Summer Enrichment Earns Golden Bell Award

The Long Beach Unified School District's Summer Enrichment Program has won the prestigious Golden Bell Award, the highest honor from the California School Boards Association. The award will be presented Dec. 6 in San Diego.

Summer Enrichment, developed in 2001 by the Long Beach School for Adults, serves first through eighth grade students.

"I am very excited for the outstanding SEP team to receive recognition for creating a program that sparks creativity and ignites passion for learning while increasing student achievement," said Vicki Roberts, program specialist. "We appreciate the families that have supported this program since 2001, the high school students who have collaborated through community service, and the Summer Recreation staff for being awesome partners. Thank you to Molina Healthcare, Inc. for providing scholarships that have made enrichment classes available to more students since 2004."

Each enrichment class in art, chess, computers, drama, fitness, history, math, music, science, sewing or Spanish provides a unique opportunity for the teacher and up to 20 children to explore a subject in-depth for three hours a day for three weeks. Up to 25 class titles are offered each summer.

Feedback from parents each year shows a high level of satisfaction with each class. Data show that children increase their factual knowledge and acquire a greater depth of understanding. Parents pay a fee, but dozens

of scholarships are available.

Classes are held at Tincher Preparatory School. Classes also have been held at Garfield Elementary School, an all-scholarship site, with funds coming from Molina Healthcare and the Long Beach Education Foundation.

The innovative program uses laptop and desktop computers, Smartboards, and digital video and camera equipment in computer, drama and history classes. The drama class for third through fifth grades puts on a musical production each 3-week session. They produce the audience program, build and paint props and backdrops, handle the sound and light system and film the production. Each child has a role in the drama. High school students earn community service hours, a graduation requirement, by working with the program.

Summer Enrichment is connected to LBUSD's mission to support the personal and intellectual success of every student, every day. The program promotes these goals by providing a fun yet challenging curriculum that incorporates reading, writing and interaction. The students were among 525 seniors to receive the NCTE's Achievement Awards in Writing.

The recipients were chosen from 1,789 students nominated in their junior year by their teachers

The awards are based on students' samples of their own best prose or verse and on impromptu themes that are written under supervision. A team of English teachers chosen from throughout the students' home state judges the writing, looking especially for writing that demonstrates effective and imaginative use of language to inform and move an audi-

Hundreds of Students Attend Math Camp

More than a thousand parents and students attended the Seventh Grade Math Conference recently at Cal State Long Beach to prepare for success in high school and beyond.

The conference was organized by the Long Beach Unified School District as part of its recently announced Long Beach College Promise. The Promise, signed by LBUSD, CSULB and Long Beach City College, contains several measures to help make a college education more accessible to local students.

Students gathered at the CSULB Pyramid for a welcome, then participated in more than 20 sessions related to math curriculum, real world applications, counseling and technology. LBUSD teachers conducted the math sessions. Students also toured the campus.

The event was funded in part by a federal GEAR-UP college readiness grant and is part of the school district's Academic and Career Success Initiative, approved by the Board of Education earlier this year.

All certificated employees are required to keep their credentials and permits current at all times. The State of California does not allow a single minute of service without possessing a valid credential or permit. If employees allow a credential or permit to expire, or if they do not provide the state with evidence of meeting renewal requirements, they cannot remain in paid status in any California public school district

The Commission on Teacher Credentialing requires all clear, professional and professional clear credential holders to renew their credentials online. Principal for a Day event, which is co-sponsored by the Long Beach Area Chamber of
Commerce, the Long Beach Unified School
District and the Long Beach Education
Foundation.

At last year's Principal for a Day, local business and community leaders pledged \$130,000 to fund tutoring for hundreds of local high school students who are struggling to become proficient in Algebra I. The pledges started with a \$40,000 challenge grant from philanthropists Mike and Arline Walter.

This year's debriefing featured testimonials from high school tutors who are assisting their peers while earning \$9 an hour, thanks to last year's donations.

"The kids really seem to like it, and for us as tutors it feels really good to help our peers and do what we can to help our school," Wilson student Jordan Shefrin said.

Other guest principals also were impressed: "The quality of education amazes me," said Kathy Berry, community relations director at Community Hospital of Long Beach. She visited Millikan High School. "It makes me want to go back to high school again. It's incredible what they're doing with those smaller learning communities."

"I was very impressed by the programs that they're able to offer at the high school," said Diane Dubois, a city council member in Lakewood. She toured Lakewood High School. "They've come a long way from four, five years ago. You have a lot of opportunities for kids – AP (Advanced Placement) and other opportunities."

"I was pleased to go into every single classroom at Burroughs (Elementary School)," said Pat Towner of Boy Scouts of America. "You could hear a pin drop. Those teachers were teaching, and the students were listening."

Chairing this year's event were Ryan Alsop, director of Government and Public Affairs for Long Beach Water, and Shaun Lumachi, president of Chamber Advocacy.
