Tincher History Teacher Earns Statewide Prize

Tincher Preparatory School teacher Annemarie Lander added another award to her growing list of honors

growing list of honors this month when she was named the Daughters of the American Revolution Outstanding Teacher of American History for the State of California.

The eighth grade history teacher last fall was one of 16 teachers in Los Angeles County to earn the Teacher of the Year Award.

"It's been an over-

whelming year," Lander said. "To be selected as teacher of the year and now this is just over the top. I feel very, very blessed. I'm just on cloud nine."

Lander is part of a team of teachers who initiated a Teaching American History Grant

four years ago to encourage active classroom participation through inquiry and problem solving. Her students are asked to think like a historian, philosopher, economist, geographer, Native American, Union general and others to gain historical perspective.

"Our students are learning to make a case, citing evidence and using primary sources," Lander said. "It's very exciting. I'm a 23-year veteran teacher, and I can't tell you how much fun I've been having these past four years."

Lander also credits the high quality of training, or professional development, that teachers receive from the school district's History Office for making a positive impact in the classroom.

"The professional development here is like no other," she said.

The Washington, D.C.-based Daughters of the American Revolution, founded in 1890, is a volunteer women's organization dedicated to promoting patriotism, preserving American history, and bettering education for children.

Henry Teacher Wins State Bilingual Award

Amanda Flores, first grade teacher at Henry Elementary School, has won the California Association for

Association for Bilingual Education 2007 Two-Way Immersion Teacher of the Year Award.

Henry Elementary offers two-way immersion instruction, allowing students who are fluent English speakers and students who are fluent Spanish speakers to learn together in the same classroom. The goal is for all students to become

bilingual, biliterate and knowledgeable about what it means to live in a multicultural society.

The school's principal, Claire Alvarez, surprised Flores by announcing the news recently

in the teacher's class, where students and parents had just returned from a field trip.

"It was the perfect setting, because it's all about the children and the parents. Everyone was so congratulatory," Flores said. "The news spread very quickly."

Flores, who has taught at Henry for the past 14 years, will accept the award at a two-way immersion conference this summer in Burlingame, Calif.

"The award just makes me think of the great responsibility we have as teachers to set the direction for our students and help them to be as powerful as they can be," Flores said. "In this program, that means being powerful in two languages."

As a winner, Flores will receive a scholarship for a three-week course in Spanish language and culture to be held in Spain in July. In addition, she receives \$1,000 to be used for airfare to Spain.

Middle, K-8 Achievement Honored by District

Sixteen local middle and K-8 schools have earned awards from the Long Beach Unified School District for significant growth in academic achievement. The district's Office of Middle and K-8 Schools recognized each of the winners at a recent Board of Education meeting.

The Pyramid Awards, recognizing the cooperative efforts of parents, school staff, the principal and students, went to schools that demonstrated significant gains on state tests and other measurements.

Nine of the schools were recognized for more than tripling their schoolwide growth target on the state Academic Performance Index (API) or for maintaining the state's ultimate target for all schools, an API of 800 or above. These schools met state and national achievement goals in English and math, and closed achievement gaps by meeting growth targets for all subgroups of children. The schools are Bancroft, Cubberley, Hill, Hudson, Hughes, Newcomb, Rogers, Stanford and Tincher.

Seven other schools were recognized for demonstrating growth toward meeting multiple criteria for student performance. Those schools are Avalon, Hoover, Lindbergh, Monroe, Powell, Robinson and Sutter.

Edison Wins National Urban School Award

Edison Elementary School has won the 2007 National Center for Urban School Transformation's Excellence in Education Award. Only seven schools were selected as winners nationwide.

To compete for the award, schools must meet a long list of student performance criteria, including attainment of national Adequate Yearly Progress goals, high attendance, low suspension rates and high percentages of students completing rigorous courses of study, or awards for school-wide excellence in academic disciplines.

"We're elated to be recognized with this high honor," Edison Principal Matty Zamora said. "We cried tears of joy when we heard the news. We're all so proud of what everyone at this school has accomplished. This was a total team effort of community members, teachers, students and staff."

The award will be presented in May during NCUST's symposium on high performing schools, where winners of the award will share their success stories with more than 400 educators from throughout the nation. Also scheduled to be honored is the Long Beach Unified School District's Signal Hill Elementary School, one of 18 finalists for the award.

Criteria for the award are based on 20 years of research into what separates high (Continued on back page)

Stanford, Rogers Up For Top State Honor

Stanford and Rogers middle schools have qualified as statewide finalists for the prestigious California Distinguished School Award. Teams of educators recently visited the schools to determine whether the finalists will receive the top award from the California Department of Education.

To earn the award, schools compete in rigorous selection and screening. Winning schools may apply for the National Blue Ribbon Award.

The winning schools must demonstrate high academic expectations for all students, achievement above state standards, strong leadership, competent and caring teachers focused on standards, and outstanding curriculum.

Statewide winners also must show exemplary family involvement and partnerships with the business community, comprehensive guidance and counseling services, ample support for students with a wide range of needs, and a safe learning environment that promotes citizenship, caring, fairness, respect, responsibility and trustworthiness.

Both Rogers and Stanford are previous winners of this honor. This year's winners will be announced Tuesday, April 17.

(Continued from front page) performing urban schools from lower performing schools, said Pamela Engler, administrative coordinator for NCUST, which notified the winning schools last week.

Among those key criteria are rigorous curriculum, strong performance across all subgroups of students, and positive relationships among parents, teachers, the principal and other school leaders.

Edison, located in downtown Long Beach, has shown strong academic growth in recent years. In math, for instance, approximately 84 percent of Edison students are now proficient, up from 37 percent just three years ago. The school's state Academic Performance Index has grown to 796, up 119 points in the last two years and now just four points shy of the state's target of 800 for all schools. Edison serves high numbers of socioeconomically disadvantaged children, with 99 percent of students receiving free and reduced-price lunches.

The NCUST award is Edison's sixth award in the last two years. Last year, the school earned the prestigious California Distinguished School Award. Edison has been honored twice by the Long Beach Unified School District as a STAR high achieving school, and twice with the Title I Academic Achievement Award.

The NCUST was founded as part of the QUALCOMM Institute for Innovation and Educational Success at San Diego State University.

The other six national winners of the NCUST Award this year are schools in Mt. Vernon, N.Y.; Columbus, Ohio; Austin, Texas; Rancho Cucamonga, Calif.; Atlanta and Detroit.
