Rotary Club Donates To School Libraries

Long Beach Rotary raised approximately \$36,000 in donations and matching funds for local school libraries during the club's regular meeting last week.

Poly High School alumnus Frank Newell, past president of Long Beach Rotary, solicited more than \$21,000 in donations from the audience in about ten minutes. Private foundations will provide \$15,000 in matching funds, bringing the total to more than \$36,000.

These funds will buy about 20,000 books for local school libraries this year. Rotary already has donated more than 109,000 books to local school libraries in recent years.

CSEA Gets 4.53% Raise in Tentative Contract

The Long Beach Unified School District has reached a tentative contract agreement with the local chapter of the California School Employees Association. The tentative deal includes a 4.53 percent salary increase retroactive to July 1, 2007.

If approved, the agreement would remain in effect until October 2009, although 2008-09 salaries would be reopened for negotiations next year. The deal includes several contract language changes, revisions to employee evaluation forms, and enhancements to staff development, or training. No changes in employee benefits were proposed.

ANOTHER DIP -Enrollment in the Long Beach Unified School District declined significantly again this fall. After the first month of school, 88,414 students were enrolled. a decrease of 1,910 compared to the same time last year. Total enrollment is now lower than it was nine years ago. Enrollment dips here and in other school districts mean less school fundina. Much of the decline at local schools has occurred in the elementary grades as young families seek more affordable housing elsewhere.

Tickets are available in advance from high school band members or at the entrance to the performance. Suggested donation is \$5. All proceeds benefit high school band programs.


