Z96.5 WAZY honors CCSC teachers back to back

CHS Mrs. Veatch and CMS Ms. Crane named Excellent Educators

Mrs. Veatch was recently the recipient of WAZY's Excellent Educator Award for the month of December. Veatch, biology teacher at Crawfordsville High School, was nominated by several people, but B-Adams read a favorite submission when he visited CHS to present Veatch with the award.

The submission read, "Mrs. Veatch has a beautiful soul. She radiates positivity and confidence, but also instills self confidence into her students. She is the most hands-on and motivated teacher to every student and past student. It's been 10 plus years since I was her student, and when she sees me in public she asks about my life and children. She expands her love and joy for life. I am a girl scout troop leader and for a badge requirement I asked her to be a guest speaker for the girls and she agreed with glee. We all love you beautiful lady!"

Veatch said she was shocked to receive the award and was very appreciative to hear the impact from a student from 10 years ago.

"I don't think people know that it's these little things that mean so much to teachers. We don't do this for the pay or for the glory. We do it because we love the kids. I can truly say that I LOVE coming to CHS every day (or I wouldn't still be here after 24 years!)," Veatch said.

Veatch's nomination came from former student Jennifer Hankins. Veatch recalls sharing conversations and being a listening ear and was honored to hear the impact made.

"It made my day to know that a student from 10 years ago was still thinking about my class and what I had done for her," Veatch said.

Veatch plans to speak to Hankins' Girl Scout troop and give a lesson on DNA.

"I'm so excited to see her and hopefully spark the interest of some budding young scientists. I guess in the end, I don't expect ALL of my students to go into science, but I want them to see how excited I am about the subject and how much I love my job so that they search out what makes them happy so they have a career they love as much as I do," Veatch said.

CHS Principal Jay Strickland praised Veatch for her impact.

"Mrs. Veatch is truly one of the finest teachers and leaders that I have worked with during my career as an educator. She is a top notch instructor, genuinely cares for all of her students and provides leadership in many areas at CHS. I am grateful to have her as a teammate at CHS and she has earned this honor with her hard work and dedication throughout her career as an educator," Strickland said.

WAZY recognizes a teacher each month from nominations. Veatch received a gift bag of items which included a \$100 gift card, Mike's car wash certificates, and at the end of the school year in June 2023, she will be entered to win a vacation package.

In a rare occasion and for the first time, WAZY made a return visit to Crawfordsville to honor a second teacher for the Excellent Educator award. This time the visit was to the middle school to highlight Ms. Crane, CMS language arts teacher as the January winner.

"I'm just really thankful and feel very blessed to have recognition. I know there are many teachers out there who deserve this award and it warms my heart that some of my own family members and my students' parents nominated me out of all the teachers they've known," Crane said about the award.

This is Ms. Crane's second year at CMS. "I put my heart into my job and I'm glad that the children and parents are seeing/ feeling that. I believe that being an Excellent Educator really starts with caring about the children, building good relationships, and supporting them to become





their best selves," she said. "Once a teacher does those three things, the academics will come easily and the children will enjoy learning alongside you."

Crane received a goodie bag that included a gift card, three National Geographic books, a subway lunch for one of her classes and for herself, and some various Z96.5 WAZY merchandise.

B-Adams read some of the comments on her nominations. "She cares deeply for her students. She is inspiring and very creative in finding new techniques in keeping her students motivated and wanting to learn."



The Athenian girls swimming and diving team competed at sectionals taking 2nd overall and will send five to state on Friday, Feb. 10.

Results included first place in the 200 Medley of Walker, Schmitzer-Torbert, Hesler, and Melevage; first place in the 200 Freestyle and 100 Fly for Sophia Melevage; Marie Hesler took first in the 500 Free; Guinevere Schmitzer-Torbert took first in the 100 Breaststroke; and the 200 Free Relay team of Melevage, Horton, Hesler, and Schmitzer-Torbert set the pool and school record in winning the relay.

Previously this season, the Athenian swimming and diving teams both won 2nd place in the Sagamore Athletic Conference Championships.

Junior Whitman Horton was the SAC champion in the 100 backstroke which broke three records including the conference, pool, and school records. His time of 50.88 broke Josh Mikesell's time from 1988.



Dr. Scott Bowling, Superintendent of Crawfordsville Schools, broached the idea to play in the old CHS gymnasium early this fall and after a few site visits to the old gym, it was determined that the game could take place with a little work in preparation for the game. "Crawfordsville Community School Corporation is excited to return to a facility that holds so many memories for our alumni and the entire community. There is something special about the old

gyms in the state of Indiana. We look forward to capturing some of that for one night on February 24."

The Feb. 24th game will be just two days short of the 30th anniversary of the Athenians' last game played on College Street. The Athenians fell 75-67 in overtime to the Greencastle Tiger Cubs on Feb. 26, 1993, before opening the new school in the fall of 1993.

The old Crawfordsville High School building was purchased in 2019 and remodeled by Iron Men Properties. Iron Men Properties

has completed similar projects to Memory Hall in Lebanon and the Nickel Plate Flats in Frankfort. Kimberly Foltz, Property Manager stated, "The Laurel Flats and Iron Men Properties are proud to be a part of

the Crawfordsville community. We are honored to have the opportunity to participate in an event that will bring residents of this great community together in a space where so many of them have fond memories of their past. We are looking forward to meeting those who were students and hearing the stories they have to share."

The maintenance staff at Iron Men Properties and SSC worked over the holiday break to get the facility looking great. The maintenance staff is still completing minor projects to get the gym ready for our game, including changing out light bulbs in the scoreboards, changing out a rim, scrubbing the



gym floor, repair of some bleachers, and other minor projects. Coach David Pierce and Covington Head Coach Evan Morgan, a 2009 Crawfordsville graduate, have been flexible throughout the process as their normal game routines will be tweaked because of playing in the facility. Coach Pierce commented, "We are extremely excited to play a nostalgia game in the old gymnasium. A plethora of people have had to work really hard behind the scenes to pull this event off. Having in-laws (Larry and Danny Dickerson), past teachers and coaches, and a player's dad (Matt McCarty) who have scored thousands of points in the old gym, it brings back tons of memories of what Indiana High School Basketball used to be. Our hope is that this game will allow friends and families of old to relive those memories that bring back the goosebumps of "gameday." Whether it was the cheerleaders, band, pep band or the players and teams, it is a chance to experience it one more

Bryce Barton, Director of

Athletics at Crawfordsville High School, had this to say about the game. "We are excited to put this game on for our players, coaches, alumni, and the community of Crawfordsville. Walking back into that gym over the last two months has brought about a lot of fond memories for me personally and I hope that our community shares similar feelings on February 24th. A lot of people have given up their time and effort to make this game possible and I am appreciative of those efforts. I am thrilled that our student-athletes get to play in the old gym. It should be a packed house and a fun environment. It will be a great tune-up for both teams as they enter sectional play the following week."
