Stimulus to Provide \$56 Million to LBUSD

The \$787 billion federal economic stimulus package signed by President Barack Obama this week will bring an estimated \$56 million to the Long Beach Unified School District over the next two years.

The funding comes at a time when LBUSD is struggling to close a \$70 million gap in its budget due to the state's fiscal crisis. Earlier this week, the LBUSD Board of Education took a step toward notifying 46 administrators, counselors and social workers that they could be laid off this year. The step was preliminary and does not mean that the warnings will be issued or that layoffs will occur.

LBUSD is still looking at ways to reduce expenditures because of the size of the state budget shortfall and in turn LBUSD's budget shortfall.

Hill Classical Middle School is one step away from earning the state's highest educa-tional honor, the California Distinguished School award.

A validation visit is scheduled for Feb. 27. "If we get through this one, it will be our second win," Principal Peter Davis said. Hill last won the award in the 2005-06 school year.

Hill was one of only 48 schools in Los Angeles County to qualify for a visit, and it was one of only 250 eligible to apply in California, out of 2,500 middle schools.

Middle, K-8 Schools **Honored for Progress**

Six local middle and K-8 schools earned awards from the Long Beach Unified School District this week for significant growth in academic achievement.

The district's Office of Middle and K-8 Schools recognized each of the winners at a Board of Education meeting.

The Pyramid Awards, recognizing the cooperative efforts of parents, school staff, the principal and students, went to schools that at least doubled their schoolwide growth target for the state Academic Performance Index; met the federal Adequate Yearly Progress criteria in English, math and API; and met academic growth targets for all subgroups.

This year's winners are Tincher K-8 Preparatory Academy, Rogers Middle School, Cubberley K-8 School, Hill Classical Middle School, Newcomb K-8 Academy and Stanford Middle School.

"Three Cups of Tea," which won the 2007 Kiriyama Prize for nonfiction, tells of Mortenson's efforts to fight the root causes of terrorism - ignorance and poverty - by building schools in the most remote regions of Pakistan and Afghanistan, where the Taliban and Al-Qaeda flourish. Mortenson has just been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize, and is currently debuting two young-reader versions of his book, which are now available for purchase in stores.

In local schools, elementary librarians will receive a picture book version, "Listen to the Wind," so that teachers may bring students to school libraries for read-alouds.

Middle and K-8 schools will receive a middle school version class set to be rotated among eighth graders, along with five copies for the librarian.

Each high school will receive 45 copies to rotate among tenth grade classes, as well as five copies for each librarian.

Mortenson also is speaking from 12 to 1 p.m. at Wilson Classical High School, where students from other high schools and middle schools also will attend. No remaining seats are available for the Wilson event.

Since 2002, the Long Beach Public Library Foundation has been encouraging the love of reading through Long Beach Reads One Book, which brings the community together to read and discuss one book through a wide range of activities. This year's celebration will run from March 6 to 14.

Other events include an all-day public read of the book hosted by Justin Rudd, toddler


