Antoine Hart via a Zoom presentation, to clarify the college application process. They also received tips and advice to make their application stronger.

As college application season approaches, students and parents are filled with anxiety and uncertainty. To ease their concerns, Lyceum Kennedy recently held a presentation on the college application process. Antoine, a college counselor from Bespoke Education, provided valuable insight on various aspects of the process, including internships, recommendations, and essays.

Antoine emphasized the significance of internships, noting that they provide students with real-world experience and help build their resumes. He encouraged students to research internships in their area and to not be afraid to approach businesses to ask about opportunities. Furthermore, he explained the importance of preparing and taking the SAT. In fact, you need a high enough score to prove your abilities.

The presentation also covered the topic of recommendation letters. Antoine advised students to choose recommenders who know them well and can speak to their strengths and character (at least 2 teachers). He also urged them to approach recommenders early and provide them with all the necessary information to write a compelling letter.

When it comes to college essays, Antoine stressed the importance of authenticity and storytelling. He advised students to write during the summer about experiences that have shaped them and to showcase their unique voice and perspective. He also suggested that students seek feedback from teachers, counselors, or other trusted individuals.

Then, the college counselor gave us some

extra-tips to build a better application. For example, it is essential to **start the process** as soon as possible, you should also answer quickly to email and stay active. Finally, he talked about the need to prepare for the interviews, but this is for another time!

The presentation was well-received by both students and parents. Mr. Cohen-Solal, our school's quidance counselor, expressed gratitude to Antoine for his informative and engaging presentation. He also announced that the school would soon be offering one-on-one meetings with Antoine to help students with their college applications.

Overall, Antoine's emphasis on internships, recommendations, and essays helped students and parents understand what they need to do to succeed in their applications. With the help of Lyceum Kennedy's resources and support, students can feel confident and prepared as they embark on the journey to college.

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A Small Step for Seniors, A Big Step for College Education

Oh, college, when will you come? There's one thing on the seniors' mind right now. College. While the seniors finish their Regents, study for their APs and prepare for their IB, they are currently sending their applications and waiting (somewhat impatiently) for their decisions.

While many schools may not discuss this with everyone, we feel that it's important to show what to prepare for in this step of life, with tips on how to make a stronger application and what to not worry about. Specifically for LK students. We also feel that we should disclose the different goals throughout the senior class, to show the variety of wants and needs in a specific student.

There are multiple things that juniors and seniors

should know about, and prepare for when they send their applications out. Their grades, their SATs, their extracurriculars and their personal statements.

Grades:

Every student knows this.
Always try to get good
grades. Colleges make a
big deal out of it, and for
good reason, they want
the students who will fit
for their school. Our school
sends transcripts that show
the final grades in every

class from 9th grade and up, and the student's grade point average (GPA). Every college will also explain how they look at the transcript. In short, they look for an upward trend. Ideally, the student should have grades that continuously go up. This shows the college as the student matures, they're able to take their studies much more seriously. So make sure you do well in school, har har.

SATs:

Probably every junior's or senior's biggest fear is the SATs. You hear about the SATs in movies as a life changing test that will determine your future choices in your adulthood. Rest assured, it isn't. The SAT is a national test given to students that will test English and Math, and is scored over 1600. Students are able to take the SAT or the PSAT (a practice exam under exam conditions) at LK. When using your score,

you can check online to see the range of SAT scores in accepted students, and even if submitting the scores are optional or not.

Extracurriculars:

What do you like to do outside of schoolwork? Playing soccer? Are you a part of the debate club? Do you play an instrument? These are all examples of different extracurriculars. All applications will ask you to show what you do outside of class, and how often you do those activities, from 9th grade and up. This shows how well rounded you are compared to other applicants. You can submit up to 10, which can range from sports, competitions, clubs or things you do for enjoyment.

Personal Statement:

What's the story that you've been meaning to tell someone, but there was never a time to bring it up? Well here's that chance. The personal statement is a 650 word essay, in which you'll be able to tell the admission counselors something about yourself. It could be about something really important to you, an experience you had or even something you learned. After attending a few seminars, I learned some of the most memorable statements are the most obscure. A few favorites that they mentioned are about a student going on a road trip with their family and a student making a sandwich!

Yet, in the end, we still need to choose the colleges that we are interested in. While we of course want to figure out what we want to study in college, we still need to find a place that will be the right fit.

The experiences we have in college will be some of the most memorable parts of our lives, so we want to try to make sure of it. These factors depend on where the college is located, clubs they offer, if you want to do varsity or club sports, Greek life, pre-professional programs, events that may be held on campus, and what the school prioritizes, which could be school spirit, volunteering, religion, and much more.

I've decided to take a few people from the senior class and ask them a few questions on where they wanted to study, why they chose to apply to these colleges, and what's important to them for their college experience.

Q1: What do you want to study in college?

St Patrick's Day - From the past to the present

What is St.Patrick's Day? St.Patrick's Day is a day that celebrates the death of St. Patrick, an Irish saint every March 17

Which countries celebrate this holiday?

Today, people of all backgrounds celebrate St. Patrick's Day, especially throughout the United States, Canada and Australia. Although North America is home to the largest productions, it is celebrated around the world in locations far from Ireland, including Japan, Singapore and Russia.

Why do people celebrate it?

The day commemorates St. Patrick and the arrival of Christianity in Ireland, and celebrates the heritage and culture of the Irish in general. Celebrations generally involve public parades and festivals, céilithe, and the wearing of green attire or shamrocks.

History of St. Patrick's Day

Patrick's Day was originally celebrated in Ireland with religious services and feasts in honor of St. Patrick. When Irish immigrants brought St. Patrick's Day traditions to the United States, the day evolved into a non-religious celebration of Irish culture. The first St. Patrick's Day parade was held in NYC in 1762 and it became a popular annual event, spreading to other cities. Today, St. Patrick's Day is celebrated in the US with parades, parties, and other festivities.

Who was St.Patrick exactly?

St. Patrick (385–461) was the patron saint of Ireland, one of Christianity's most widely known

Purim - A Jewish Celebration

Discover Purim, the festive Jewish holiday celebrating the victory of the Jewish people over the anti-semite Haman. Dress up, eat delicious traditional food, and gather in synagogues!

What is Purim?

Purim is a Jewish holiday celebrating how the Jewish people fought against Haman, a prominent antisemite.

How do the Jewish people celebrate Purim?

They celebrate by dressing up, to represent how Esther hid her Jewish identity from her husband King Achashverosh. While hiding, he managed to save the Jews from Haman who wanted to kill them. Jewish people also gather in synagogues all over the world to hear the reading of the Megillah of Esther (book of Esther). Some synagogues will have Jewish children ask adults for money and others may even throw after parties!

What do the Jewish people eat?

Jews will also eat some cultural food such as Hamentashen! Hamentashen are sweet triangular pastries which usually have a jam filling such as strawberry, blackberry, apricot and many more! Some even have chocolate filling. However, you rarely find any other fillings. The pastries represent Haman's hat and Jewish people eat it to mock the stupidity and arrogance of Haman. Jews also eat a dish called Kreplach which is like dumpling soup. The dough of the dumplings symbolizes knowledge and the meat in the dumplings symbolizes emotion.

Who are the characters in the Megillah of Esther? What did Esther even do?

Some important characters in the Megillah of Esther are Esther/







Hadassah (the main character),
Achashverosh, Vashti (Achasverosh's
late wife), Haman (anti-semite),
Mordechai (Esther's cousin). Esther
saved the Jewish people. Haman
wanted to kill all the Jews! However,
Queen Esther fasted for three days
and went to ask the king to make
a small dinner and invite Haman,
where she called him out.

How do the Jewish people celebrate Purim with each other?

Religious Jews on the day before Purim will be fasting the whole day to remind themselves how Esther fasted before going to ask the king in his forbidden area where not even the Queen could step foot in. Jewish people also give out gifts to the poor and the minimum is two generous gifts however synagogues will usually collect money and help the community. Jewish people also give out money to the poor. Some popular gifts are food baskets. drinks and other necessities. Jews also give gift baskets to their fellow Jewish friends. The gifts are typically given through a third person due to Jewish people wanting to be discreet throughout their lifestyle (doing good deeds in private, etc). Jewish people also play Purim music and they dress up to show how Esther hid her Jewish identity from Haman and the king! Some Jewish people will even invite friends to celebrate Purim together. Purim is a joyful holiday where it's essential to spend time with friends and family through meals and parties.

Mardi Gras est, à la fois, une fête païenne et chrétienne, ancrée depuis bien longtemps dans les traditions, que les plus jeunes attendent chaque année, avec impatience.

Ses origines et aliments

Selon le calendrier lunaire romain, le mois de mars marque le début de l'année et 47 jours avant Pâques. Cette journée était pour les chrétiens une fête durant laquelle on se déguisait et l'on mangeait plus que d'habitude c'était, pour les chrétiens, l'occasion de vider leurs réserves de nourriture, tout ce dont ils auraient été privés pendant plusieurs semaines. Ainsi, les plats typiques consommés ce jour-là sont souvent riches en calories et en graisses, on peut y trouver des crêpes, des beignets ou encore des gaufres.

Pourquoi se déguise-t-on pour fêter le carnaval ?

C'est le monde à l'envers, un monde où les carnavaleux ont pris l'habitude de se déguiser : autrefois, les enfants s'habillaient en adulte, les riches en pauvres... Cela permettait à toutes les classes sociales de se mélanger et de faire la fête. En plus de se déguiser, les gens célèbrent Mardi Gras en organisant des défilés et des bals masqués. Les costumes peuvent être très élaborés, avec des plumes, des paillettes et des masques en tout genre. Les enfants

participent également en portant des déguisements et en lançant des confettis.

Comment les gens célèbrent-ils Mardi Gras dans le monde?

Au Brésil, le carnaval de Rio est l'un des plus célèbres et des plus grands événements au monde, attirant des millions de visiteurs chaque année. Les rues de Rio sont remplies de musique, de danse et de costumes incroyables.

En Nouvelle-Orléans, aux États-Unis, Mardi Gras est également une fête célèbre. Les défilés sont organisés par des «krewes», des groupes sociaux qui ont chacun leur propre thème et leur propre char. Les participants jettent des colliers de perles et d'autres friandises aux spectateurs.


