







We straddle a mental tightrope



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


Too much to do . . . and no time to do it


As spring approached, we looked forward to commencement and graduation parties. But the realization that it is hard to say


good-bye began to hit home. For some, saying good-bye seemed like too much of a concluding statement.



Futures are what we dream of when we're young, try to put off when we're getting along in age, and what we're either deathly afraid of or anxiously awaiting when we're in high school.






On the other hand, a few students mentioned that time seemed to be going so slow, that they were just counting off the quarters until they could "get out of here."



Seniors log 3000 hours

The students have a few suggestions of their own on how to make the class more interesting, such as: wider variety of activities, more group work, watch more movies, no overheads.


It is in our interest that both teachers and students realize the long struggle with boredom. Also, realizing the difference in the opinions of teachers and students.


Debaters move on to Forensic nationals




Fear, Stress Drive Sophomores

Carleen Onell, the yearbook advisor.


