# **District Ties for Most Distinguished Schools**

An unprecedented 11 elementary schools in the Long Beach Unified School District won the California Distinguished School Award this week. Only Los Angeles -- eight times the size of Long Beach -- earned as many awards.

Winners of the highest state honor include Alvarado, Cubberley, Keller, Kettering, Longfellow, Lowell, Naples, Roosevelt, Signal Hill, Stevenson and Tucker schools.

Each school competed in rigorous selection and screening conducted by the California Department of Education. The state named finalists after reviewing extensive, detailed applications and sending a team of educators to visit and evaluate each campus. Each winning school is now qualified to apply for the prestigious National Blue Ribbon Award.

To earn the top California school award, a school must demonstrate:

- · High academic expectations for all students
  - · Achievement above state standards
  - · Strong leadership
  - Challenging learning experiences
  - Strong curriculum and materials
- Competent, caring teachers focused on standards
  - · Excellent library services and technology
  - Comprehensive guidance and counseling
- Support for students who are learning English, who are at risk, or who have physical or learning disabilities
- Family involvement and partnerships with business and community
- · A safe environment that promotes citizenship, caring, fairness, respect, responsibility and trustworthiness

Schools selected for recognition will be honored Friday, May 21 during a ceremony in Anaheim at the Disneyland Hotel. State Superintendent Jack O'Connell will present each school with a plaque and special flag. The event and awards are funded by donations from prominent California corporations and statewide education organizations.

California Distinguished Schools in the Long Beach Unified School District include four repeat winners: Cubberley, Kettering, Lowell and Signal Hill. Other previous top

Dr. Felton Williams, Long Beach City College dean, this month was elected to the Board of Education of the Long Beach Unified School District. In a landslide vote, Williams outpolled candidate W. Mack Tyson by a threeto-one margin.

Williams received 2.181 votes: Tyson, 677. Williams will take office in July, filling the seat to be vacated by Board of Education President Bobbie Smith. She is retiring after 16 years on the Board.

Incumbent Jon Meyer, who ran unopposed in the recent election, also will begin a new term in July.

The Board of Education this week named the district's newest school Cesar Chavez Elementary School. The Board also elected Susan Rivard as principal of the new school at Broadway and Golden. It is scheduled to open in September for approximately 800 students.

Chavez was a civil rights, farm worker and labor leader beginning in the 1950s until his death in 1993. A strong believer in the principles of nonviolence practiced by Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Chavez is best known for the creation and leadership of the National Farm Workers Association.
