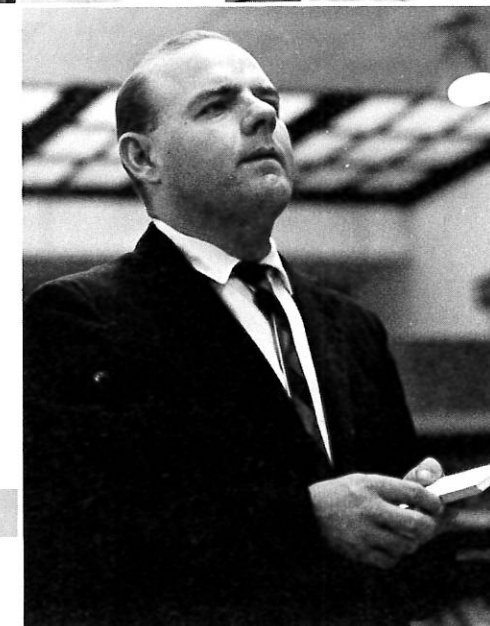
All grades, with the exception of nine and eleven, were required to enroll in different phases of social studies.

An elective course, World History and Affairs I, is offered to juniors and may be followed up by a second year of study. A social science course is required of all students in their senior year.

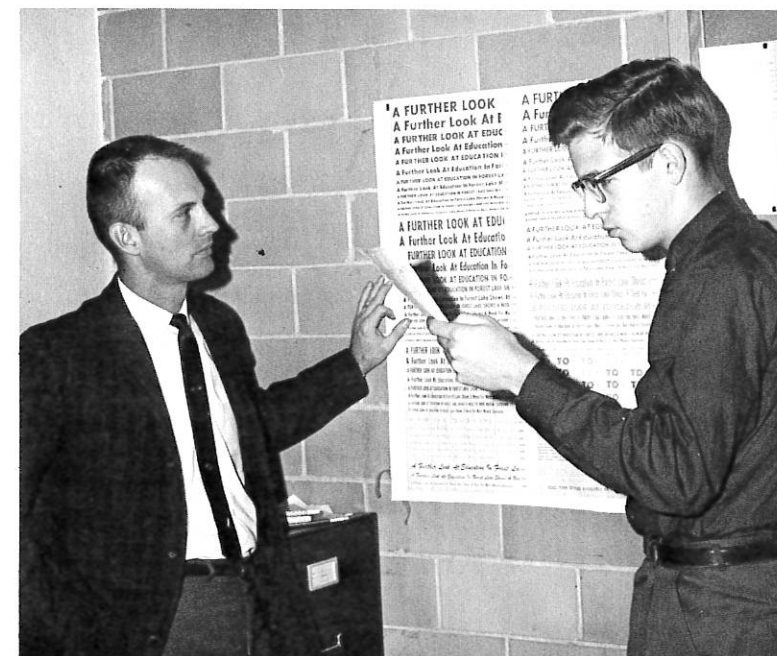

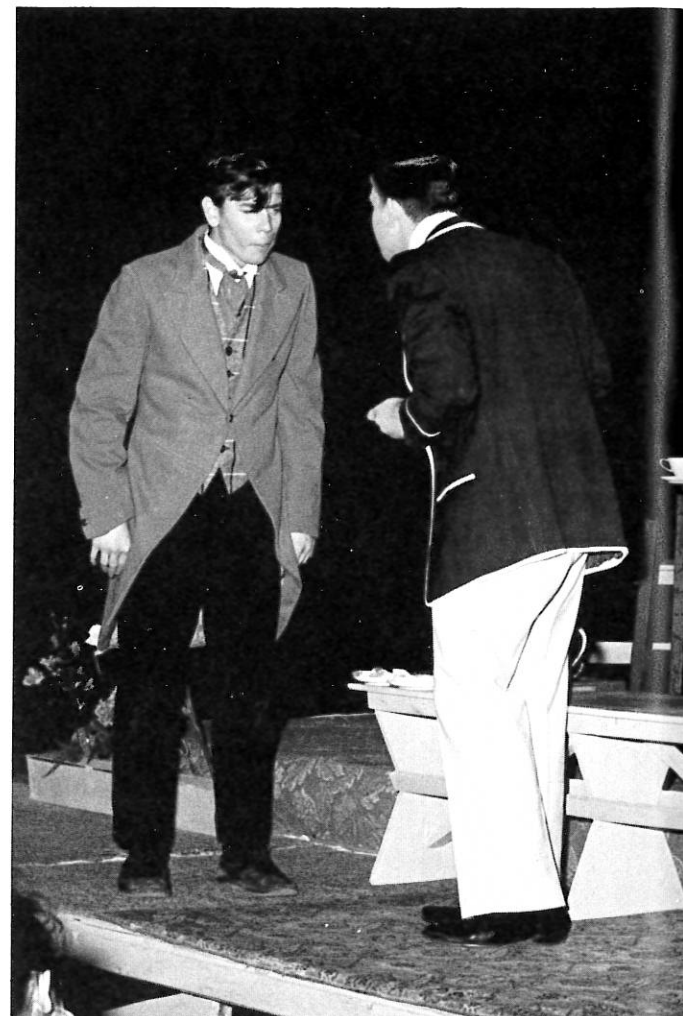

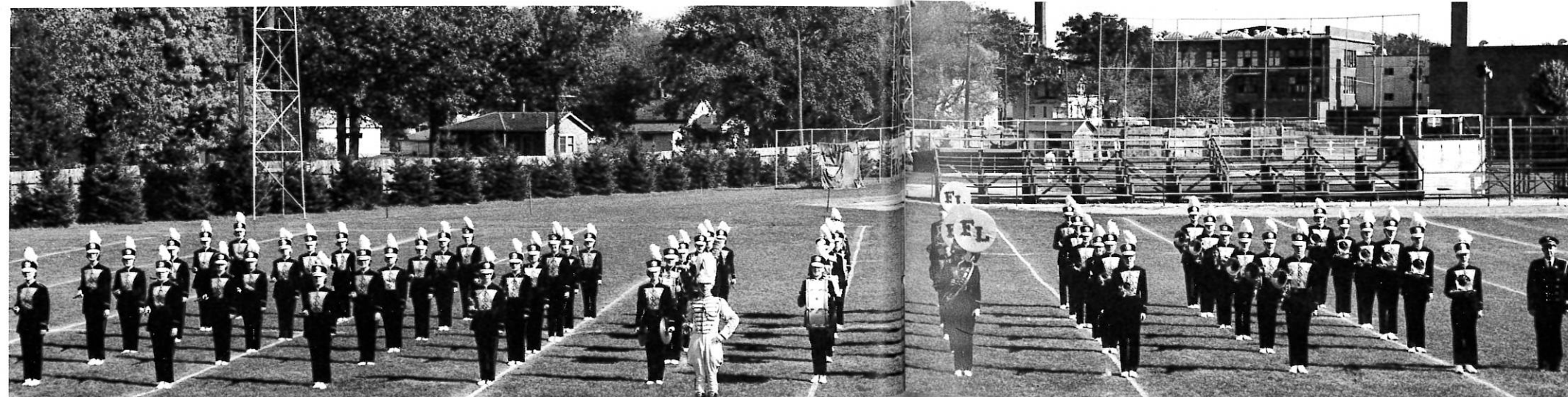

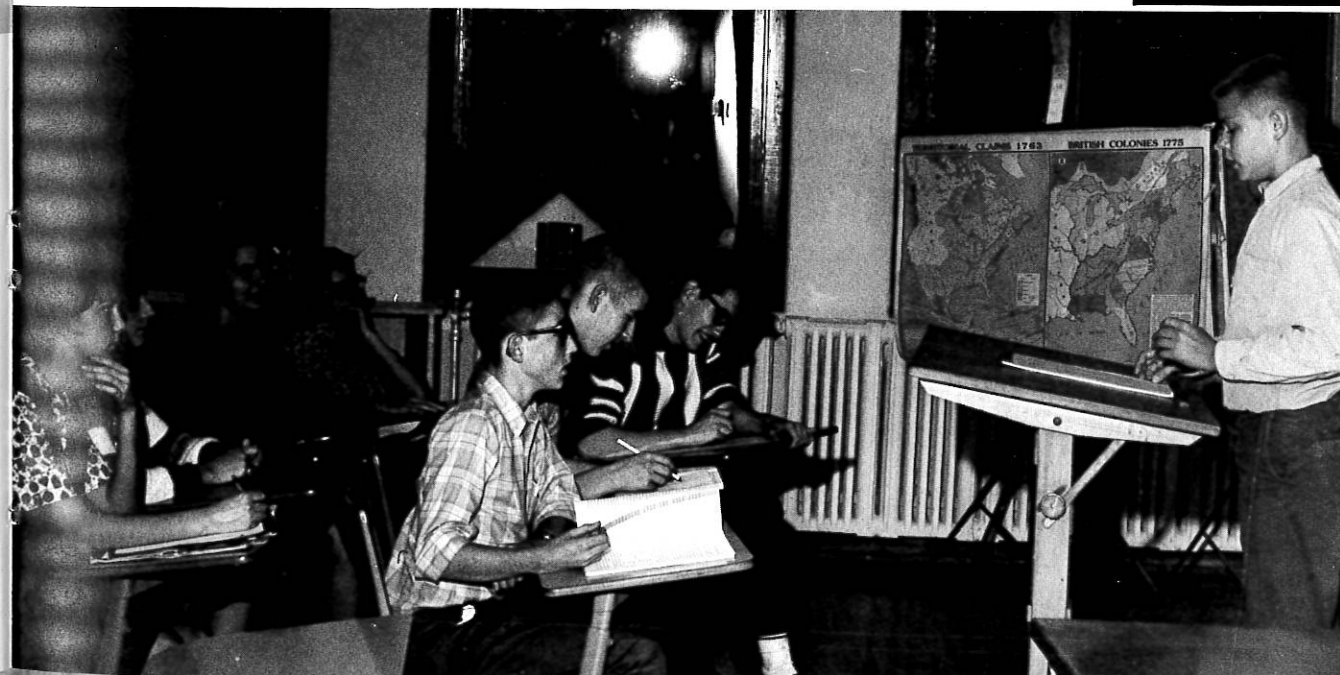

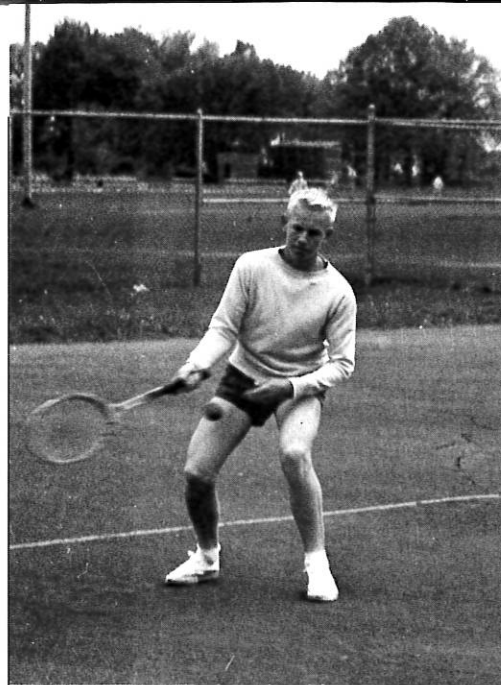

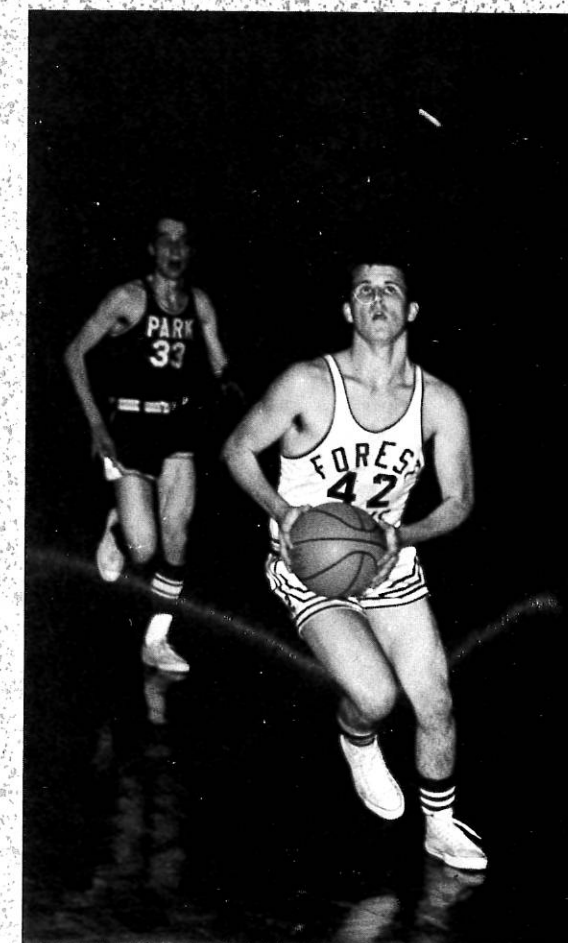
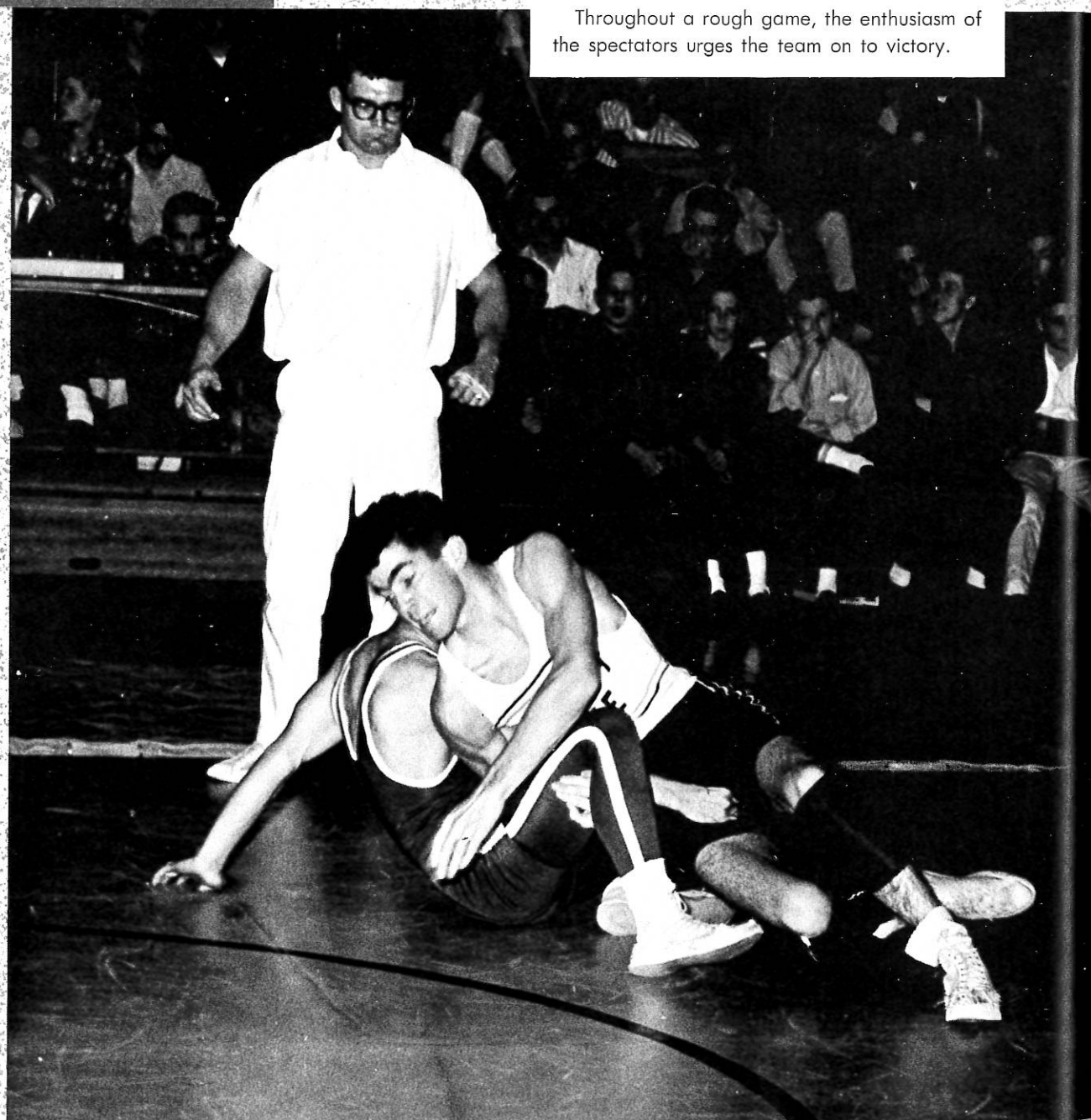
Athletics begin with the opening of football training in August and end late in the spring with baseball. During the months of school, a boy may participate in a variety of sports.

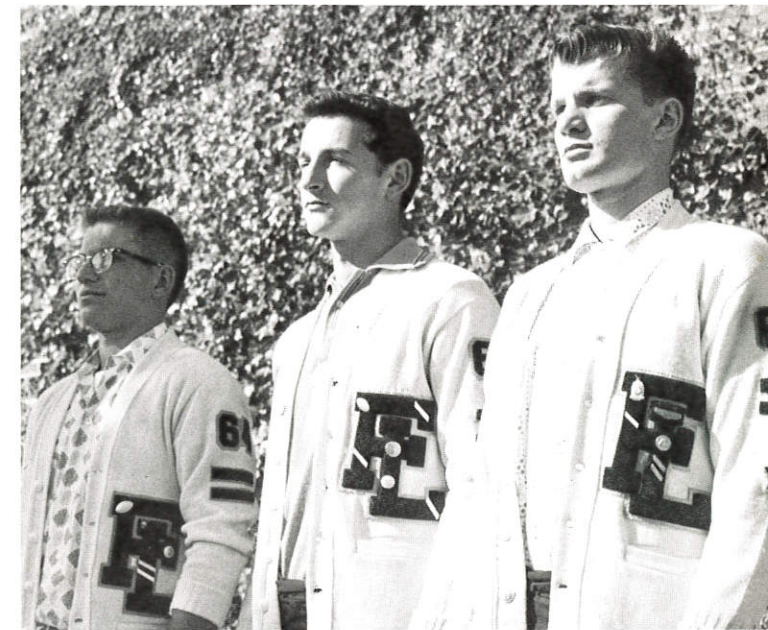

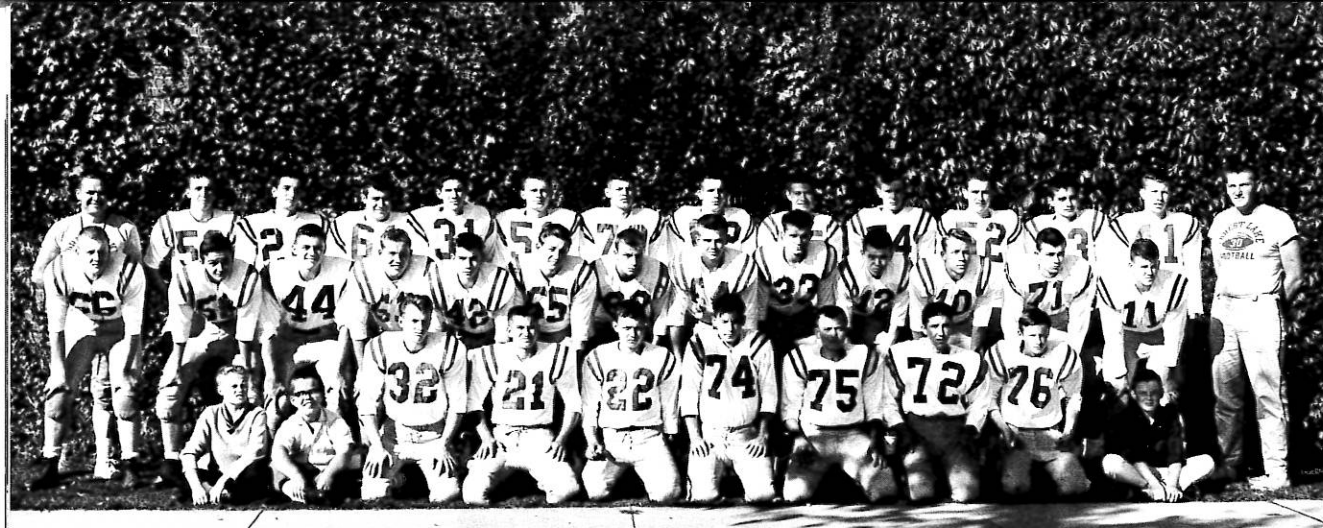
The outstanding runner on the squad was Andy Kauls. In the district meet, Andy placed second in the half-mile run.

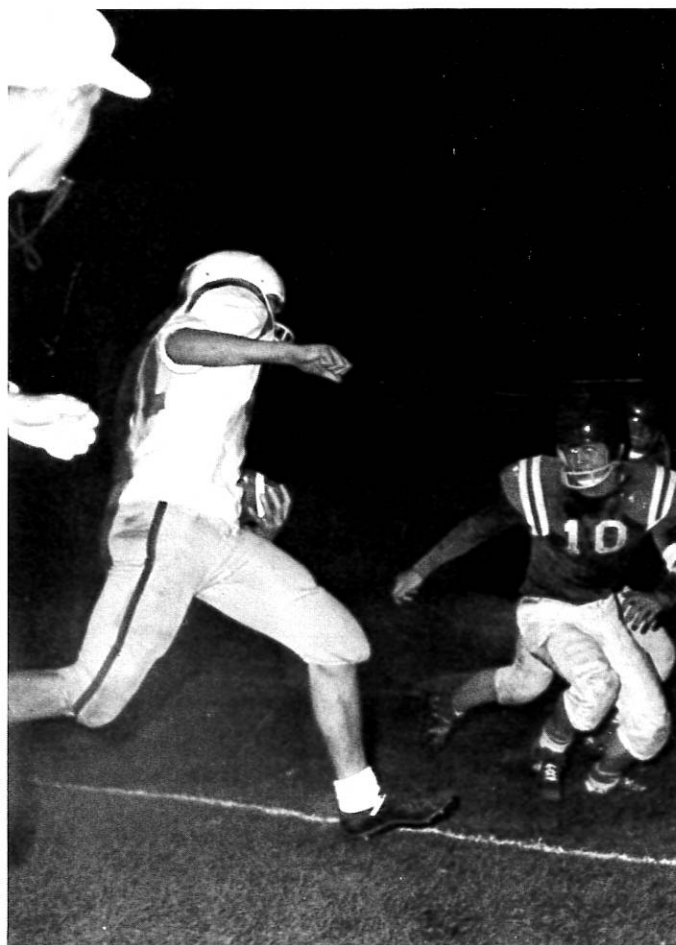

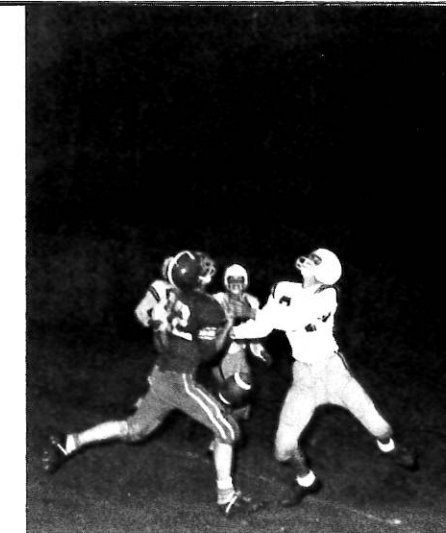

The '63-'64 wrestling team followed the pattern set in previous years with strong contenders in the lightweight and heavyweight divisions.

Highlighting the year was the District 25 tournament in which the Rangers pulverized all opposition. By taking eight individual championships, the wrestlers earned 108 points, 34 more than the nearest rival, Lindstrom-Center City. Ninety-pounder Mike Niemczyk set a team record while copping his champion's laurel. After pinning his first opponent, he decisioned the second with a fantastic 20-0 score.

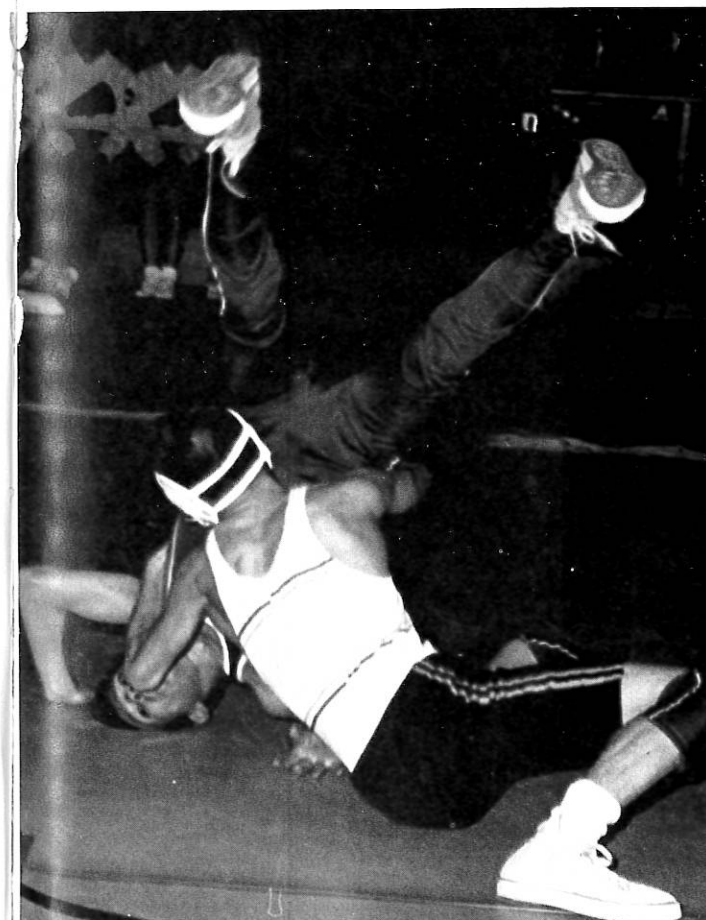

In earning a 5-3 record in dual meets for the year, Coach Matteson had many individual standouts. Besides Mike Niemczyk and Bob Westby, Paul Houle, Jerry Lundberg, Dick Cruse and Randy Schneider all turned in winning records.

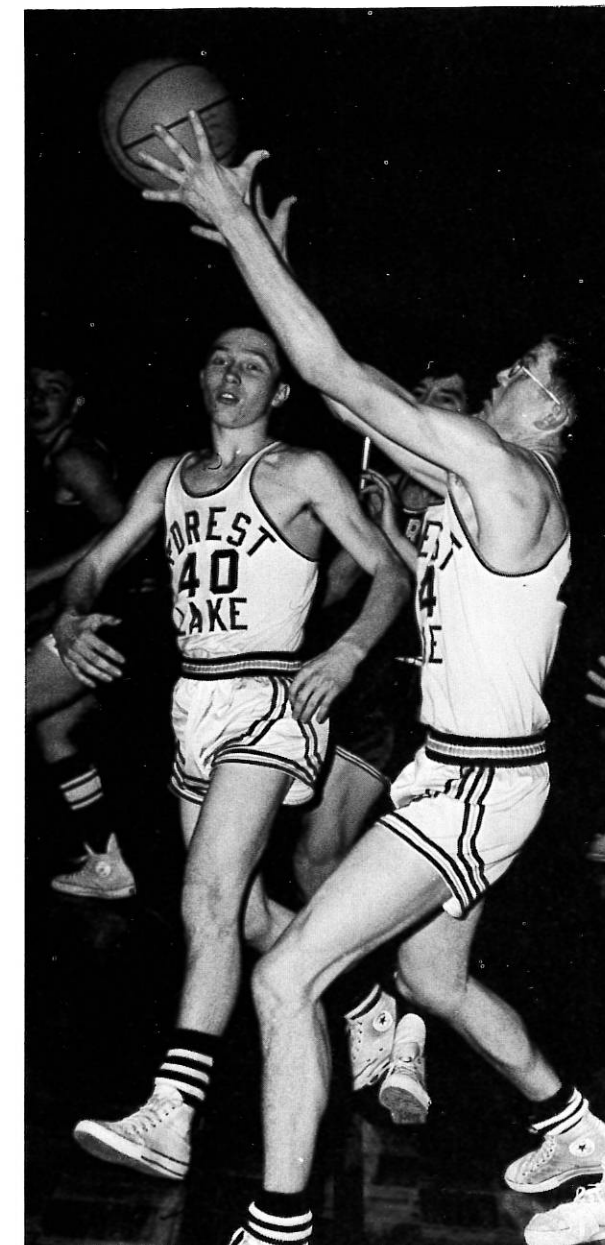
