Board OKs \$40M in Funding Shifts, Cuts

The Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education has approved more than \$40 million in funding shifts and budget cuts to cope with the state budget crisis. The school district must prepare for the worst while the governor and Legislature work to finalize the state budget in coming months.

The cuts here include broad-based reductions throughout the school district, allowing LBUSD to avoid issuing the dreaded March layoff notices that so many other school districts are issuing to hundreds of teachers.

College Admission, AP Enrollment Soar

With soaring numbers of local students enrolling in rigorous Advanced Placement courses, and more high school graduates here earning admission to Cal State Long Beach, the national College Board honored Long Beach Unified School District Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser last week with its highest honor.

The College Board awarded Steinhauser the Joe Allen Exemplar Award on Feb. 26 at its annual Western Regional Meeting in Newport Beach.

State-of-Art Rowing Machines Boost Fitness

Students and teachers have quickly begun using a recent shipment of 171 state-of-the-art rowing machines delivered as part of a \$1 million grant to create innovative fitness centers at local high schools. The Long Beach Unified School District is the first school district in the nation to obtain such quantities of these hightech machines that improve aerobic capacity, muscle strength, endurance and flexibility.

This is cutting edge physical education," said Joan Van Blom, physical education curriculum leader for the school district. "It's a big step toward increasing student participation in vigorous physical activity." Van Blom is an Olympic medalist in rowing and holds the indoor rowing world record for her age and weight category.

Millikan, Cabrillo, Jordan and Wilson high schools received the machines this year, with Lakewood, Renaissance and Poly scheduled to receive the devices during the next two years under the three-year, federal grant. The grant also pays for training to help physical education teachers incorporate the machines into their instruction. The machines include computer screens that allow students to monitor their performance so they can meet fitness goals as specified by state standards.

Several middle and K-8 schools also have incorporated the machines into their instruction using school-site funds, including Bancroft, Cubberley, DeMille, Franklin, Hamilton, Hill, Hoover, Jefferson, Lindbergh, Marshall, Robinson, Rogers and Stanford.

Mohr-Silofau Wins State P.E. Teacher of Year


Wilson Classical High School physical education teacher Ruth Mohr-Silofau has won the statewide High School Teacher of the Year Award from the California Association for

Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance. She will be honored tomorrow at CAHPERD's state conference in Riverside.

"It is really an honor considering it is for the entire state," Mohr-Silofau said. "I am most happy for our students. our school, the school district and for our profession.'

The rigorous award

selection process began in September and included a written portfolio and five letters of recommendation. A search committee interviewed students and observed a class.



To win this year's honor, Mohr-Silofau demonstrated that she conducts high quality instruction as reflected in the state's Physical Education Content Standards, serves as a positive role model, participates in training and provides professional leadership.

College Admission, AP Enrollment Soar

(Continued from front page) admission to Cal State Long Beach has increased 46 percent over the past five years, according to newly released numbers. And the latest numbers on Advanced Placement enrollment here show a 65 percent increase since 2003, with African American students' participation increasing by 85 percent, and Latino students' participation increasing by 90 percent. Latino students have now emerged as the ethnic group taking the most AP courses here, finally surpassing the AP enrollment of white students. More than 50 percent of all students here are Latino.

"These achievements reflect the hard work of our employees, parents and community partners," Steinhauser said. "The credit goes to them for staying focused on high achievement for all students, despite tough challenges."

The College Board is a not-for-profit membership association whose mission is to connect students to college success and opportunity. Each year, the College Board serves seven million students and their parents, 23,000 high schools, and 3,500 colleges through major programs and services in college admissions, guidance, assessment, financial aid, enrollment, and teaching and learning. Among its best-known programs are the SAT, the PSAT/NMSQT and Advanced Placement.

Under Steinhauser's leadership during the past five years, LBUSD has reached out to hundreds of students who may not have initially considered themselves to be college material. The school district became one of the first to administer the PSAT to every 10th grader, testing their college potential and then placing them in summer workshops and specialized courses that strengthen reading, writing and study skills.

This extra support builds students' tenacity, helping them to believe in themselves and not be discouraged by difficult work.

The Joe Allen Exemplar Award acknowledges outstanding professional achievement, specifically significant contributions on behalf of students, over an extended period of time. The award also recognizes contributions in support of professional colleagues. LBUSD each year provides extensive professional development, or training, for Advanced Placement teachers. Joe Allen served as one of the deans of the College Board's Summer Institute for many years and was a champion of under-represented students.

In 2007, the number of LBUSD students earning admission to Cal State Long Beach was 1,095, up from 750 in 2003.

Among the most dramatic increases in admissions to Cal State Long Beach:

Teachers Ratify Deal

The membership of the Teachers Association of Long Beach has ratified a tentative labor agreement with the school district giving teachers a 4.53 percent salary increase retroactive to July 1, 2007.

TALB members approved the deal in an election in which 98 percent expressed support for the contract, according to the *Long Beach Press-Telegram*.

The proposed contract must now be approved by the Los Angeles County Office of Education before going to the Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education for approval.

• Between 2006 and 2007 alone, the number of Cabrillo High School students gaining admission to Cal State Long Beach increased by 27 percent. Since 2003, Cabrillo student admissions have increased by 195 percent.

• Jordan High School admissions rose by 12 percent from 2006 to 2007. Since 2003, Jordan student admissions have increased by 78 percent

This school year, 4,281 students are enrolled in AP courses in the school district. That's up from 2,589 in 2003. The number of African American students here enrolled in AP courses has jumped from 224 to 415 since 2003. The number of Latino students enrolled in AP courses here has increased from 760 to 1,445 since 2003. Latino enrollment in AP courses here now surpasses white enrollment, which is 1,320.
