# National Study: LBUSD 'Beating the Odds'

Significant gains in student achievement by students in the Long Beach Unified School District are highlighted in a new national report, *Beating the Odds*, released by the Washington, D.C.-based Council of the Great City Schools.

Long Beach is listed among the nation's big-city school districts that continue to improve in reading and mathematics on statemandated tests, with evidence of demographic achievement gaps narrowing, and lower performing students making gains.

Long Beach is especially noted for achievement gains in fourth grade math and reading. The study contained encouraging news for many of the nation's large urban school systems. The report showed that students in 67 major city school systems in 37 states posted substantially higher test scores in 2006 than in 2002 in fourth-and eighth-grade mathematics and reading on state assessments.

"Urban schools are clearly increasing the numbers of students scoring above proficiency levels and decreasing the numbers at the lowest, contributing to overall progress where America wants it most," said Council Executive Director Michael Casserly.

#### **Rogers, Stanford Named Distinguished Schools**

Rogers and Stanford middle schools have won the state's top honor for public schools, the 2007 California Distinguished School Award. The two schools are among 171 statewide winners announced this week by State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell.

Both Rogers and Stanford are prior winners of the award. They are now eligible to apply for the National Blue Ribbon Award.

"These schools have shown they are able to meet the challenge of providing their students with the kind of rigorous education that is essential to their future success in the classroom and the workplace," O'Connell said. He described the winning schools as "extraordinary places with devoted teachers, dedicated staff, and motivated principals."

This year's winners represent about 7 percent of California's nearly 2,400 middle and high schools. Of those, only 478 schools met the eligibility criteria based on their student achievement. Of these, 279 schools chose to submit an application, describing in-depth their curriculum, instructional program, support for

Applications underwent intensive evaluation conducted by the California Department of Education in partnership with the California County Superintendents Educational Services Association, and with the help of many local educators from across the state. Finally, all nominee schools were reviewed during a site validation conducted by a team of external educators.

"A lot of hours were put into this award application," said Rogers Principal Thomas Huff, "but when the evaluation team comes out and validates what you're doing, that makes it all worthwhile for staff, students and parents."

Huff said he gives much of the credit to Rogers' teachers and other staff.

"The teachers expect good things from the kids, and they came through. Staff is in the trenches every day, and they filled out the application. This is only my second year here, so they know the ins and outs of Rogers more than I do."

#### **Social Workers Gain State, National Attention**

At a recent Board of Education meeting, local school social workers presented facts and figures on their efforts to serve students, many of whom must overcome serious obstacles at home, at school or in their neighborhoods.

Social workers and interns under their supervision serve as liaisons between home and school, providing key support to students and their families through counseling, crisis intervention, assessment, referrals to community agencies and other means.

During the 2006-07 fall semester, more than 1,200 students were referred for school social worker services. To meet the needs of those referred, the social workers provided interventions that included 68 counseling groups, 461 home visits, 246 classroom presentations and 40 parenting classes.

# **Credential Current?**

All certificated employees are required to keep their credentials and permits current at all times. The State of California does not allow a single minute of service without the valid credential or permit. If employees allow a credential or permit to expire, or if they do not provide the state with evidence of meeting renewal requirements, they cannot remain in paid status in California public school districts.

The California Commission on Teacher Credentialing requires all clear, professional and professional clear credential holders to renew their credentials online effective January 1, 2007. The process requires access to the Internet and payment by VISA or MasterCard. Go to **https://teachercred.ctc.ca.gov** and select "Renew Credential." # Local Schools Show Growth on State API

The state's latest round of student performance data shows steady, continued improvement by local schools. The Long Beach Unified School District's median Academic Performance Index of 750 is up by 14 points over last year, a rate of growth that surpasses that of the state. The state's ultimate target for all schools is 800, a benchmark that 25 schools here have now achieved, up by eight schools compared to the prior year.

The API reflects a school's composite academic achievement from a variety of statewide assessments, including the California High School Exit Exam and other state tests measuring knowledge and skills in language arts, math, science and history.

The recent state reports reflect a recalibration of the API results previously reported in August 2006 based on the addition of results from the 2006 science assessments in grades eight and ten.

# **Verify Dependents**

During the month of April, the Risk Management Office is verifying the eligibility of dependents covered by district-sponsored benefit plans. By making sure only eligible dependents are receiving benefits, costs for benefits districtwide can be controlled.

A letter was sent to all employees, at their home addresses, explaining how the verification process works. The letter also includes a confirmation form that needs to be signed and returned to Ceridian Benefits Service Center no later than April 30, 2007. Employees will have an opportunity to drop dependents who don't meet eligibility requirements from coverage, with no penalty at this time.

Employees should return their forms promptly. Dependents of employees who do not return a confirmation form by April 30 will lose their coverage as of May 31.
