More Schools Climb **Higher on State API**

The state's latest Academic Performance Index calculations show that 35 percent of schools in the Long Beach Unified School District improved their statewide rankings compared to last year. About 59 percent remained at their rankings while only 6 percent declined.

Released with the rankings were API growth targets for 2005 along with similar school rankings comparing schools that have similar demographics.

Several schools made strong gains. Lindbergh Middle School recently achieved the greatest gains on the API of any school in LBUSD, improving by 57 points. In the most recent report, Lindbergh's statewide ranking jumped from 3 to 5 in one year, and the school is one of many throughout the district that now rank 10 out of 10 compared to schools with similar student populations. Most schools here continue to meet and exceed state and national targets for growth and achievement.

Ray Bradbury Leads 'Long Beach Reads'

Led by the appearance of award-winning author Ray Bradbury, students and staff of local schools this week took part in activities of the fourth annual "Long Beach Reads One Book.

The event, which encourages residents throughout the city to read the same book, featured Bradbury's Fahrenheit 451.

The legendary author appeared early this week at Long Beach City College, taking questions from

Long Beach Unified School District students watching in 65 classrooms and interacting through a special website.

Students at Chavez Elementary school on Wednesday took part in Dictionary Day, where each third grade student received a dictionary. The students participated in a "Dig My Dictionary" contest to learn how dictionaries can help them achieve more as students, speakers and writers.

The Poly High School Orchestra performed music from the film of Fahrenheit 451 prior to an evening public discussion of the importance of dissent and free speech in the governance of a free society, a central theme of the Bradbury classic.

The California Distinguished School Awards Ceremony will be held on Friday, May 20 at the Disneyland Hotel in Anaheim. To earn the award, schools compete in rigorous selection and screening conducted by the California Department of Education.

Marshall Middle School was selected recently as a national demonstration school for the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) college preparatory system.

The elite demonstration schools were selected from more than 1,900 sites in 30 states and 15 foreign countries where the rigorous AVID system is used.

AVID schools offer a regularly scheduled elective that stresses writing, inquiry and collaboration. Students enroll in college preparatory classes and receive tutoring from college students. Teachers are trained to make college preparatory material accessible to all students.

Most AVID graduates enroll in college and remain enrolled two years later.
