HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PROPOSED BUDGET

- Preserves current academic and extracurricular programs, including athletics, music, clubs, pre-K, etc.
- Enhanced safety protocol, including camera upgrades districtwide and installation of a lockdown button at the three remaining schools.
- Creation of a nine-period school day at the High School.
- Capital upgrades, including a new roof at Landing, a PA system at Deasy and completion of the security booth at the High School.
- Continued professional development for all staff.
- Applies \$14.15 million in NYS education aid to contain the tax levy.
- Utilizes \$1.5 million in reserves to contain the tax levy.

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

TAX CAP COMPLIANT

PROPOSED TAX LEVY

The Board of Education and administration have worked diligently over the past several months to develop a budget that is educationally sound and fiscally responsible.

The tax levy associated with the 2019-20 proposed budget is 1.99%, which complies with New York State's tax levy cap. Staying within the tax levy cap is not only fiscally responsible, but will also allow the Glen Cove community to qualify for the New York State property tax freeze credit.

This year, we are also seeking to establish and fund a Capital Reserve Fund. These reserves will act as a savings account for the district to utilize, with taxpayer approval, to complete larger, needed projects in future years. More information on Proposition #2 can be found on page 2 of this newsletter.

Over the past school year, every area of the budget has been carefully examined:

- We have identified specific sections of spending that could be reduced and/or eliminated.
- We have found alternatives to conventional spending methods to decrease costs of necessary resources.
- We have reorganized departments to enhance efficiencies while ensuring all responsibilities are being properly met.
- All staff members have worked collaboratively to create a budget that will continue to deliver services and instruction to meet the varied needs of all students in a safe and supportive educational environment, while being fiscally responsible.
- We will continue to explore and implement other viable shared-service opportunities.
- We continue to seek alternate sources of funding, including grants, which carry no tax impact to residents and directly benefit our students.

An Explanation of Proposition #2: Establishment of Capital Reserve Fund

The district is seeking permission to establish a capital reserve fund, the Facilities Improvement Capital Reserve Account, to create a reserve for future capital needs. Capital Reserve funds are like a savings account for the district, which will enable future capital projects to be addressed without impacting the annual operating budget or the need for a future bond. Establishment of a capital reserve fund carries **no** monetary impact to taxpayers.

Here are the key points you need to know when voting on this proposition:

- Will NOT impact the school budget or its tax levy.
- Needed for funding of future capital projects.
- Funding can only take place from June 30, 2019, through June 30, 2029.
- Funding source includes annual transfers of surplus money in fund balance (if any).
- This capital reserve fund would not be able to exceed funding of \$20 million in the 10-year period.
- Use of any monies from this account will have to pass

NYS Tax Rebate **Program**

As part of the New York State budget agreement between the governor and legislature, a New York State Tax Rebate Program is still in effect. Eligible Glen Cove School District taxpayers (must receive the STAR exception and make \$275,000 or less) will receive a rebate check. Eligibility for this rebate check is not determined by the district, but by New York State.

Qualifications of Voters

To vote, you must be:

- A United States citizen;
- 18 years of age or older;
- A district resident for at least 30 days prior to the vote date.

Eligible voters include those who have voted in federal, state, county or school district elections within the past four years, those who have registered with the Nassau County Board of Elections and residents who registered during the school district's registration period.

Absentee Ballots

If a voter wishes to vote with an absentee ballot, he/ she must complete and submit an application to the district clerk, who will provide the absentee ballot. The application must be received on or before Tuesday, May 14, if it is to be mailed to the voter.

Persons designated by the Nassau County Board of Elections as "permanently disabled," pursuant to Election Law, will automatically receive an absentee ballot.
