# 2023 Asphalt Roadway Resurfacing

- Alley between Ridgewood Avenue & E. Schantz Avenue


### **Leaf Mulch Program**


Citizens have two options again this year for obtaining leaf mulch. For those who want mulch delivered, we offer 3 cubic yards for \$100 and 6 cubic yards for \$150. Please call (937) 298-0777 to place an order. Mulch deliveries will take place on five Saturdays from April 8 to May 6. On the same five Saturdays, residents can obtain free mulch from the Foell Public Works Center at 210 Shafor Blvd. between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., but must haul the material themselves and must provide proof of residency. The free mulch is for Oakwood residents only and no commercial vehicles are permitted.





# **CenterPoint Gas Line Improvements**

CenterPoint (formerly Vectren) begins the final year of replacing underground gas distribution pipes and home service lines in Oakwood neighborhoods. The maps below identify work programmed for 2023. In all work areas, CenterPoint is installing new polyethylene pipes in place of old steel and cast iron pipes and is moving indoor gas meters to outside wall locations. This is the end of a 13 year CenterPoint infrastructure replacement project in Oakwood. Oakwood residents personally affected by the work will receive detailed information from CenterPoint. #### Is Your Garage Sale Sign in the Right Spot?

With spring approaching, it is time for garage sale signs to start appearing, so here are a few reminders.

- Signs advertising for a garage sale are permitted at the garage sale location only.
- No directional or lead-in garage sale signs are permitted in the city's rightof-way or on any property that is not the premises of the garage sale.
- Signs in violation of this regulation will be removed.

Garage sales are permitted in residential zoning districts from 8:00 a.m. to sundown on weekdays and Saturdays, and from 9:00 a.m. to sundown on Sundays and holidays. Garage sales do not require a permit but may only be held for three (3) consecutive days, with a limit of two garage sales in a calendar year.

#### Leash Law

Dogs are required to be securely leashed and under the reasonable control of the owner, keeper or agent thereof whenever they are on public sidewalks, streets or any other public rights-of-way. Dogs must also be leashed and controlled in city natural areas such as Elizabeth Gardens and Houk Stream, and are prohibited altogether in the city's primary parks (Cook, Fairridge, Orchardly and Shafor Parks) and Smith Gardens. These rules apply to all dogs in Oakwood, although there are certain exceptions for service animals and for dogs using the Creager Field Dog Park.

Oakwood is densely populated and we have a very large number of dogs... around 1,000 registered in Oakwood, where we have about 4,000 homes. The leash law is designed to mitigate the unpredictability of dogs and to protect both citizens and other animals from unexpected and unwanted encounters. Even the most well-trained dogs, under the right set of circumstances, can be unpredictable. Citizens should be able to move about the public sidewalks and rights-of-way freely and without concern or fear from unleashed dogs.

# **Picking Up After Your Pets**

Dogipot stations are available throughout the city to help pet owners with an easy and safe clean-up (see city website for location map). There are few things that aggravate neighbors more than a pet owner who does not clean up after their pet. Besides being an unsightly mess, a number of common diseases can be transmitted to pets and people through feces. Failing to clean up after your pet is fineable under the Oakwood General Offenses Code. Please be a responsible pet owner and help keep our Oakwood community clean.

### **Refuse Program**

One of our primary city services is collection and disposal of refuse including household trash, recyclables, bulk items, and green waste. Given the enormous number of trees in Oakwood and the extensive landscaping throughout our city, we generate a very large amount of green waste (yard debris). Roughly 20-25% of the cost to operate our refuse program is related to the green waste collection and disposal. ### **Do Not Place Yard Debris in the Street or in Center Medians**

The city of Oakwood offers several options for disposal of yard debris. The most popular method is via the monthly yard debris pickup. Residents may place piles of yard debris – brush and branches – into the tree lawn area at their property frontage just behind the curb or edge of pavement for pickup by the city. Residents should not place yard debris in front of other properties, nor should they place yard debris in any roadway center medians.

Under no circumstance should residents place anything in the street or roadway gutter (except leaves in the fall). Any amount of debris in the street is an obstruction and disrupts the stormwater collection system by diverting water away from the intended storm drains. Debris in the street can be dangerous to vehicles and is hard to see at night. Debris in the street also interferes with on-street parking and is a danger to pedestrians, joggers, and bicyclists.

It is against the law to place yard debris in the street, except leaves during the fall collection program. As of January 1, 2023, the city's code enforcement officer responds to yard debris piles placed in the gutter or street by leaving a door-hanger notice at the property affording two business days to remove the obstruction. After two days, the city will remove the obstruction and will charge the property owner \$150.

Property owners who routinely use the city's monthly collection program and wish to construct a hard surface pad (e.g., concrete, brick, paver) for debris placement should contact the code enforcement officer at (937) 297-2920 or see the city website for permitting information.

In addition to the monthly pick-up, the city offers other options for disposing of yard debris, such as the 24/7 drop-off facility at the J.D. Foell Public Works Center. Also, residents are provided two free special pickups per year, which can be used for yard debris. Additionally, dumpsters are available to be delivered free of charge for large amounts of green waste. # **Spring Yard and Garden Cleanup**

The city collects yard debris from property frontages monthly from January through September, and bi-weekly from October through December. Refer to the enclosed map for your scheduled pickup days and please plan your work accordingly. Here are a few things to remember:

- Place larger piles of yard debris including brush and branches in the tree lawn area just behind the curb. Branches should be no longer than 6 feet and should be placed in manageable piles. Do not place these piles around trees, fire hydrants, cable TV boxes or posts/poles.
- Do not place any yard debris in the street or gutter line, except leaves during the fall leaf collection season.
- Under no circumstance should you place anything except yard debris for pick-up in the tree lawn area.
- The city will not pick up contractor generated yard debris.
- If you have a large amount of yard debris, please call for a free dumpster, but remember that this dumpster must only include yard debris.
- Do not stack loose yard debris around or on top of your garbage cans.
- Please remember the 35 gallon and 60-pound limits on trash cans and that all cans must have lids.
- Grass clippings are not accepted, either with regular trash or curbside yard debris collection, or at the recycling and yard waste drop-off site. Please use a mulching mower or home composting.

# **Prescription Drug Drop-off Box**

A locked prescription drug drop-off box is available in the lobby entrance to the city building located at 30 Park Avenue. This drop box offers a way for residents to conveniently dispose of unwanted or expired prescription drugs and is accessible to the public 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.



The items that are accepted for safe disposal include: prescription medications, medication patches, over-the-counter-medications, vitamins, medication samples, and unwanted medications

for pets. Items that cannot be accepted include: liquids of any kind, gels, ointments, needles, inhalers, aerosol cans, and medications from businesses or clinics. This program is not designed for commercial use. Businesses should dispose of medications according to state and federal guidelines. All items collected from the drop box are processed for destruction according to state and federal law.

# **Oakwood Sustainability Measures**

Over the past several decades, the city of Oakwood has implemented numerous measures to address matters of the environment and provide for the betterment of Oakwood and the greater community. See the city website for a detailed list of the measures.

### **Spring Crime Prevention Tips**

The Oakwood Public Safety Department offers a few tips to keep yourself and your home safe during the spring and summer months.

- With the arrival of warmer temperatures, many people open windows or sliding glass doors while they are at home. Always remember to close and lock your windows and doors before going to bed or leaving the house.
- Remember to lock any shed, storage unit, or garage you have on your property.
- Be aware of home improvement scams. If you did not solicit the contractor or salesman, investigate the company before making the decision to do business with that person.
- If a utility representative comes to your house, request identification. True representatives will carry their identification and they will gladly show it to you.
- If necessary, contact the company or Oakwood Public Safety Department for verification.
- Historically, during the warmer weather months, personal property crimes increase. Residents tend to leave items such as bicycles, gardening tools, lawnmowers, and other yard tools out in the open. Make sure you lock up your personal property when unattended. It does not take long for someone to quickly take your property that has been left in the yard.
- Always remember to roll up your car windows and remove valuables, even if your vehicle is parked in your driveway.
- Being a good neighbor can be one of the best crime prevention tools. If you observe any unusual or suspicious activity, please contact the Oakwood Public Safety Department at (937) 298-2122.

### 2022 Oakwood Income Tax Returns Due April 18

The city of Oakwood has a mandatory filing requirement for all residents. Every individual, 18 years of age or older, who resides in Oakwood, must file an Oakwood city income tax return, whether or not there is any taxable income to report. Retired residents who have income derived exclusively from non-taxable sources (interest, dividend, social security and/or pension income, etc.) must first file a final return in order to be exempt from the filing requirement.

If you have filed for an extension of time to file your federal return, you will automatically receive an Oakwood extension. You should attach a copy of your federal extension to your return when filing so that you will not be charged a late filing penalty. Your extended return is due the same date as your extended federal return – October 16, 2023. If you do not have a federal extension, you may still obtain an Oakwood extension. Simply complete an extension request form, located on the city's web site, and submit your returns does not extend the time to pay your taxes. All taxes paid after April 18, 2023 will be subject to a 15% late payment penalty and interest.

# **Spring Styrofoam Recycling Event**

The city of Oakwood is partnering with Green Oakwood to provide a spring Styrofoam recycling event for the Oakwood community. Styrofoam will be collected at the 24/7 public-access recycling facility located at the front entrance to the J. David Foell Public Works Center, 210 Shafor Boulevard, on Saturday, April 22. Watch



the city's website and Green Oakwood's Facebook page for collection hours. Green Oakwood will transport the collected Styrofoam to the Montgomery County Environmental Services Styrofoam recycling event.

Aside from Styrofoam recycling, the Public Works Center will be open that day for mulch pickup consistent with the Leaf Mulch Program article on page 3. No other Public Works services will be available that day. be made available at the city administrative offices, Wright Memorial Public Library and the Oakwood Community Center.

Full-year residents with W-2 wage income only will be able to file their 2022 city of Oakwood income tax return online. Visit the city's website for additional information.

Important Note for Remote Workers: Remote work (also known as work from home or telecommuting) is a type of flexible working arrangement that allows an employee to work from a remote location outside of corporate offices. Due to the coronavirus pandemic, this arrangement has become increasingly popular. If you were working at home during all or part of 2022, yet your form W-2 shows that your wages were withheld for another municipality in which you did not work, you must file for a refund for the taxes withheld to that city. Credit for taxes paid to other cities may only be claimed for another work city. You are only subject to another city's income tax for the time actually worked in that city.

If you need assistance with the preparation of your Oakwood return, please contact the Tax Department at (937) 298-0531 to schedule an appointment. Normal business hours for the tax office are from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Extended hours will be provided April 17-18, when the office will be open until 6:00 p.m.

## Oakwood Rotary Hazardous Waste Pickup


There are two ways for residents to properly dispose of household hazardous material. Residents may: 1) drop off the material at the Montgomery County Refuse Transfer Station (see www.mcswd.org for more information); or 2) use the quarterly Oakwood Rotary Club Hazardous Waste Collection program. The 2023 collection dates are Saturday, April 22, Saturday, July 22 and Saturday, October 21. Call (937) 296-5155 to sign up for the service. It is provided free of charge, but the Oakwood Rotary Club accepts donations. Donations to the "Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation" can be placed in an envelope and left with the items being disposed, or may be mailed to: Oakwood Rotary Club Foundation, PO Box 512, Dayton, OH 45409. ### Lawn Treatment on City-Owned Public Lawn Areas

Well-kept lawns and green spaces within the city are an important part of the health of these areas and maintaining Oakwood's ambience. The city has used Integrated Pest Management (IPM) practices for a number of years on the city-owned public lawn areas which include parks, boulevards, athletic fields, and around public buildings. IPM is an ecosystem-based strategy that focuses on long-term prevention of pests or their damage through a combination of techniques such as biological control, habitat manipulation, modification of cultural practices, and use of resistant varieties. Pesticides are used only after monitoring indicates they are needed according to established guidelines, and treatments are made with the goal of removing only the target organism. Pest control materials are selected and applied in a manner that minimizes risks to human health, beneficial and nontarget organisms, and the environment. Our practices include adherence to proper mowing heights and the use of sharp blades on mowers which helps reduce the amount of chemicals used in all of the public areas. The city requires that all lawn care contractors, whether treating for pests or weeds, are properly licensed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture, and follow all applicable laws and rules promulgated by the Ohio Department of Agriculture.

In our parks, lawn care treatments require the posting of temporary signage in conspicuous locations at least two days prior to treatment. The day of treatment, the city Horticulturist and/or Recreation Supervisor meet the contractor on-site prior to the application of any treatment. They ensure that children are not present in the area to be treated and that the area is otherwise clear for the application, before allowing the contractor to proceed with lawn treatment. Immediately following treatment, the city verifies that all signs are properly placed, and are then promptly removed 24 hours thereafter. Only areas with weeds and pests are spot sprayed, not always the entire green space as this is a part of the IPM practice to limit chemical use yet still keep the community greenspace as healthy as possible. # DOOR-TO-DOOR SOLICITING AND CANVASSING – "No Solicitation" Designation

The city of Oakwood provides residential property owners with a means to prohibit certain types of door-to-door solicitation and canvassing. This is addressed in Chapter 733 of the Oakwood Codified Ordinances and can be accomplished by residents requesting that their property be included on the city's "Do Not Solicit" list.

If you are interested in being added to the "do-not-solicit" list, you can complete one of the following: 1) Submit the "No Solicitation Form" from the city's website at www. oakwoodohio.gov 2) Detach the form below and mail it to: City of Oakwood, Attn: Do Not Solicit, 30 Park Avenue, Oakwood, OH 45419. As the owner or tenant of property with the street address of \_\_\_\_\_\_, I hereby request that this property be registered on the city of Oakwood's "Do Not Solicit" list. I understand and intend the following:

- 1. By registering my address on the "Do Not Solicit" list, all persons will be prohibited by law from contact canvassing, peddling, vending, soliciting, or requesting contributions at my property.
- This prohibition does not apply to the delivery of advertisements, literature, or other information that may be left at my property, and does not apply to certain youth fundraising activity.
- 3. Registration of a property on the "Do Not Solicit" list expires after five years or upon the transfer of a property to a new owner or tenant, whichever comes first. Registrations can be renewed upon request by the owner or tenant.

### Harlamert Entrepreneurship Competition Ignites OHS Students Entrepreneurial Spirit

In 2010, the late Judge **Irvin Harlamert, OHS '48**, created the Harlamert Entrepreneurship Competition with The Oakwood Schools Foundation to inspire Oakwood High School students to pursue the spirit of entrepreneurship.

The annual competition encourages high school students from any grade or course to explore and learn from the experience of real-world entrepreneurs. Twenty-seven students applied this year with more than \$4,550 student awards given. To date, more than 250 students have participated over the years. Participating students receive awards for their submissions, made possible by the Harlamert Charitable Foundation.

For the competition, student participants shadow an entrepreneur. Following their hands-on experience, students write a report detailing their experiences. A volunteer judge panel reviews the anonymized essays based on a scoring rubric to determine each student's award.

The 2023 Junior Experience at OHS was a day for students to deepen connections with their classmates through team building and learn from guest speakers and experts, including motivational keynote speaker Rick Metzger, an alumni panel of recent graduates, current senior leaders, and special segments by alumni including lessons on the legal implications of being an adult from **Chris Conard, OHS '76**, and closing remarks from entrepreneur **Nick Reasoner, OHS '06** about how to follow your own path. The day was a chance to come together as a class in preparation for their final year at OHS and the "adult" world that follows.

Shortly before Kennedy's passing after a courageous battle with cancer in 2021, he was instrumental in founding the Junior Experience through The Oakwood Schools Foundation.

Kennedy gave back to his communities in a myriad of ways, and a common theme shared among them was the concept of being a part of a team and helping those who came after him.

As his obituary stated, "Mike approached every aspect of his life with his signature smile and hearty laugh. Although a passionate leader who held himself and others to the highest standards, his smile always let you know his goal was to share the path to success."

Mark Dalton, OHS '68 was a friend and OHS basketball teammate of Kennedy.

"Mike Kennedy was a real presence at OHS. He had a great zest for life, a booming voice and a big smile, and tremendous drive to do well as a person and as a teammate. He made close friends and kept them. Mike was one of the best Lumberjacks ever!" Dalton said.

In fact, it was their friendship from their time together in the halls of OHS and the friendship that lasted decades thereafter that inspired Dalton to want to continue to support the Junior Experience program in memory of his beloved friend.

Through the Junior Experience program, Kennedy's legacy will live on in Oakwood for generations to come and will inspire not only those who knew and loved him, but also hundreds of students each year as they prepare for their bright futures.

### Scholarship Spotlight: The Comeback Award for Students

In 1998, **Debbie Byrd Williams** and **Frank Williams** established the Comeback Award, a student scholarship awarded through The Oakwood Schools Foundation, with a different focus than most scholarships – for students who understand the "comeback."



The Comeback Award is less focused on academic achievements and more on

overcoming adversity. The annual scholarship recognizes a graduating senior who has overcome substantial adversity. The award was a way to thank the Oakwood Schools and community for the great experiences they had while raising their family here.

Although they were both born and raised outside the region, after settling in Oakwood, Debbie and Frank Williams quickly embraced the community as their home and continue to do so today by giving back. To date, the annual award has been given to 28 graduating OHS seniors, in May 2023 the number will be 29.

**Kathryn Krisher Kreps '98**, was just 9 when she was diagnosed with Ewing Sarcoma as a student at Smith Elementary, and was the keynote speaker at the Comeback Award's first presentation.

"The Comeback Award is so special because it recognizes the individual's ability and skill to overcoming challenges in life. That ability to pull yourself back up and persevere after being knocked down is a tremendous achievement in and of itself." Kathryn said.

A true testament to who they are, in a 2016 *Dayton Daily News* article Frank and Debbie were asked to explain why giving back was so important to them:

"I firmly believe 'to whom much is given, much is expected.' You don't have to have great wealth to give of yourself," Debbie explained.

"Life has many unexpected turns, but I have been very blessed. I try to share some of those blessings," Frank stated.

On June 29, 1922, Katharine Houk Talbott gathered a group of her gardening friends to her home "Runnymede" in Dayton to form a garden club. The stated objective of the Garden Club of Dayton was to simulate the knowledge and love of gardening, to aid in the protection of native plants and birds and encourage civic planting.

Oakwood residents Katharine Houk Talbott and Ethel Rike were the first two presidents of the Garden Club of Dayton. They are credited with its early success and wide recognition as one of the most outstanding cultural influences in Dayton. Three other members, Katherine Siebenthaler, Agnes Darrow and Marie Aull were given special mention for their exceptional contributions and service to the club.

The Garden Club of Dayton continues this mission to this day.

In the April presentation, Garden Club of Dayton members will walk us through the history of gardening in Oakwood. Beginning with the early landscaped formal gardens of Oakwood, through the changes gardens have undergone over the decades, we will welcome spring with this lecture on plants and gardens. There will be particular emphasis given to the current trend of native plants in residential gardens.
