Board Honors First Employees of Month

Two employees were recognized as the first Long Beach Unified School District Employees of the Month at this week's Board of Education meeting.

The monthly award provides each winner \$100 from a private donation to recognize extraordinary service in a particular month.

Those earning the award were Rebecca Dennis, teacher and special education department head at Hill; Jay Holthe, cafeteria supervisor at Emerson; and Joe Rasch, recently retired director of Maintenance. Rasch will be honored at a future meeting.

Dennis coordinated the recent Abilities Awareness Week at Hill where faculty, staff and sixth graders experience what it would be like to be visually impaired, to be in a wheelchair, to be unable to communicate verbally or to have any of six other disabilities.

Holthe helped a special needs student make the transition to middle school this year in a simple and effective way. She contacted the cafeteria supervisor at the new school to ensure that the student would continue to earn a cookie for a good week, a reward that created a sense of continuity for the student.

Rasch organized donations for Thanksgiving dinner baskets for six needy families of students at Washington Middle School. He has organized numerous holiday donation drives like this in the past.

State Budget Update

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger will propose cutting spending on K-12 education and community colleges by \$2.2 billion when he presents his new budget next week, according to news reports.

The governor had promised to protect schools from such cuts in return for their acceptance of billions of dollars in cuts last year, but state officials said this week they would not be able to honor that deal in light of the state's projected \$8 billion shortfall.

Meanwhile a report released this week by the RAND Corporation showed that the state's per-pupil spending declined from about \$400 above the national average in 1969 to more than \$600 below the average 30 years later. California's education spending has lagged behind the national average for the past decade, the study found.

- The California Academy of Mathematics and Science was named a 2004 National Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education. CAMS was one of only 32 public high schools in the U.S. to receive this top national honor.
- Hundreds of students, parents, school staff and community leaders celebrated the opening of Long Beach's first new downtown school in five years, Cesar Chavez Elementary School.
- Seventeen more teachers in the Long Beach Unified School District earned the top

The Poly High School Jazz Ensemble this week performed before jazz legends at the most prestigious professional jazz conference in the world.

The International Association of Jazz Educators Conference continues today and Saturday at the Long Beach Convention Center. More than 7,000 jazz musicians, educators, industry executives and students from 45 nations have gathered for the 32nd annual conference.

"The thing I'm most excited about is that we're performing in the main concert venue at the conference," Stevens said. "There are many different venues at the Convention Center, but they put us center stage at noon, and we're performing with three of the top studio musicians in the world."

professional distinction in teaching, National Board Certification. These teachers were honored by our Board of Education this week. The newest certifications bring the total num-

ber of nationally certified teachers in the school district to 76.

• Joan Kennedy and Patty Nagano, specialist teachers at Roosevelt Elementary School, were selected to receive the Hilda Maehling Award from the National Education Association. Joan and Patty wrote a Learning and Leadership Grant for video cameras

and release time so that new teachers and their coaches can watch each other's classroom lessons. This should help new teachers to learn effective teaching skills more quickly.

• Each of the school district's large, comprehensive high schools – Cabrillo, Jordan, Lakewood, Millikan, Polytechnic and Wilson – recently met and exceeded their overall state Academic Performance Index targets and their national No Child Left Behind targets for yearly progress.

• Enrollment in high school advanced placement and honors classes in LBUSD is increasing rapidly. This year, local high schools are offering more AP classes than ever before. More than 14,000 of the 26,000 students now attending high school here have completed or are taking one or more AP or honors courses. AP enrollment increased by 1,700 students this year.

Filipino Delegation Learns from LBUSD

Six educators from Naga City School District in the Philippines recently visited the Long Beach Unified School District to study effective education initiatives.

The educators visited Signal Hill Elementary School and Hill Classical Middle School. They also met with district leaders to learn about LBUSD's successes in these key areas:

- Designing, implementing and monitoring educational projects aimed at increasing academic achievement;
- Mobilizing financial and non-fiscal (including community-based) resources to support schools;
- Creating alternative models for effective school board management;
- Engaging parents and other stakeholders more actively;
- Providing preschool, special education and alternative learning systems for out-ofschool youngsters and adults.

New Computer Lab

Bryant Elementary School recently celebrated the opening of a new computer lab and music keyboard area.

The two facilities are being used by students in grades K-5 taking part in the M.I.N.D. (Music Intelligence Neural Development) Institute's curriculum for math and music. Students use specialized piano keyboard instruction and non-language based math computer games to develop problem solving skills and meet math standards.

The equipment and curriculum at Bryant was funded by several key benefactors including the Dr. Matthew and Roberta Jenkins Family Foundation, Educate the Children (Mr. and Mrs. Frank and Faye Clarke), British Petroleum A+ Energy Grant and Verizon.

Burnett Elementary School also uses the M.I.N.D. curriculum in grades 2-5. The curriculum is used at 55 schools nationwide serving 10,000 students.

Enrollment in honors classes increased by
700 students. In some local schools, nearly
40 percent of the students are now taking AP
classes, a record high.

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 Lakewood High School became one of 50 schools nationwide--the only high school in California--selected to be a NASA Explorer School. The three-year partnership will bring to Lakewood scientific and engineering adventures that engage students using unique NASA resources and capabilities. The program is designed to give students the foundation and inspiration to pursue careers in science, math and technology.
- The Broad Foundation recently awarded \$1.14 million to the Long Beach Unified School District to expand the district's awardwinning use of Baldrige strategies for continuous improvement at schools and central offices. The grant exceeds the combined \$1 million amount previously awarded by the foundation to LBUSD for winning the Broad Prize for Urban Education as the best urban school district in the nation, for qualifying as a finalist the previous year, and for past Baldrige implementation.
- Many elementary schools reduced class sizes in fourth and fifth grade. The smaller class sizes allow teachers to give more individualized assistance to students. Reducing class size is a major accomplishment during lean times.
- Sylvia Padilla, a teacher at Henry Elementary School, earned the Los Angeles County Teacher of the Year Award.
- More than 200 guest principals from business and industry were impressed by the high quality instruction, dedicated leadership and focused students they saw during a day of shadowing principals. The fifth annual Principal for a Day event was sponsored by the Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce and the Long Beach Education Foundation.
- Our schools continue to attract the attention of visitors from far and wide. Recent visitors have included California State Board of Education President Ruth Green and fellow board member Johnathan Williams, teams of teachers and administrators from Reno's Washoe County School District, Fresno Unified School District and Naga City School District in the Philippines.

Gompers to Go K-8

The Board of Education has approved plans to convert Gompers Elementary School into a K-8 school. Gompers requested the change after many parents at the K-5 school expressed interest in the idea.

The K-8 conversion will take place over the next three years. Next school year, Gompers will add sixth grade, followed by seventh grade in 2006-07 and eighth grade in 2007-08.
