State Board OKs Flexible Funding for LBUSD

The California State Board of Education has unanimously approved an innovative pilot project that will give the Long Beach Unified School District much needed flexibility in the way it spends certain funds. The aim is to improve student achievement as quickly and efficiently as possible.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell proposed the initiative to the state board after consultation with Long Beach. The pilot project is part of a new partnership between LBUSD and the Fresno Unified School District, which are the third and fourth largest school districts in California. The two school districts have committed to sharing knowledge and resources to increase graduation rates and prepare students for college and the working world.

"This is the first of many steps we're taking to give our schools greater flexibility to use funds more efficiently," said Christopher J. Steinhauser, superintendent of schools for the Long Beach Unified School District.
"Ultimately, this flexibility will allow us to

help more students achieve at higher levels. It's a bold step by the state superintendent. We deeply appreciate Jack O'Connell's support."

The state board specifically approved two waiver requests. One affected middle and high school supplemental counseling, allowing Long Beach to expand this service to sixth grade. LBUSD's own Academic and Career Success for All Initiative calls for this expansion.

Another waiver on instructional materials provides the flexibility to use these funds for technology equipment once basic textbook and other requirements have been met. This effort stems from Long Beach's own Technology Master Plan.

Long Beach drafted both waivers in consultation with parents and teachers.

The move by the state comes as educators and parents statewide, including in Long Beach, have staged rallies protesting proposed state cuts to education.

Broad Prize Visitors To See Four Schools

A team of educators and researchers will visit local schools June 3 to 6 to help determine whether the Long Beach Unified School District will win public education's biggest prize, the national Broad Prize for Urban Education.

The school district last month was named, for a remarkable fourth time, as one of five finalists for the prize. Only one other school system nationwide has achieved this honor more times than Long Beach — Boston, a five-time finalist.

Long Beach is now competing with four other school districts for the Broad Prize, which will be announced Oct. 14 at the Museum of Modern Art in New York City.

The reviewers will visit Edison and Signal Hill elementary schools, Hoover Middle School and Millikan High School to collect data and observe best practices.

The top winner receives \$500,000 in student scholarships. Four remaining finalists receive \$125,000 each in scholarships. In all, the prize money totals \$1 million.

The four other finalists include two school systems in Texas and two in Florida.

Long Beach won the top prize in 2003.

Service Learning Hits Million-Hour Mark

Local high school students have provided more than a million hours of service to the community since the Board of Education approved a service learning graduation requirement in 2003.

With students now volunteering at a rate of more than 400,000 hours per year, total service since the 2003 inception has reached 1,170,151 hours. That equates to 48,756 days, or more than 133 years.

At the \$18.05 national hourly rate of value placed on volunteer service, students in the Long Beach Unified School District have provided the equivalent of \$21 million in service to the community.

Beginning with the Class of 2007, all students complete 40 hours of service learning, or community service, to fulfill the high school graduation requirement. Service learning allows students to apply what they're learning in class, and it involves dozens of community, business and nonprofit organizations.

Aside from giving students a competitiive edge as they apply to colleges and universities, service learning also helps to improve students' achievement, thinking skills, character and behavior. It strengthens community organizations and increases support for schools.

(Continued from first page) spending is critical to helping school districts live within their means while remaining focused on student achievement.

"There is no silver bullet to closing the achievement gap that is leaving too many of our poor, Latino, and African American students behind their peers who are white or Asian," O'Connell said. "But some districts have implemented effective practices that we should study and try to replicate. I am pleased that Long Beach and Fresno unified school districts are willing to work together toward closing the gap and improving student achievement. I hope that all districts in our state will benefit from the best practices borne by this partnership."

The waivers approved by the state board will maintain all state and national accountability requirements but give both districts more flexibility in how they spend restricted funds.

Combined, the Long Beach and Fresno districts serve more than 150,000 students, most of whom are low-income, students of color, and/or English learners. The school districts have committed to capitalize on the knowledge they both have gained from their continuous improvement efforts, including Long Beach's participation in Broad Foundation programs, and Fresno's work with the Center for Reform of School Systems.

The Fresno-Long Beach partnership has three major goals:

- achieving a 100 percent graduation rate,
- preparing all graduates for success in higher education or a career with significant economic growth potential, and
- helping all students meet California's academic standards at the proficient level or better with a special focus on raising the achievement of large numbers of English learners.

Poly Musicians a Hit

A sold-out concert by Poly violin prodigy Aishu Venkataraman and the Poly High School Jazz band helped to raise thousands of dollars for the Baylor College of Medicine's International Pediatric AIDS Initiative.

The recent concert at Cal State Long Beach was part of Aishu's service learning project. She has raised more than \$14,000 for the Baylor project from concert proceeds and sales of her new album, *Bliss*.

Also performing with Aishu at the concert were four renowned Indian drummers, including her father, V.R. Venkataraman.

Aishu is a sophomore honor student and will earn her college degree in music by the time she completes high school. Her goal is to raise \$25,000 for the pediatric AIDS effort.

NASA Training

Lakewood High School teachers Lindsay Penney and Myles Loveall have been selected to participate in NASA's Data Acquisition training this summer. They are part of a 21person team selected from across the nation.

The workshop will be held at NASA's Langley Research Center in Virginia. The training focuses on using NASA data for atmospheric and Earth science teachers and amateurs.

The project enables K-12 teachers and students, as well as citizen scientists, to explore the large volumes of data that NASA collects about the Earth from space. Penney and Loveall will be developing lessons which will enable students to use scientific inquiry and math skills as they access the NASA data.
