Geneva Smith, a QUEST (gifted program) senior, will attend Columbia University in New York on a full scholar-

ship. She came to Millikan from Cubberley K-8 School, and has made a name for herself through her academic excellence, varsity volleyball, California Scholarship Federation, and Best Buddies. Her GPA is a weighted 3.96, and she will have completed nine Advanced Placement (AP) classes upon graduation.

Maintaining a high GPA while taking such rigorous courses is even more remarkable in that Geneva holds three jobs and volunteers for the Special Olympics. But the most remarkable fact about Geneva's success is that it has been accomplished despite childhood obstacles which may have derailed others.

Geneva was born into foster care. Her biological mother was incarcerated during her pregnancy and was temporarily released for Geneva's birth. Geneva never knew her father. Fortunately, she acquired Stacey Smith as a foster care provider, and later as her adoptive mother, to guide her and provide her with an environment which was supportive and nurturing.

State Crisis Prompts \$33M in Cuts Here

In light of California's ongoing and steep reductions in education funding, the Long Beach Unified School District Board of Education recently approved an estimated \$32.6 million in budget cuts. The school district faces major budget deficits requiring about \$80 million in cuts for fiscal years 2010-11 and 2011-12 combined.

The latest round of cuts could affect more than 280 teaching positions and 170 management positions, as well as some support staff. The school district does not yet know exactly which positions will be affected but is developing recommendations to be acted upon by the school board in the coming weeks.

California Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell recently praised the Long Beach Unified School District's use of student performance data to improve instruction. O'Connell delivered his 7th annual State of Education Address to educators, policymakers, students and parents.

"Let me give you one great example of using data to improve instruction," O'Connell said.

"About 16 years ago, the Long Beach Unified School District began a teacher-driven project aimed at collecting assessment data in order to better understand ways to keep students in school. and as teachers began to find this data more and more useful, the system evolved into a local longitudinal data system.

"In one instance, the data highlighted exceptional results in student performance in math at one particular school. It turns out that one math instructor, named Si Swun designed his own standards-aligned math curriculum, called MAP2D (Math Achievement Program), which was making headway with students. Based on these results, the school expanded this same curriculum to other classes.

"Eventually, based on the data coming from this school, the district expanded this curriculum even further, to other schools, and (Continued on next page)

(Continued from first page) "I've had to overcome a lot to be where I am," said Geneva, who received therapy to learn to cope with her traumatized childhood while learning to move on with her life. Now a senior, Geneva feels "well adjusted" and able to successfully move across the country to attend such a prestigious Ivy League university.

Geneva plans to focus on environmental chemistry and history as her majors with hopes of becoming an environmental lobbyist. She also has an interest in the fashion industry, feeling that it offers a creative outlet which can draw on and reflect culture while allowing her to use her mind.

She credits her QUEST teachers for inspiring her and guiding her along her path to success. In particular, she credits Tim Mulvehill, her former AP World History teacher, for helping her conquer her challenges. According to Geneva, Mr. Mulvehill has always offered great moral support and was an inspiration through his "great passion for his subject."

She has tied in her environmental interests with her QUEST senior project. She is constructing a tandem bicycle as an alternative form of transportation not requiring fuel.

Geneva said, "I'll miss being a Ram, my neighborhood, and Long Beach" and undoubtedly Stacey Smith, who changed her life and guided her to become a top scholarship winner.

(Continued from first page) began to assist Mr. Swun in the production of materials for the curriculum. As the district began a pilot program for the curriculum in more of its schools, it designated Mr. Swun to coach others on teaching the curriculum.

"The pilot schools performed exceptionally well. In fact, these schools experienced a oneyear, 24-point gain in their API scores due to fifth grade math proficiency. Long Beach had such great results that they expanded the math program districtwide.

"Then other districts heard about it and it spread to Fresno, Compton, Garden Grove, Lennox and Oakland. Today, thousands of students are in the MAP2D program, making real gains in proficiency. All because of one teacher innovating in his classroom a data system able to identify his success, and thanks to a culture of continuous improvement."

STAR Elementary Schools Celebrate Gains

The Board of Education recently recognized 12 elementary schools with STAR Awards for significant gains in student achievement.

This year's winners are Addams, Bixby, Bryant, Burroughs, Emerson, Henry, King, Lafayette, Longfellow, Lowell, Naples and Whittier elementary schools.

The STAR schools succeeded despite significant budget cuts, said Jill Baker, assistant superintendent for elementary schools.

"These schools represent communities where everyone came together to use what resources they had to the greatest degree possible," Baker said.

Students, staff and parents from the winning schools participated in the awards ceremony at the board meeting.

Schools can follow one of two paths to win the STAR Award (Student Success + Terrific Teaching = Academic Results).

Path one includes a state Academic Performance Index (API) of 850 to 950 on a

Furloughs in O.C.

Teachers and support staff in nearby school districts are agreeing to unpaid furlough days as California's public schools struggle to make ends meet.

In the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District, teachers agreed to take off four unpaid furlough days to save about \$6 million. About 96 percent of teachers in the Orange County district voted to approve the furloughs as part of their contract, which the school board OK'd last month, according to *The Orange County Register*.

The Orange Unified School District meanwhile approved five unpaid days off for classified school employees, or support staff, *The Register* also reported.
