"Eating disorders are a problem," said Heather Karstens, the nurse at Forest Lake High school. "Many students don't eat lunch at school, and don't eat at home. It's not frequent, but maybe once a month I will get someone who has an eating disorder."

Eating disorders are a growing issue. In fact, research suggests that about one percent of female adolescents have anorexia, the most common eating disorder. That means that about one out of every one hundred young women between ages of 10 and 20 are starving themselves. According to Raderprograms.com, Anorexia is a disorder where there is a restriction of food and the refusal to keep a minimal normal body weight. Any gain or thought of gaining weight is extremely feared. Other common disorders are bulimia, being overweight, obesity, and binge eating.

eating disorders, according to statistics at Raderprograms.com. More than half of teenage girls are, or think they should be, on diets. They want to lose all or some of the forty pounds that females naturally gain between 8 and 14. About three percent of these teens go too far, becoming

"It's not a mental health issue per se. It's a disease - much like diabetes - and it needs treatment," said Roust.

The media also plays a big part in

anorexic or bulimic.

"I think it's a problem because you see in the media, celebrities who have eating disorders; people think that if they're like a celebrity then they will be like by other people," said senior Shannon Sneep.

"The majority of the people I see with disorders are mostly tenth grade girls," says Karstens. "They will come in and they don't feel well, because they don't eat."

Roust suggests that if you know someone with an eating disorder, keep talking to them.

"If you confront someone with an eating disorder too much, they may shut down," said Roust. "Encourage them to find a trusted adult to tell and to get some help. There's no Band-Aid or quick fix solution for eating disorders. A good place to start is your doctor. Since eating disorders can damage the entire body, a doctor can perform a complete physical to make sure no damage has already been done."

Any teacher will tell you good sources are very important. From a research paper to an AP English project, solid sources are essential for a well-written assignment.

Many sources, especially websites, can be misleading and may not even relate to your topic. So here are some important issues to consider when researching:

The URL (Uniform Resource Locator) tell you <u>a lot.</u>

A URL indicates what kind of website you're looking at. A web page created by an individual

Two other important parts are the date and the author's credentials. Make sure a source is up to date. Depending on the type of research being done, the date may or may not be a concern however. The author's credentials are essential in finding a good source. Anyone can put anything on the internet, so this takes some common sense as well. Does the content seem like it is written by someone qualified to write on this topic? Wikipedia, an online encyclopedia, is a perfect example. Anyone can add information to any topic, whether it is truthful or completely made up.

What Do Others Say?

To find out if other websites link to a specific site, alexa.com is a great tool. Just paste the URL in the search box, and alexa.com will show the traffic rank, subjective reviews, site statistics, and contact information for the domain name. Another way to find out what types of websites link to a certain site is to use a link: search in either Google or Yahoo! To do this, type link: in the search box, followed by the URL of the page you're investigating.

The World Wide Web can be a great place to accomplish research on many topics. But putting documents or pages on the web is easy, cheap or free, unregulated, and unmonitored (at least in the United States). Documents are easily copied and/or falsified and errors could be intentional or accidental. The burden is on you, the reader, to establish the validity, authorship, timeliness, and integrity of what you find on the world-wide web.

The Minnesota Department of Safety gives some reminders when it comes to winter driving; Drive below the posted speed limit when road conditions are less than ideal - speed limits are intended for normal pavement conditions. Turn on lights to see and be seen. Keep lights clear of snow. Avoid using cruise control in winter driving conditions - don't let the cruise control make a bad decision for you. If your car is equipped with anti-lock brakes, understand how to use them and what to expect when the

Travel prepared; make sure your vehicle is in good working order. Tires should be in good condition for maximum traction. It's always a good your vehicle with winter items. Keep your windshield washer fluids full and have good

wiper blades so you can keep the windshield clear. Keep plenty of fuel in the tank. You never know when you may be delayed or stranded.

In addition, learn how to park. Even after a mild dusting of snow, cars are parked haphazardly in the student lot and pose a danger to other vehicles. They either jut out too far, park at such an angle that another car can't get out, or sometimes park with more




