Students are given the opportunity to get out of Forest Lake and visit three countries in Europe. The trip, however, is more than just a vacation. The 51 students make up the Forest Lake High School Wind Band and will be performing in front of live audiences all over the continent.

Students have been practicing there music pieces all year for this trip. Most of the music originated from Europe; however the band intends to also play some American selections as well. Elle McGee, senior and first chair Alto Saxophone, commented that "The music is semi-challenging."

Timothy Endorf, senior and first chair trombone, will be performing Elegy for Mippy II, by Leonard Bernstein by himself in an unaccompanied solo during the concerts.

"I'm definitely nervous about it," said Endorf.

The trip starts out on March 27, right after school gets out, and after a long international flight, students will eventually arrive in Frankfurt, Germany. From there, students will be venturing to Salzburg, Austria and to many other cities in Italy, such as Florence, Venice. Finally they will finish the trip back in Germany to tour the country before back home.

Students will be accompanied by chaperones as they go sight seeing and are moving about the three countries where they will get to experience European culture to its fullest. Another exciting part of the trip is that students will get to stay a day as a guest of a local German family.





Spring Break scoop

Love spring break? The proposed calendar for next year has no traditional spring break included. Instead, the school board is proposing a calendar with two weeks at Christmas.

According to several school board members, the thinking behind this is if there is a spring break, then school would go into the second week of June. In the last thirteen years since any of the seniors have been in school, it has gone into the second week of June not once, but six times. In each of these years, the total amount of days off has been an average of 18.31. This year, there are 18.

"There is a spring break," said Superintendent Lynn Steenblock in a phone interview, "It's the April 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13." Included in those dates are

Good Friday and Easter Sunday. School board member, Eric Langness commented on the loss of spring break in an e-mail.

"You will likely see me argue the points of vacation importance and teachers need to reenergize," said Langness.

Two of the other board members who agree with Langness are Julie Corcoran and David Gay. In a recent e-mail Corcoran said, "At the meeting last week, I did challenge the proposed calendar. I am working with the Board Members and administration to see what compromise can be made so we can still have a Spring Break."

School board members are

not the ones who actually draw up the calendar for each year, but they do help decide which calendar they feel will benefit the students, staff, and their families the most. There are other calendars that were proposed, but none that worked as well as the calendar without spring break.

"Absolutely [there are other calendars]. We have calendar A, calendar B, calendar B1, calendar B2, calendar C and that's all we have," said Steenblock.

These calendars were not used for various reasons, including going to school on Christmas Eve, or going to school after graduation, neither of which would have worked well. "Board Members did not see the calendar until last week [when it was proposed]. We are not involved with the planning of the calendar," said Corcoran. "I am not in favor of cutting spring break and I do not think the other board members are either, but the school calendar is not just about spring break," said Board Member Dan Kieger.

"This calendar seemed to be the calendar that met most of the scenarios," Steenblock said.

The other calendars that were drawn up were not officially shown to the school board but were in fact drawn up. "I think that the best thing [to do] is have your parents and the students e-mail the other Board Members," said Corcoran.

Psychology of Childhood is a one-quarter class offered to 10-12 graders. In this class, students operate a playschool program for 3-5 year olds. Students plan and teach the playschool children. In the few weeks before the playschool children start coming, students explore the areas of physical, intellectual, social, and emotional development in children.

"This class is unique because students have a hands-on experience learning about children," said Leslie Heidel, Psychology of Childhood teacher, "and it's not necessarily designed for people who want to go into child care or education careers."

In this class, students also study theories of many professional child psychologists and learn how to make and write out teaching count as a college credit if you take Exploring Childhood A and B. "People from the community look to it as a good, solid program," said Heidel.

Media

Media is a one-quarter class that studies, interprets, and analyzes television, newspapers, magazines, the internet, and film. Students learn about the elements and structure of forms of media.

"It's unique because instead of using the media to study other subjects, we're studying the media itself," said Media teacher Robyn Madson. Paul Wieland, another Media teacher, says that students should take this class because it offers a variety of interest and it's a challenge. "It doesn't look at typical English

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


sex really worth the risk? If you aren't ready to have

Technology is expensive for schools and a great example is the SMARTboard. SMARTboards can cost upwards of \$3,000. The entire cost of installation and parts here at FLHS is \$3,400. That's a tough bill to swallow for any public school. The question is, is a SMARTboard worth the steep price? FLHS currently has a total of four SMARTboards. Only one of them has been purchased by the school as a whole. Finally, the good stuff...the tooth. If you haven't noticed from the picture, Narwhals have a long tooth/tusk protruding from their forehead. These things can


