Dear Blue Devil Families,

We made it through 2020! The year of Covid has certainly changed our day to day lives, but the one thing that hasn't changed during the pandemic is our commitment to provide children with a high-quality education in a safe learning environment.

I would like to personally thank our students and families for being so flexible this school year. This understanding and partnership allowed for a seamless transition to remote learning after Thanksgiving break. I also want to recognize our teachers and staff for their commitment to delivering a rigorous education in the classroom and online for students. Our teachers are a shining example of what dedication is, and they go above and beyond to meet the needs of students. They've also provided a sense of normalcy for students during an uncertain time. The entire Lisbon Exempted Village School District staff has been instrumental in re-enforcing health and safety measures with students daily. Teachers have also been creative in incorporating these measures into class lessons. Mrs. Lane at DAHS taught her students how to sew masks, blending in math skills such as standard and metric units of measurement and decimals.

Chromebooks went home with students when the district went to remote learning November 30- December 4. Chromebooks for kindergarten and first grade were ordered in the summer, but are still on backorder.

Lisbon Exempted Village Schools Food Distribution

"We love our kids," said Melissa Adams, Food Service Director, Lisbon Exempted Village Schools.

Today, Adams and her team, along with other district staff loaded up buses full of food to distribute to families while students are on remote learning.

Bags of food included five breakfasts and five lunches for every student. 100 bags were packed for



curbside pickup at David Anderson Junior/Senior High School, and 100 bags were also packed for curbside pickup at McKinley Elementary.

The district also has three curbside pickup locations throughout Lisbon. Those sites are the Lisbon Baseball/ Softball Complex, Roseland Apartments and the Juvenile Justice Center Parking Lot. Buses transported bags of food to these locations.



"That is a total of 600 meals per day, so for the week 3,000 meals," said Adams.

The district offered curbside pick at both school buildings, as well as different locations throughout Lisbon when the schools were shut down in the spring.

Veteran's Day

The Lisbon Exempted Village School District honored veterans with a virtual Veterans Day program. The district put together a video to thank veterans, the video including short messages of appreciation from students at McKinley Elementary and DAHS and patriotic artwork from both buildings. Students in Mrs. Wrask's social studies class at DAHS wrote letters of thanks to veterans, they also spelled out the word veteran, and listed attributes that make up each letter that spell out veteran.



Handwashing Stations

Portable touchless hand washing stations are the newest health and safety measure at Lisbon Exempted Village Schools.

Each station can do 120 hand washes in 10 minutes. That breaks down to 360 washes every half hour and 720 washes every hour.

The touchless hand washing stations have four sinks equipped with soap and paper towels. The unit at DAHS is stationed in the lobby. Students will wash their hands



when they enter the building. Anyone who comes to the high school gym for athletic events will also use the hand washing station. The unit at McKinley Elementary is in the cafeteria.

The Quad-Sink Handwashing Station is designed and developed by <u>Personal Protected</u>, a company in New Middletown. Several schools in the area also have the Quad-Sink Hand Washing Station.

Center Township used funding through the 2020 Federal Cares Act to purchase one of the units for the district. LEVSD purchased the other unit.




Soles of Love




Mrs. Lane's STEM Classes
