Chavez, District Called 'Beacon for the Nation'

Cesar Chavez Elementary School has earned another statewide award for its efficient, environmentally friendly design. Before an audience of students, staff and leaders from the state, county and community, Chavez was honored for meeting the Collaborative for High Performance Schools sustainable design criteria which protect the environment.

"Long Beach Unified School District truly is a beacon for urban school districts throughout the nation," said Darline Robles, superintendent of schools, Los Angeles County. "It really is great to have this facility exemplify good health and good practice."

CAMS Wows Pros In Robotics Competition

At a recent robotics competition, California Academy of Math and Science students earned the highest score among high schools and beat five of 10 teams fielded by Northrup Grumman engineers.

The competition, called the "Half-Pipe Hustle," determined which team could best control its robot by maneuvering it on a sloped playing field to pick up the most balls and place them in a basket.

The first place Northrup Grumman team donated their prizes – iPod Shuffles – to the winning high school team from CAMS.

Opened in 2004 as downtown Long Beach's newest school, Chavez has now received eight awards for outstanding design and energy efficiency from construction experts and regulatory agencies. The latest honor recognizes expert integration of energy efficiency.

California's State Architect David Thorman praised the district and its planners for Chavez's innovative and cost-saving design.

"It's a real accomplishment, and it shows leadership," Thorman said, noting that the school's design saves water and electricity. "This school district is a leader in this direction. You are on the right track. You've done a job well, and I congratulate you," Thorman said.

The non-profit Collaborative for High Performance Schools was established in 2002 in response to California's energy crisis. It is composed of the major state agencies involved with building public schools, including public utilities, designers and school facility planners.

Chavez earned the award for surpassing state energy efficiency requirements by more than 34 percent. Reductions in annual energy consumption at Chavez save nearly \$30,000 compared to minimally compliant buildings.

The K-5 school, built in close cooperation with the City of Long Beach, includes an onsite health clinic and joint-use gymnasium. A partnership with adjacent Cesar Chavez

A partnership with adjacent Cesar Chavez Park allows public use of the school's gymnasium on weekends and after school on weekdays, in exchange for sectioning off a portion of the park as a playground during school hours.

Ten Schools Up For Top State Award

Ten elementary and K-8 schools in the Long Beach Unified School District are finalists for the prestigious California Distinguished School Award. Teams of educators will now visit the schools before determining whether the finalists will receive the top award.

Buffum, Edison, International, Muir, Prisk and Twain elementary schools qualified as finalists, along with Hudson, Newcomb, Robinson and Tincher K-8 schools. Validation visits will be held March 6 to 31.

Carver, Gant and Gompers elementary schools received Honorable Mention awards.

To earn the California Distinguished School Award, schools compete in rigorous selection and screening conducted by the California Department of Education. Winning schools may apply for the National Blue Ribbon Award.

The winning schools must demonstrate high academic expectations for all students, achievement above state standards, strong leadership, competent and caring teachers focused on standards, and outstanding curriculum.

Statewide winners also must show exemplary family involvement and partnerships with the business community, comprehensive guidance and counseling services, ample support for students with a wide range of needs, and a safe learning environment that promotes

(Continued from front page) being discharged into the storm drain systems. Other areas are sloped to channel storm water into planted areas. Drought tolerant landscaping and efficient irrigation reduce outdoor water consumption by 100,000 gallons per year compared to standard buildings.

Recycled materials were used throughout the school, which features post-consumer recycled ceiling tiles, toilet partitions, gypsum wallboard, aluminum window frames, curtain wall systems and rubberized playground. Builders also used materials that emitted fewer chemicals in ceiling tiles, wall insulation, flooring, wallboards and wall coverings.

Lighting systems at Chavez make efficient use of dimming devices, daylight sensors and occupancy sensors, while a highly efficient heating and cooling system reduces costs even further.

5,800 VIPS Contribute \$14.8 Million Annually

Thirty-seven years ago, the first dozen Volunteers in Public Schools (VIPS) began assisting children and teachers in two Long Beach Schools. Today 5,865 dedicated volunteers serve in local schools without receiving a penny. This month, each volunteer is receiving a certificate of appreciation at their school "for dedicated service and continuing personal commitment to our students and schools."

Volunteers' contributions have huge value. Based on average volunteer service of four hours a week during the school year, VIPS contribute 844,560 hours per year. At the national volunteer service rate of \$17.55 per hour, this past year they gave more than \$14.8 million in free assistance to our students and schools.

During these lean times for public education, their work is especially important and contributes directly to student success.
