INCOMING 9TH GRADE STEEL DRUMS AUDITIONS FOR 2023-2024

Audition Requirements for Students Who Play

Drum Set, Percussion, Electric/Acoustic Guitar, Bass Guitar, Piano, or Woodwinds/Brass

March 27, 28, and 29, 2023, 4:30-6:30 pm

(in person at SMCHS)

Drum Set

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Demonstrate a minimum of two grooves or beats, contrasting styles preferred if possible (i.e., rock and jazz, RnB and reggae, etc.)
 - i. Can play with or without a recording
 - ii. If playing with a recording, please email Ms. Duncan ahead of time with the song title, and have a recording ready on a device when you come for your audition

2. Technique

- a. Demonstrate the following on snare drum:
 - i. Closed roll/buzz roll/multiple bounce roll
 - ii. Rudiments: flam, drag, single paradiddle
- b. Any other technique you wish to demo (brushes, double-kick pedal)
- 3. Sightreading
 - a. Sightread a musical excerpt on snare drum at quarter note=60 BPM
 - b. If possible, sightread a fully-notated drum set musical excerpt, quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards

^{*}Drum set players may also demonstrate their abilities on marimba, xylophone, piano, or other melodic instrument (not required)

Percussion (snare drum and 2-mallets)

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Perform a solo piece that best demonstrates your musical and technical skills
 - i. Either on snare drum or marimba/xylophone, two mallets (your choice)
- 2. Technique
 - a. Two major scales of your choice, two octaves (play on marimba or xylophone)
 - b. <u>C chromatic scale</u>, two octaves (play on marimba or xylophone)
 - i. Note: in the video link above, the video only shows one octave you need to play TWO octaves
 - c. Play all scales as eighth notes
 - d. Tempo: quarter note=80 BPM
- 3. Sightreading
 - a. Sightread a short musical excerpt on marimba, quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards

*Percussionists may also demonstrate their abilities on drum set if they wish (not required)

Electric or Acoustic Guitar

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Perform a song or piece that best demonstrates your musical abilities
 - b. Need to demonstrate both strumming ability (playing chords) and your ability to play a single melodic line (one note at a time)
 - c. Can play with or without a recording
 - i. If playing with a recording, please email Ms. Duncan ahead of time with the song title, and have a recording ready on a device when you come for your audition
- 2. Technique
 - a. Strum a standard chord progression in any key (your choice)
 - b. Examples:
 - i. 12-bar blues
 - ii. <u>I-IV-V-IV</u>
 - iii. Other common progression
- 3. Sightreading/Sight-"hearing"/Rote Playing
 - a. Learn a new strumming pattern, using a common Caribbean rhythm that you'll learn in your audition, and using the following chords:
 - i. G major C major D- G major (I-IV-V-I in G major)
 - b. Sightread a simple single melodic line (reading musical notation), quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards

Electric or Upright Bass

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Perform a song or piece that best demonstrates your musical abilities
 - b. Can play with or without a recording
 - i. If playing with a recording, please email Ms. Duncan ahead of time with the song title, and have a recording ready on a device when you come for your audition

2. Technique

- a. Demonstrate a standard chord progression in a key of your choice, such as:
 - i. 12 bar blues
 - ii. I-IV-V-IV
 - iii. Other common progression
- b. Demonstrate walking bass technique, if possible
- 3. Sightreading/Sight-"hearing"/Rote Playing
 - a. Learn a new bass pattern using a common Caribbean rhythm that you'll learn in your audition, and using the following chords:
 - i. G major C major D7 G major (I-IV-V-I in G major)
 - b. Sightread a simple single melodic line (reading musical notation), quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards

<u>Piano</u>

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Perform a solo piece that best demonstrates your musical abilities
- 2. Technique
 - a. Two major scales of your choice (both hands at the same time), two octaves each
 - b. C chromatic scale, two octaves (both hands at the same time)
- 3. Sightreading
 - a. Sightread a short musical excerpt, quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards

Woodwinds and Brass

- 1. Musicality
 - a. Perform a solo piece that best demonstrates your musical ability
 - b. This can be a piece from your school band program, or something you've learned in private lessons
- 2. Technique
 - a. Two major scales of your choice, one octave each
 - b. C chromatic scale, one octave
- 3. Sightreading
 - a. Sightread a short musical excerpt, quarter note=60 BPM
- 4. Rhythmic Coordination
 - a. Learn a coordination exercise that combines stepping, clapping, and moving forwards and backwards
