Generous anonymous donor gives \$600

Nicholson Elementary students received a special surprise recently as each student in the entire building was able to take home a brand new book!

In the fall, an anonymous parent donor approached the school staff during the Scholastic Book Fair that they wanted to donate money to give each student a book. The school selected a variety of books from the fair so there were various reading levels and a variety of subject matter.

Their donation of \$600 covered about 60% of the total cost. Funds in the school's budget were able to provide the remaining amount so each student could take a book home to read with their family.

Principal Jennifer Coyle said, "Students were so excited to get these new books. It is wonderful when we can get books into the hands of our students, especially when they know they become "theirs" and can take them home to share with families."

Through the Indiana Blood Center Drive, 100% of the blood collected in Montgomery County stays and is used in Montgomery County to assist those in need of blood and blood products. The drive was a great success and enough blood was collected to save 60 people in our community.

Hoover Principal, Marci Galinowski, said discussions began about the blood drive after the Indiana Blood Center reached out inquiring about the schools interest in partnering with them.



"The student council is always looking for ways to help out the community," she said, 'We found out that all blood collected in the county, stays in the county. For that reason, it was a good fit for our student council's mission.""

The blood drive was a huge success as all available appointments were quickly filled. The drive was open to the community, but after an initial email to the school's staff and families, those spots were filled by the supportive Hoover community alone.

"So many people were very excited to help for such a good cause," Galinowski said.

The Indiana Blood Center partnership made it a very easy process, and after a wonderful response, the Hoover Student Council plans to make it an annual event.

Everyone on the team works extensively to provide their own time and talents into not only constructing a functioning robot, but doing so much good beyond that as well. The Inspire Award isn't only about engineering, but is about the attitude and gracious professionalism that teams are called to strive for. Our team showed that they have that this year.

The Inspire Award is given to the team who meets several factors of criteria. First and foremost, the team shows respect and Gracious Professionalism® to everyone they meet at the event. Other criteria includes, being a strong contender for other judged awards, an ambassador for FIRST programs, positivity and inclusiveness, an impressive engineering portfolio, an innovative robot design, and lastly a professional and engaging team interview.

The CHS varsity team, "535 TOBOR," is a seasoned competitor at the state tournaments with long-time former coach, Darrin Wilcoxson, establishing a great program. Wilcoxson is now using his engineering skills while employed at Purdue University's engineering department.

CHS will compete against the state's top 24 teams. The top two teams advance to the World Championship in Dallas.

Athenians, Horton make their mark at State

The boys' swim team wrapped up their season and once again had great success and made their mark in Athenian history. For the first time in history, every swimmer advanced to the sectional championship following the preliminaries. For the 7th time in eight years, the Athenians were the sectional champions, winning 10 of the 11 events. After the sectional championship, eight swimmers continued their swim season at the state meet at the IUPUI Natatorium in nearly every event.

In addition to sectional first place finishes, pool and sectional records were broken in the 200 Medley Relay and the 200 Free Relay, and Marshall Horton set records for the school, pool, and sectional in the 100 Breaststroke.

At the state meet, the Athenians had two events advance to the state finals the following day. The last time an Athenian continued to the state finals was in 2007. The two events were the 200 Medley Relay, which included swimmers Whitman and Marshall

Horton, Thristan Callejas, and Evan Chaney; and Marshall Horton in the 100 Free.

After the finals, both events finished in 16th place with the 200 Medley Relay time of 1:37.51 and Marshall Horton's 100 Free time of 47.52.

To top off the state meet, senior Marshall Horton was awarded the 2022 Herman F. Keller Mental Attitude Award presented by Indiana Farm Bureau Insurance. The award is given to one qualified senior who advances to the finals, is nominated by their coach and principal, and meets the criteria of excellence in mental attitude, athletic ability, scholarship and leadership throughout his or her four-year high school career.

The last and only time a Crawfordsville Athenian swimmer/diver has been given the award was to Josh Mikesell in the 1987-88 season. The award is in honor of Herman F. Keller who was the former IHSAA assistant commissioner who served the association from 1961-73

Individual records were also broken during the county meet. Marie Hesler broke the county and school records in the 100 Individual Medley and the school record in the 50 Butterfly. Matt Miller broke the county record in diving and nearly broke the school record
