Title I Awards Go To Ten LBUSD Schools

Ten local schools are among 239 statewide to be named 2007-08 Title I Academic Achievement Award winners. State Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell announced the winners this week.

Local winners are Addams, Alvarado, Bixby, Edison, Gompers, Keller, Lee, Riley, Signal Hill and Webster elementary schools.

"These outstanding schools have shown that with hard work and tight focus, the challenges of poverty, language, and socioeconomic background can be overcome," O'Connell said.

The awards recognize schools receiving federal Title I funds for socioeconomically disadvantaged students. The schools must demonstrate that all students are making significant progress toward proficiency on California's academic content standards. These standards define the knowledge, concepts and skills students are expected to acquire at each grade level.


The criteria to qualify for the award have become more rigorous each year. Title I schools must demonstrate the achievement level of twice the state-determined schoolwide Academic Performance Index growth target, meet all significant subgroup targets, and achieve twice the API growth target for the socioeconomically disadvantaged subgroup for two consecutive years.

Winning schools also must have attained federal Adequate Yearly Progress targets two years in a row, and at least 40 percent of the enrolled students in each school must meet the poverty index.

The winners will be recognized at an April conference in Century City.

CAMS, Poly, Lakewood Among Best in U.S.

The first annual ranking of America's Best High Schools by U.S. News and World Report includes the California Academy of Mathematics and Science, Polytechnic High School and Lakewood High School.

CAMS earned a gold medal, Poly earned silver, and Lakewood earned bronze.

Gold medal winners are those that made the top 100 out of nearly 19,000 public high schools nationwide. CAMS earned a ranking of 21. Only 405 schools earned silver, and 1,086 earned bronze, putting CAMS, Poly and Lakewood in the top 8 percent of high schools nationwide.

U.S. News and World Report published its full list of schools online at **www.usnews.com**. The magazine hit newsstands Monday, Dec. 3.

CAMS is a 600-student regional high school at Cal State Dominguez Hills and is run by the Long Beach Unified School District.

Ten More Teachers Earn National Certification

Ten more teachers in the Long Unified School District have earned the highest professional distinction in teaching, National Board Certification.

The newest certifications bring the total number of nationally certified teachers in the school district to a record high of 114.

The rigorous certification is a year-long process that involves writing extensive portfolios, videotaping classroom instruction and participating in a day of written exercises. Fewer than 1 percent of the nation's 3 million teachers earn the certification each year.

During bargaining in 2000, the school district and the Teachers' Association of Long Beach agreed to support teachers who are interested in applying for National Board Certification by offering pre-candidacy and candidacy support programs, payment of application fees (\$2,565), and a 10 percent salary increase for teachers who obtain certification. In addition, National Board Certified teachers are eligible for a \$20,000 bonus from the State of California if they teach at low-performing schools.

The National Board for Professional Teaching Standards provides the certification. The board is a nonprofit, nonpartisan and nongovernmental agency governed by a 63-member board of directors, the majority of whom are classroom teachers. The board establishes rigorous standards for what accomplished teachers should know and be able to do. "We're excited, thrilled and pleasantly surprised," said CAMS Principal Janice Filer. "Being a small high school, we work as a close-knit family. The credit for this honor goes to the entire CAMS community."

The U.S. News methodology was developed by School Evaluation Services, an education data research business

run by Standard & Poor's.

U.S. News analyzed 18,790 public high schools in 40 states. A three-step process determined the best high schools. The first two steps ensured that the schools serve all of their students well,



using state proficiency standards as the measuring benchmarks. For those schools that made it past the first two steps, a third step assessed the degree to which schools prepared students for college.

In judging college readiness, U.S. News used Advanced Placement data as the benchmark for success. AP is a College Board program that offers college-level courses at high schools across the nation. A "college readiness index" was computed based on AP participation rates and how well students performed on AP tests.

Gold medal winner CAMS accepts applications from students from 80 middle schools in 11 participating districts—usually coming from the top 30 percent of their class. More than 40 percent of CAMS students qualify for free or reduced-price meals, yet they consistently have UC admission rates that are among the highest in California.

In 2004, CAMS earned the coveted National Blue Ribbon Award. By the time students graduate from CAMS, they have completed the equivalent of six years of science, (Continued on back page)

(Continued from front page) four years of math and, on average, have earned 22 college credits. One hundred percent of the CAMS Class of 2007 went on to college.

To determine the U.S. News rankings, the magazine examined whether each school's students were performing better in math and reading than statistically expected for the average student in their state.

For those schools that made it past this first step, the second step determined whether the school's African American, Hispanic and lowincome students were performing better than average for similar students in the state.

Schools that made it through those first two steps became eligible to be judged nationally on the final step: college-readiness performance. This was calculated using a weighted average of the AP participation rate and other factors.

First 5 LA is a child-advocacy organization created by California voters.




