Nicholson Garden Club harvests success

Students' hard work donates more than 1,000 pounds to food pantry

The Nicholson Summer Garden Club wrapped up the growing season in early October after a successful record year! The garden donated 1,009.75 pounds to the local Fish Food Pantry, which topped last year's amount, and that was even after the club students and their families were able to take home produce too.

The garden at Nicholson has grown since it started approximately 10 years ago by former music teacher, Jerilyn Yerkes, and her father. Jack Heuss. Yerkes said the students started seeds in the music room until they were ready to be transplanted. Yerkes and Heuss took care of the garden through the summers before the idea of a student summer club began. They also enlisted the help of Shelle Wheeler, first grade teacher at Hose, who often helped with planting in the spring. The summer club, when it started, typically included around 12 students and they were required to have an adult with them.

This year the garden club, which started planting in late May, has seen huge growth and was made up of more than 50 students. During the summer on Tuesdays and Thursdays, students, along with a parent participant, came to the garden

for planting and maintenance of the garden area. In addition to parents helping, the Montgomery County Master Gardeners are a key support to the garden project.

Yerkes and Wheeler sought the help of Master Gardeners in 2017 and have since been an integral part of the garden.

Yerkes said, "The Master Gardeners have been invaluable help!" They typically help with planting in the spring and during COVID they planted and tended throughout the summer too because of low student participation.

Through the club, students learn so much about the entire process including information on garden tools, planting seeds and plants, how to improve the soil with composted leaf mulch and putting down newspaper, and, the most fun activity, harvesting.

The students ultimately "learned about how when working together we can accomplish most anything in the garden," said Yerkes.

Yerkes said the favorite activity was harvesting the tomatoes, green beans, peppers, peas, potatoes, and strawberries. The students were able to reap great rewards after a lot of

hard work and some less-thanfun tasks that required consistency especially on hot summer days. It was the challenge and often dreaded task of watering the garden. Yerkes said the necessary task took several adults to pull three hoses, hook them up and connect them to the far away spigot. She noted the student's lesson of appreciating rainy days!

At the start of this school year, the garden work continued and was utilized during the after school program, which began in September and continued for six weeks. The students helped with garden clean up and learned about collecting seeds for next year's flower garden. The student also got to measure the giant sunflowers with the tallest measuring 12 feet!

As a surprise this fall, the Master Gardeners did some fall

planting of daffodil bulbs in one of the raised flower beds so the students will have a big surprise in the spring.

The club has big goals for next year including starting a compost bin for garden debris, having some tree limbs trimmed to allow more sunlight to the garden, utilizing the greenhouse, and putting in a request for another water spigot installed closer to the garden.

Nicholson's successful garden project has been noticed by other schools in the county and are now often asked for information about how to start their own school garden.

Yerkes said, "The second and third graders are so great to work with and their ability and eagerness to help and learn about gardening kept us all energized and we are in hopes that their interest and experiences last a lifetime."

Crawfordsville Schools benefit from MCCF grants

The Crawfordsville Community School Corporation benefited from the final 2022 grant cycle of the Montgomery County Community Foundation.

Willson Preschool received \$11,000 for a climbing wall to be installed in the school gym. Climbing wall activities promote gross motor development, and are associated with a greater likelihood of success in academics and in social/emotional development. The wall will be a great active option when outdoor recess isn't possible.

An additional \$10,000 was awarded to the area of Health and Welfare for CCSC. These funds will be used for students within the corporation who need financial assistance for eye exams, glasses, dental services, medications, and mental health assessments. The grant will also be used for CPR training and supplies, and student health education.

The MCCF awarded 14 nonprofit groups grants totaling \$330,770.

Athenians both earn victories over Attica Saturday night

Both the CHS girls and boys basketball teams split over the weekend with losses to Lebanon Friday night, but victories over Attica on Saturday. The Lady Athenians defeated Attica 52-46 making 11 three-pointer. They shot 41% from behind the three-point line. This is the

third season in a row that CHS has made at least 11 threes in a game. Senior Elyse Widmer made 4, Madison Hedrick 3, Taylor Abston 3, and Addison Hodges 1. The girls are now 3-8 and will travel to Parke Heritage on Thursday, Dec. 8.

The boys team also defeated Attica by a score

of 67-17, allowing younger players some varsity court time in the second half. The Athenians forced 26 turnovers by Attica and scored 21 first quarter points before Attica was on the board. The boys are now 2-2 and will host West Lafayette on Friday, Dec. 9.
