Extra Efforts Bring Remarkable Results

As the school year ends, it's important to reflect on the impressive number of accomplishments and accolades that our schools have

earned thanks to your extra efforts. I deeply appreciate those who helped to win a record number of prestigious honors this year.

Equally important, I thank everyone who works so hard each day to help kids - not because they expect a prize or medal, but because they share a sense of duty and a moral obligation to give



children brighter futures. This includes our teachers, administrators, classified employees and other support staff, parents, business partners and many other community supporters who have put children at the forefront despite difficult obstacles. That's why our schools enjoy a level of success that many others seek to emulate.

Student achievement continues to show significant and steady gains. We've successfully navigated one of the most difficult school funding periods in the state's history without the damaging budget cuts seen in other school districts. What's more, in just the past few weeks, a stunning number of top national honors have been bestowed upon our schools. Consider just a few examples:

• The Washington, D.C.-based Coalition for Community Schools has just named Stevenson as the top elementary community school in the United States.

· Newsweek's annual ranking of America's top high schools includes more of our schools than ever: CAMS, Wilson, Renaissance and Poly high schools.

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Election Results

Unofficial results from the June 6 election show challenger David Barton has defeated incumbent Jim Choura in a runoff and will serve as Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education Member for District 5.

With more than a thousand absentee and provisional ballots yet to be counted, Barton has received 9,386 votes (52.2 percent) and Choura has received 8,611 votes (47.8 percent).

In the April 11 primary election, Mary Stanton retained her District 1 seat after defeating challenger Jim Deaton by a narrow margin. In District 3, Michael Ellis will replace Suja Lowenthal.

More Than 5,000 Grads to Accept Diplomas

Poised to receive their diplomas this month are 5,196 local high school seniors in the Long Beach Unified School District.

Carver Third Graders Master the Stock Market

Students from Carver Elementary School, Stephens Middle School and Millikan High School won first place in the Long Beach Press-Telegram's annual Stock Market Game. More than 100 teams from local schools competed for a first place prize of \$250.

Part of the Press-Telegram's Newspaper in Education project, the game allots teams \$10,000 in pretend money and allows eight weeks to invest it and track the stocks. The Carver third graders, led by teacher Jeana Luzzi, not only beat all other classes in grades 3-5, but also surpassed the earnings totals for teams in grades 6-8 and 9-12.

"It was the kids who chose," Luzzi told the Press-Telegram. "If I would have had to choose, we would have lost. I think adults worry a lot more than children do.'

The Carver students, who charted various stocks for three weeks before selecting top performers, earned a 40 percent return on their \$10,000 investment for the eight-week period.

Stephens teacher Soraya Powell and her eighth grade class won in their category. Millikan teacher Annetta Leone's 11th and 12th grade ROP financial sales and services class took first place in the grade 9-12 category. Another one of Leone's classes earned third place.

Other local winners included teacher Doug Heath's fourth grade class at Cubberley (second place), Luke Serviss' fourth grade class at Tincher (third place), Jean Davis' eighth grade class at Newcomb (second place) and Jill Heth's eighth grade class at Stanford (third place).

(Continued from front page) • The Robert A. Millikan Student Energy Team, or RAMSET, won the National Senior Level School of the Year Award in the National Energy Education Development (NEED) competition. Millikan earned first place among similar groups in over 40 states.

• Roosevelt Elementary School is one of only six schools nationwide to receive the 2006 National School Change Award for significant and sustained improvement in student achievement. The award is given by the National Principals Leadership Institute at the Fordham University Graduate School of Education.
