# **Newest K-5 School Opens Downtown**

Cesar Chavez Elementary School, the Long Beach Unified School District's newest downtown school, opened this week. The new campus will allow more neighborhood children to attend school closer to home.

"It's hard to imagine that a few days ago much of the school was inaccessible without wearing a hard hat," Principal Sue Rivard said. "Thanks to the diligent work of everyone in Maintenance, Operations, Custodial Services and Facilities, and the fantastic efforts of our own Chavez staff, our school is up and running. Classrooms are stocked with books and supplies. Eager teachers are prepared to begin instruction in this beautiful, modern school.

The two-story, \$15 million school is built on 2.6 acres near the intersection of Broadway Street and Golden Avenue. It offers 65,000 square feet of facilities, including gleaming, energy efficient classrooms, a workroom between every two classrooms, a computer lab and a large gymnasium that is part of an innovative joint-use agreement with neighboring Cesar Chavez Park.

Between 7:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. on weekdays, part of the park between Broadway and Third Street will be sectioned off as a playground for students. In return, the school's gymnasium will be open to parks department programs and the public on weekdays after 4 p.m. and on weekends. This partnership makes the best use of limited space.

The school will partner with The Children's Clinic to provide on-site immunizations and reduced-cost medical care in urgent cases.

Chavez also will partner with the Long Beach Aquarium of the Pacific to integrate marine science with subjects like science and
