Poly High Strikes New Grammy Gold

The music program at Poly High School has been recognized by the Grammy Foundation as one of the top seven in the U.S. While the televised Grammy Awards recognize excelence in professional recording, the Grammy Signature Schools Award honors the best high school music programs in the nation.

Based on a rigorous scoring system applied by top music educators and professionals, Poly won the high honor. Poly will receive up to \$7,000 to benefit talented student musicians.

All public high schools in the U.S. have the opportunity to apply for consideration as a Grammy Signature School. Schools must submit written applications, recordings of school concerts, sample concert programs, music curriculum and repertoire which are reviewed by an independent screening committee of education professionals.

Poly is one of only seven high schools in the U.S. to receive the highest Gold rating this year. This is Poly's second Gold rating by the Grammy Foundation. The school first struck Grammy gold in 2000 when it was then named among the top 10 high schools in the U.S.

Each year, the screening committee selects up to 100 outstanding high school music programs as Grammy Signature Schools before refining the field to name a handful of top Gold winners. Poly, a consistent high performer, has achieved Signature School status for each of the past five years. It is nationally known for both its jazz and classical music excellence and has also been a participant in the Monterey Jazz Festival.

Teachers of the Year

Do you know an exemplary teacher? The Los Angeles County Office of Education is sponsoring the Year 2004-05 Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year program.

Wooden to Honor Most Inspiring Students

Legendary UCLA coach John Wooden and Los Angeles newscaster Frank Mottek will join 700 guests Thursday, April 22 at the Long Beach Hilton to honor 96 deserving students-the most inspiring student from each school in the Long Beach Unified School District.

The Wizard of Westwood, a renowned character builder and bestselling author at age 93, will be the keynote speaker at the Eighth Annual Long Beach Education Foundation

Most Inspiring Student Awards Dinner.

Wooden's unmatched record of collegiate basketball triumphs, winning 10 NCAA championships, four full undefeated seasons and 88 consecutive game victories at UCLA, makes him by far the greatest college basketball coach of all time and arguably the finest coach in the

history of sports. Considering himself a teacher first and foremost, he has taught thousands of young pupils and players his Pyramid of Success. He recently wrote a new children's book entitled *Inch and Miles* that conveys his deep personal commitment to character building.

The theme for this year's event is "The Lion King." Millikan High School students

will open with "Can You Feel the Love Tonight?" and perform selections from the popular musical that tell of overcoming challenges to achieve greatness.

A student from every school in the district will be honored for inspiring others by beating the odds. Each of the students' heartwarming stories exemplifies one of

the cornerstones of Wooden's pyramid, including hard work, friendship, loyalty, cooperation and enthusiasm.

"These students are real heroes," said Mike Murray, president of the Long Beach Education Foundation's Board of Directors. Joining Murray at the mike will be Frank Mottek, award-winning newscaster for KNX Radio and KTLA, Channel 5, who will serve as master of ceremonies. Costumed members of the Lion King cast will welcome and honor each inspiring student from all elementary, middle and high schools in the Long Beach Unified School District.

The Long Beach Chamber of Commerce will receive the Superintendent of Schools Community Service Award at the event.

"John Wooden's memorable sayings are quoted often by thousands of teachers and coaches today," said Murray. "He makes you want to be a better person."

Here are some of Wooden's words of wisdom:

- "Do not let what you cannot do interfere with what you can do."
- "Things turn out best for the people who make the best of the way things turn out."

• "Ability may get you to the top, but it takes character to keep you there."

Wooden first learned to play basketball in 1918 when he was eight years old--only 27 years after the invention of basketball. With a pair of his mother's stockings stuffed with rags as a ball, he would shoot at a wooden tomato basket.

Jefferson on CNN

A new federal proposal to relax restrictions on single-sex public schools and classrooms has sparked renewed national interest in the Jefferson Leadership Academies. The school made international headlines five years ago for converting to single-gender classes. Since the recent announcement by the U.S. Department of Education, Jefferson has received phone calls from national news media, including CNN. The CNN story aired recently. It included interviews with Jefferson students, teachers and principal Helen Compton-Harris.

New federal regulations would make it much easier to establish single-sex schools. They would change the way the government enforces Title IX of the 1972 education act, which prohibits sex discrimination in federally funded programs. Only a few dozen public schools in the nation offer same-sex classes. Single-gender classes have been shown to reduce distractions and boost achievement for both boys and girls.

Jefferson in 1999 became the nation's first public middle school to convert entirely to single gender classes. The school has regularly met or exceeded the state's Academic Performance Index targets for growth. Most recently, the school doubled the state's academic growth target. Jefferson's successful approach to single-gender instruction is considered to be in full compliance with Title IX because both boys and girls at the school are offered equal educational opportunities.

Raytheon Parking
