## Assistive Technology at MSA

Assistive Technology is any item, piece of equipment, software program, or product system that helps people who have difficulty speaking, typing, writing, remembering, pointing, seeing, hearing, learning, and many other things. Last year, Mill Springs implemented three important assistive technology programs to assist students in reaching their full learning potential.



### Read&Write

MSA invested in the Read&Write assistive technology suite due to its “all in one” toolbar approach to accessibility. Students can use a variety of tools to support their learning, such as read aloud, speech to text, word prediction, highlighting, screen masks, and more. Our students are using the Google Chrome extension, and we also have the Windows software on our laptops.

### Learning Ally

The Learning Ally app is designed to support literacy for students with dyslexia. Students at MSA have access to thousands of audiobooks through Learning Ally. Teachers can assign reading, track progress, and more using this tool. Many of the audiobooks come with the e-book so that the student can visually follow along while they listen.

# Upper School Building Suffers Water Damage

Over Winter Break, Slayden Hall (which houses the Upper and Communication Arts communities) experienced a burst pipe and subsequent flooding due to the freezing temperatures. MSA's Facilities Technician, Cooper Neff, drove to the school to cut off the water and survey the damage. Faculty members Judy and Jim Norris headed straight for the coral lab to try and save as many fish and coral as they could manage. The school is grateful to have connected and secured a contract with Full Circle Restoration to assist in restoring and rebuilding much of the inside of Slayden Hall.

Upper School students' return to campus for the spring semester was delayed by a few days in order for faculty and staff to move and set up new classroom spaces around campus. When students returned, they were given tours of the classroom locations, and everyone settled into the new schedule.

## **Q. When did you join the MSA family?**

*Brady started at Mill Springs in the fall of 2021 as a 6th grader. While restrictions were beginning to lift, we were still very much in the height of Covid protocols w/ masking and contact tracing. ## **Q. What was your first impression of MSA?**

*We loved the small classes and the involvement of each teacher in the child's academic success. The administration took the time to get to know Brady and our family to make sure it would be a good fit. Brady's shadow day was especially helpful in providing Brady with a sense of what MSA would be like.*

## **Q. As parents, what are your favorite parts about MSA?**

*Brady has never been super sporty, but with all the options and encouragement of staff and classmates, not only did Brady participate in track for the first time last spring, he is also doing yoga and is a current member of the rock climbing team (and loves them both). Last year Brady really enjoyed art w/ Miss Janet and hopes to be able to work on some theater set productions in the future.*

**Q. What does Brady enjoy about MSA?**

*Brady enjoys feeling like he's part of the MSA family. Everyone knows everyone, is encouraging and holds each other accountable. Brady enjoys being able to be himself and knowing there are friends and classmates who face similar challenges, and they are all there for each other.*

**Q. What do you value about MSA and/or your child's educational experience?**

*Someone told me shortly after I had kids that, "You're only as happy as your least happy child. Brady is so happy here at MSA, and that makes our entire family happy as well!"*

**Q. Why do you feel it is important to donate to MSA?**

*Giving to Mill Springs is important to us because without generous donations from others, there would not have been such a wonderful place for any of us to send our children. Many before us believed in what the MSA mission was and donated to help that become a reality for so many deserving kids. Mill Springs has made Brady feel confident, smart, and a part of something wonderful!*





### Gothel



Ms. Shilpee taught her literature classes, which she credits as strengthening her writing and presentation skills. Ms. Kate and Mr. Patrick taught Nicole theater, which helped build her confidence and helped her express herself in front of other people.




