L.B. Head Start Leader Named Best in State

Linda James-Perry, director of Long Beach Unified School District Head Start, has earned the Administrator of the Year Award from the

California Head Start Association. The award is given to only one of the state's 1,927 Head Start programs.

"When I first found out that I had won, I was at a loss for words," said James-Perry. "Then I told our staff and parents that this is our award. I'm merely doing what I signed on to do, and to earn an award for that is humbling. It's another

great honor for the Long Beach Unified School District."

The award goes to administrators for their unique contributions, outstanding qualities,

ability to motivate and inspire their staff, and their positive impact on children and families. James-Perry accepted the award at the recent California Head Start Association Conference in Newport Beach.

Head Start is a comprehensive early childhood program established nationally in 1965 to alleviate the effects of poverty on preschool children and their families. In the Long Beach area, Head Start assists children and their families with preschools, Early Head Start centers and home-based services. Assistance includes education, health, nutrition, social services and parental involvement activities for families with children five years old and younger.

LBUSD Head Start earned high honors last year by meeting or exceeding more than 900 compliance items during an independent and exhaustive review. During a weeklong visit, a team of reviewers from throughout the nation perused 18 boxes of documents and interviewed parents, staff and others.

National, International Attention Increasing

A steady stream of dozens of educators from California, the nation and abroad have lined up to visit schools and offices of the Long Beach Unified School District in recent weeks, seeking to learn about successful practices.

In just the last three weeks, educators have arrived from Chicago, Dallas, the city of Wyoming in Michigan and Fresno. Up next are educators from Oxnard, Victorville, Santa Barbara and Japan.

Chicago educators are competing for the Broad Prize for Urban Education and wanted to observe a winner of the America's Best Urban Schools honor in action.

Fresno teachers and administrators observed interventions and inclusion efforts for special education students in math and literacy.

The superintendent and other educators from Wyoming, MI, observed ways to increase achievement for all students, including English Language Learners.

Long Beach Among Top U.S. Cities for Youth

Long Beach was recently named one of the 100 Best Communities for Young People in the United States by America's Promise – The Alliance for Youth.

The 100 Best list showcases cities and communities across the country that tackle challenges and demonstrate innovative efforts to deliver five promises that young people need to succeed – caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, effective education and opportunities to help others.

More than 750 communities nationwide entered the 2007 competition.

The team from Dallas included selected representatives serving on their Educational Commission. The goal in Dallas is to become a Broad Prize winner, and the team researched Long Beach's success in raising student achievement through professional development, data collection and research.

Victorville, Oxnard and Japanese educators are interested in local schools' use of Malcolm Baldrige continuous improvement strategies, which are used by some of the nation's leading businesses to boost efficiency and performance. Oxnard teachers and administrators also will meet with leaders and coaches from the math, history and language arts offices, and they will research English Language Development strategies in science.

Santa Barbara's team will research English pre-Advanced Placement, English Language Learner and math curricula, Advancement Via Individual Determination college readiness efforts, and multi-media technology.

District Honors STAR Elementary Schools

The Board of Education recently recognized 21 elementary schools with STAR Awards for significant gains in student achievement, surpassing last year's record of 18 schools.

Naples won the award for the fifth year. Four schools were honored for the fourth

time: Burbank, Keller, Lowell and Signal Hill. Eleven schools were three-year recipients: Addams, Alvarado, Barton, Buffum, Edison,

Emerson, Kettering, Longfellow, Los Cerritos, Madison and Muir.

Five schools were two-year winners: Burcham, King, Riley, Twain and Webster.

The STAR Award (Student success Terrific teaching Academic Results) is based upon four critical components:

• Tripling the state Academic Performance Index growth target;

• Meeting all aspects of federal Adequate Yearly Progress criteria;

 Advancing the achievement of the lowest performing sub-group of students at the school;

• Advancing the achievement of English Language Learners at the school.

Students, staff and parents from the winning schools participated in the awards ceremony. Among the participants was articulate Barton first grader Simone Abdur-Rahim, who told the Board, "I am a star at Barton because I am a scholar and always searching for more information and asking big questions."

State Superintendent Praises Lee School

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell stated in his February 6 State of Education Address:

"Schools that are making progress closing the achievement gap are schools that have infused their culture not only with high academic expectations but with high expectations for character and behavior. Walk into a school that has made strong academic achievement gains, a school like Lee Elementary School in Long Beach, and you'll see students who respect themselves and their classmates as scholars. You'll see words like 'responsibility,' integrity,' and 'commitment' prominently displayed."
