

Prize Will Honor LBUSD As a Top U.S. District

The Long Beach Unified School District will be honored as one of the top five urban school districts in the nation Monday, Sept. 22 at New York's Rockefeller Center. At that event, attended by members of Congress and the U.S. Secretary of Education, one of the five finalists will be named America's best urban school system by the Broad Foundation.

An exhaustive, independent study of the finalists showed they have done the best job raising achievement for students from all walks of life, breaking through language and income barriers to give all children their best chance at success. These five school systems will receive national recognition for narrowing the achievement gap between traditionally high achievers and students who have not fared as

"The Long Beach Unified School District is a great model of educational innovation, resourcefulness and dedication," said Eli Broad, Founder of The Broad Foundation and The Broad Prize. "It is critical that we recognize their success and share their strategies with educators and the public across the coun-

The other 2003 finalists are Boston Public Schools, Garden Grove Unified School District, Jefferson County Public Schools in Kentucky, and Norfolk Public Schools in

Each of the five finalists will receive at least \$125,000 in Broad scholarships. As a two-time finalist, Long Beach has earned at least \$250,000. The top winner receives \$500,000 for student scholarships.

A review board of 20 prominent education leaders from throughout the nation analyzed extensive data to determine the finalists. The Long Beach Unified School District provided more than 20,000 pieces of information on stu-

dent achievement alone. A team of researchers visited each district being honored. In Long Beach, the team visited Tucker Elementary School, Hill Classical Middle School and Wilson Classical High School, which along with nearby Poly High School was recently ranked by Newsweek as one of the top high schools in the nation.

You are pillars of hope for other school districts," independent evaluator Jean Rutherford said during her recent visit to Long Beach schools. "You prove it can be done."

Last year's finalists were Long Beach, Garden Grove, Atlanta, Boston and Houston.

Record Enrollment **Growth Slows a Bit**

The steady enrollment growth of the past decade has slowed a bit this fall in the Long Beach Unified School District. On the tenth day of school, September 16, total enrollment in the Long Beach Unified School District reached 97,713 students, a new record.

The student population here in California's third largest school district surpassed the same day last year by 320 students, less than expected.


Middle schools had the largest increase, with enrollment totalling 23,025--726 more students on local campuses than a year ago. High schools reported 26,439 students

enrolled, up 521 students from 2002.

Elementary enrollment actually declined by exactly 900 students, with most of the decrease occurring in kindergarten. Even so, the current total of 45,431 elementary students is expected to increase all year. That has been the pattern in local elementary schools for many years.

ATTENDANCE UP--

At all grade levels-elementary, middle and high school-students in the Long **Beach Unified** School District last year broke all previous records for having the lowest absence rate and highest actual attendance rate since 1980. Since the inception of school uniforms in 1994, the growth in good attendance by students has accelerated to the highest levels in more than 20 years.



Schools' Website Attracts 25,000 Hits Monthly

The Long Beach Unified School District this week computed the number of times its new, redesigned website is being visited. An electronic tally recently revealed that www.lbusd.k12.ca.us is now attracting about 25,000 hits each month.

The school district recently added many improved, user-friendly features to the site, including a new alphabetical index--one of the quickest ways to find any school, office or service in the fewest number of mouse clicks.

The "Schools" and "Employment" sections have proved most popular so far, each attracting hundreds of web visits per day. The "Schools" section offers several ways to locate a school, including by clicking on a map of the
