# Boeing, Foundation Give Millikan \$50,000

The Long Beach Education Foundation recently received a Crystal Vision Award from the Boeing Company. The prize included \$50,000 to be used for Millikan High School's popular PEACE Academy. The award is issued for "new and innovative programs that will significantly improve services, provide greater diversity and enable agencies to be more effective."

The PEACE Academy helps college-bound students become competitive in a diverse world and global economy. The cash award will be used for additional teacher training, expansion of curriculum, and implementation of mentoring and community service components.

PEACE stands for Personal success through Empowerment, Academic achievement, Conflict resolution, and Ethics. The academy was started by teachers in 2001 as a smaller learning community emphasizing global economics, negotiation and government.

The PEACE Academy also gained recent recognition when Millikan teacher Nader Twal received a \$25,000 surprise award from the Milken Family Foundation during an all-school assembly. Twal helped to design and implement the academy. Dubbed the "Oscars of Teaching" by Teacher Magazine, the Milken National Educator Awards recognize America's best teachers.

The Long Beach Education Foundation has partnered with Boeing on several school district efforts. Boeing invited the Foundation to nominate one of its Boeing-sponsored programs for the Crystal Vision Award. The Foundation is a non-profit fundraising organization for the school district, providing teacher grants, school uniforms, musical instruments, student scholarships and other vital assistance.

# **Poly Geology Teacher Named Nation's Best**

Poly High School geology teacher Mike Fillipow was recently honored as national Teacher of the Year by the American Association of Petroleum Geologists.

Fillipow was encouraged to apply for the award by a City of Long Beach geologist who

was familiar with the teacher's hands-on, dynamic style--including field trips to oil islands and classroom demonstrations with home-made equipment.

Fillipow will receive \$5,000 for the honor, including \$2,500 to use for his classes.

Geology is rarely taught at the high school level--Fillipow's two

sections at Poly are the only geology classes in the Long Beach Unified School District.

The UCLA engineering geology graduate teaches the same material taught at the university level.

"I teach what they teach at Cal State," he said. "I use the same book."

Students learn key concepts, including rock and mineral identification, geologic history, structural geology, plate tectonics, weathering and erosion, and, perhaps most importantly in Long Beach, earth resources, specifically oil.

"Students don't realize that here in Long Beach, we're standing on top of the nation's third largest oil reserve," he said. "They don't

know that. Then when we go out to the oil islands and talk about slant drilling and how the wells are angled to tap oil, they gain a new appreciation for what's happening here."

While lessons, guest speakers, field trips and an oil exploration game that shows students the economics of the petroleum business all give his students a clear grasp of this important resource, Fillipow doesn't skimp on his other presentations.

Hands-on sessions include earthquake simulators, plexiglass "squeeze boxes" that demonstrate the deformation of rock under extreme pressure, wooden blocks to acquaint students with the significance of the slope of rock layers and plaster of Paris fossil digs that challenge students to apply sound geological judgement.

After only four years of teaching the class, he already counts a few of his former students pursuing geology degrees in college. A primary goal is to give his students a solid understanding that helps them analyze challenging energy policy issues and gives them a new appreciation of the earth's natural features.

"I want students to get excited about geology," he said. "If that happens, that's a success for me."

# **Early Retirement Plan**

The Long Beach Unified School District will offer an early retirement incentive to administrators this month. The plan expands upon a cost-saving retirement incentive recently offered to teachers.

The school district will offer retiring administrators an additional 5 percent of their final pay each year for 10 years.

As with the teacher incentive, some administrators choosing the plan would technically retire April 1, but actually would work until the end of the school year. During their final three months, they would receive an amount equal to their current salary through a combination of state retirement benefits, the district's 5 percent incentive and the additional emeritus pay.

To be eligible, administrators must be either 50 years of age or older with a minimum of 30 years of STRS service (the last five consecutive in Long Beach Unified), or 55 years of age with a minimum of five years of STRS service experience in Long Beach Unified.

The teacher incentive offered an extra 5 percent of final salary for life.

The deadline for eligible teachers and administrators to apply is Friday, February 27.

Last November, the district rejected a stateauthorized option that would have given eligible employees credit for two additional years of service age when calculating retirement benefits. The so-called "two-plus-two" plan would not have produced savings for the district.

# **Transfer Requests**

Transfer requests are valid through the first seven student days of the upcoming traditional school year. Special education teachers are eligible for transfer after four consecutive years in a special education program. The deadline to apply for transfers is Wednesday, March 31.
