Assistant U.S. Secretary Visits Jordan High

Jordan High School hosted a recent visit by a senior staff member from the U.S. Department of Education, who toured two career academies that are being used as models for a national project.

Brenda Dann-Messier, assistant secretary for vocational and adult education, visited Jordan's Aspirations in Medical Services (AIMS) and Architecture, Construction and Engineering (ACE) academies.

Dann-Messier, nominated by President Barack Obama in 2009, leads the Education Department's career and technical education efforts. She oversees 11 grant programs totaling over \$1 billion annually and is seeking legislative approval for an additional \$1 billion in funding for high school career academies like AIMS and ACE.

AIMS and ACE are California Partnership Academies, which are being used as the model for a new national academies project. AIMS was funded in 1990 and is one of the original 49 academies approved as a partnership academy. The medical academy is one of eight Lighthouse Academies in the state whose purpose is to mentor new academies in California. ACE opened in 2007 and is supported by Long Beach Mayor Bob Foster, the school district and multiple industry and community partners. Joining Dann-Messier, was Jerry Winthrop,

Joining Dann-Messier, was Jerry Winthrop, who oversees California Partnership Academies at the California Department of Education. Lead Teachers Sabrina Arney and Melissa Brookman gathered a panel of representatives from the mayor's office, Long Beach City College and Cal State Long Beach.

Dann-Messier concluded her visit by encouraging students to pursue their dreams with determination and hard work, and she heard positive feedback from students about Jordan's academies.

"I am so happy I enrolled in AIMS," said Jordan junior Joseph Apodaca. "I knew my life needed to take a different direction after middle school, and AIMS led me down the right path."

College Prep Group Honors Hudson Teacher

Hudson K-8 School teacher Heather Mills recently earned a research award from the International Baccalau-

reate (IB) college preparation system.

Mills is the first person in the United States to receive this award, which comes with \$700 to help her complete her doctoral research. She will study the impact of U.S. educational policy on the implementation of the rigorous IB Primary Years Program.

The International Baccalaureate Organiza-

tion was established in the 1960s to provide curriculum for children of ambassadors worldwide so they might receive uniform, highquality preparation for college. IB has since grown and has been offered at selected public and private schools in 140 countries.

Long Beach first began offering IB in 1992 at Jordan High School, where students can earn the International Diploma, a designation that is recognized by the world's leading universities. Hudson began offering IB in 2008. Lindsey Academy (grades 6-8) earned the designation in 2010, and Dooley Elementary School earned the IB designation in 2011.

The recent award is part of IB's efforts to support independent, school-based research to better inform the IB community.

Senior U.S. Official Praises Long Beach

Greg Darnieder, the U.S. Secretary of Education's senior advisor on college access, praised local schools during Long Beach's recent State of Education event, saying that education reform efforts here are "10 to 12 years ahead of almost every community in America."

Darnieder addressed more than 200 business, community and higher education officials, many of whom had just spent the day shadowing local school principals as part of the Long Beach Unified School District's annual Principal for a Day event. The event is the largest single-day involvement of local businesses in Long Beach public schools.

"It was fabulous, unbelievable what I saw this morning – just absolutely incredible," Darnieder said.

He said LBUSD has made systemic changes, through collaboration with teachers, parents and the community under the guidance of leadership that is genuine and trusted. Such leadership is a hallmark of successful school systems, he said, "and it's happening here. I just want to commend all of you for what you've been able to develop here over the past 15, 18 years."

Steinhauser, Long Beach City College President Eloy Ortiz Oakley, Cal State Long Beach Provost Don Para, Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce President Randy Gordon, and Tricor Co-Founder Damon Dunn.

While college access has improved locally in recent years, K-12 and higher education officials here warned of dire consequences for schools, including unprecedented cuts to student services, if California voters next week reject tax initiatives that would provide revenue for public education.

Credential Current?

All certificated employees are required to keep their credentials and permits current at all times. The State of California does not allow a single minute of service for employees who do not possess a valid credential or permit. If employees allow a credential or permit to expire, or if they do not provide the state with evidence of meeting renewal requirements, they cannot remain in paid status in any California public school district.

The Commission on Teacher Credentialing requires all clear and professional credential holders to renew their credentials online. The online renewal process requires payment by VISA or MasterCard. The renewal web page is https://teachercred.ctc.ca.gov/teachers/ RenewableSearchProxy.

The \$60 renewal fee increased to \$70 as of July 1, 2012. The renewal process may be completed as early as one-year in advance of the credential expiration date.
