LBUSD Again Among Top Five School Systems in Nation

For a record-tying fifth time, the Long Beach Unified School District was named among the top five school systems in the nation by The Eli and Edythe Broad Foundation.

Long Beach now will compete with four other districts for public education's largest prize, The Broad Prize for Urban Education, which will be announced on September 16 in Washington, D.C. Only Boston Public Schools shares the distinction of reaching the finals every year that it has been eligible for the award.

The top winner receives \$1 million in student scholarships, while the other four remaining finalists receive \$250,000 each. School districts cannot apply for the annual award. Instead, an independent panel reviews vast amounts of student achievement data from 100 big-city school districts nationwide. Of these 100 school systems, only five are chosen as finalists.

"Long Beach's commitment to students continues to bear fruit," said LBUSD Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser. "It is a remarkable achievement to be recognized yet again as one of the top school systems in the country, especially during such challenging fiscal times. We deeply appreciate the hard work of our teachers, parents, support staff, administrators, Board of Education and countless business and community partners. Together we're defying the odds and building brighter futures for every student, every day."

Among the reasons for Long Beach's selection was that, in 2008, its African-American, Hispanic and low-income students achieved higher average proficiency rates than their counterparts statewide in reading and math at all grade levels: elementary, middle and high school. Between 2005 and 2008, Long Beach narrowed achievement gaps between its Hispanic students and the state's white students in math at all grade levels, as well as in middle and high school reading. Moreover, between 2006 and 2008, Long Beach increased both the participation rate and the average score for Hispanic students taking the SAT.

CAMS, Hill Named Distinguished Schools

The California Academy of Mathematics and Science and Hill Classical Middle School have been selected as 2009 California

Distinguished Schools, an annual award for the state's most exemplary and inspiring public schools. CAMS and Hill are among 261 winners announced recently by Jack O'Connell, state



superintendent of public instruction. These schools will be recognized on May 29 during a ceremony at the Disneyland Hotel.

This year, the extensive selection process required sites to highlight two "signature" practices that directly impact student success and can be replicated elsewhere. Teams of experts then visited the schools to gather additional evidence about the effectiveness of these practices.

California Distinguished Schools "have shown they are able to increase the achievement of all their students and have provided evidence that they are closing the achievement gaps," O'Connell said. The dual emphasis on overall performance and achievement gap closure mirrors the criteria for The Broad Prize, a national award honoring urban school systems, for which the Long Beach Unified School District is again a finalist.

Of California's nearly 2,400 middle and high schools, only 341 met the Distinguished Schools eligibility criteria based on their student achievement. This short list of eligible schools eventually shrank to 261 winners – 136 middle schools and 125 high schools.

Over the years, a total of 38 LBUSD schools have earned Distinguished School recognition. Both CAMS and Hill are repeat winners.

Hamilton's Welch-Kitchen Wins National Honor

Hamilton Middle School's Racquel Welch-Kitchen was one of 25 teachers to be honored with the 2009 MetLife Foundation Ambassadors in Education Award.

This recognition, presented by the National Civic League, highlights teacher leadership in building bridges between local schools and communities. It comes with a \$5,000 grant for each recipient's school.

Welch-Kitchen was selected in part for launching the Career and Leadership program at Hamilton, a semester-long class in which students investigate careers, go on field trips to local government agencies, engage in leadership development activities, and use technology to participate in virtual job shadowing.

Additionally, Welch-Kitchen was recognized for facilitating community meetings and collaborating with nonprofit groups.

Principal David Downing noted that, through all of these efforts, Welch-Kitchen has helped students "increase their involvement in the community."

The Ambassadors in Education Award was established in 2003 to address the gap between public schools and their local areas. It is intended to honor educators whose influence (Continued on next page)
