NEWSWEEK RANKINGS LBUSD Has 6 of Top High Schools in U.S.

Newsweek's newly released annual rankings of America's top high schools include six schools in the Long Beach Unified School

District, a record high for the district.

The annual list represents only the top 5 percent of all U.S. public high schools.

Joining the list of elite schools for the first time were Long Beach's Millikan High School and Catalina Island's Avalon High School. Returning to the list this

Returning to the list this year were Poly High School, Wilson Classical High School, Renaissance High School for the Arts, and the California Academy of Mathematics and Science.

To determine the rankings, *Newsweek* takes the total number of Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate or Cambridge tests given at a school in 2007 and divides by the number of graduating seniors.

Record numbers of students here have enrolled in AP courses this year, helping them to earn college credit while still in high school, giving them a competitive edge and potentially saving their parents thousands of dollars on college tuition.

AP enrollment here shows a 65 percent increase since 2003.

Sports Illustrated List Includes Poly Again

Just days after making *Newsweek*'s list of top U.S. high schools for academics, Poly made *Sports Illustrated*'s top 25 list for athletics

Sports Illustrated ranked Poly at No. 6 in the nation.

The athletics ranking is one of the most selective in all of sports. Poly achieved the No. 1 spot in 2005, topping a list of more than 38,000 high schools in the U.S. At the time, the magazine

also recognized Poly for its rigorous academics, including its PACE magnet.

Ranking criteria include the number of championship titles and college athletes produced by the school.

Poly's McBennett Wins Employee of the Year

Poly High School office supervisor Phoebe McBennett accepted the Classified Employee of the Year Award recently at the annual employee barbecue, where loyal fans of the secretary cheered at the surprise announcement.

McBennett was one of 45 employees, including five finalists, vying for this year's award.

"I'd like to thank the support staff and everyone at Poly," McBennett said after the announcement. "They're the best support staff. None of us does our work alone. It takes all of us working together. I'm happy to work in this school district. I think it's the best district. I'd also like to thank our principal, Shawn Ashley, because I know he had a lot to do with this."

Several Poly teachers and administrators nominated McBennett for the award. She has served as the school's secretary at Poly – one of California's largest high schools – for more than 13 years.

Schools Excel On State API Rankings

Ninety percent of schools in the Long Beach Unified School District are either at or above average compared to schools with similar demographics statewide, according to the latest state Academic Performance Index rankings.

When compared to schools with similar socioeconomic, linguistic and other challenges among their student population, an impressive 59 percent of schools here also ranked among the top 30 percent statewide.

The latest results are consistent with recent findings by The Broad Foundation, which has recognized LBUSD for performing better than expected when compared to other California school districts. The school district in April was named by Broad as one of the top five urban districts in the nation.

"Phoebe is an invaluable asset to Poly," wrote English teacher Jeanne Vitale in nominating McBennett. "She makes everyone's job easier because of her competence, her kindness, and her knowledge of the school and the district."
