Grads' Scholarships **Exceed \$19 Million**

Graduating seniors in the Long Beach Unified School District have won more than \$19 million in academic scholarships this spring, along with numerous non-monetary honors and admissions to prestigious colleges and universities

The Class of 2006 so far has amassed \$19,618,289 in scholarships and monetary awards to reduce their college costs this fall.

Scholars at Poly High School earned full rides to the U.S. Air Force, U.S. Army and U.S. Naval Academies, Columbia, Harvard, Yale, MIT, USC, UCLA, Stanford, LMU, UC Berkeley, Cal State Long Beach, NYU, Claremont-McKenna and many other schools.

Wilson High School graduates earned 256 acceptances at all campuses of the University of California system and 437 acceptances at all campuses of California State University. Other acceptances included Princeton, Stanford, Columbia, Cornell, Northeastern, Notre Dame and the Meredith Manor International School of Horsemanship. Student Kenny Cruz earned 13 years of perfect attendance.

A student from California Academy of Mathematics and Science (CAMS) won a \$130,000 scholarship from Olin College of Engineering. Other CAMS students won scholarships to Occidental College, Princeton, Claremont McKenna, Florida Institute of Technology and Stanford.

Jordan High School students earned more scholarships than ever before in the school's history -- \$2.2 million -- including Gates Millennium and Long Beach Bar Association scholarships. Students gained admission to UC Berkeley, Smith, Howard, UCLA, UC Santa Barbara, University of Louisville, Cal State Fresno and other schools.

Millikan High School students earned acceptance to all UC and CSU campuses, Cornell, Northeastern and the U.S. Military Academy at Westpoint. Scholarships included the CSULB Presidential Scholarship, Occidental College President's Scholarship, and Long Beach Youth of the Year - District Level. Eighth Graders Win College Scholarships

Five eighth graders each earned \$500 college scholarships recently, courtesy of the Lyman W. and Nancy E. Lough Eighth Grade Scholarship Fund.

The awards go to students with average grades (2.0 to 2.9 GPA), good citizenship and a potential for future success. The winners traditionally are students who are beating the odds and continuing to learn despite tough circumstances, such as a disability, a difficult home life or other challenges.

Each winner receives a plaque. Their scholarship checks are presented upon enrollment in trade school or college.

Any Long Beach Unified school with eighth graders can nominate one student to become a finalist. The five scholarship winners are selected from a group of 20 finalists, each of whom receives an engraved plaque.

Individuals and corporations who would like to sponsor a scholarship in escrow may do so for only \$100 per year. The money is earmarked for a deserving student in eighth grade, with \$100 per year added during each year in high school for a total of \$500 by the time the student enters college. The scholarships help provide an incentive to prepare for college.

As part of the Lough Awards, an additional \$180-per-year scholarship from the Frangesch Memorial Fund went to student Erikson Medina of Newcomb. The fund was established in 1998 in memory of John Frangesch, a popular LBUSD elementary school principal who died shortly after his retirement.
