Prop. 30 Passed by Wider Margin Here

Long Beach voters passed Proposition 30 by a wider margin than both the state and Los Angeles County, approving temporary taxes to reduce the severity of budget cuts in schools.

"Voters have sent a clear message that California must stop the drastic cuts to our public schools," Long Beach Unified School District Superintendent Christopher J. Steinhauser said.

LBUSD still must trim \$20 million this year, but had Prop. 30 failed, the school district would have faced a \$35 million annual reduction in funding.

In Long Beach, 60.4 percent of voters

favored Prop. 30, surpassing both the 53.9 percent passage rate statewide and the 59.9 percent passage rate in Los Angeles County. The communities of Avalon and Signal Hill - which are served by LBUSD - also approved Prop. 30, though they did so by smaller margins than Long Beach. The tax measure fell just shy of a majority in Lakewood, where portions of the city are served by LBUSD.

The passage of Prop. 30 means the school district won't face worst-case-scenario cuts such as a one-month reduction in the school year or the elimination of entire programs like high school sports and elementary music.

Preschoolers Make Great Gains in Reading

Four preschool sites at the Long Beach Unified School District Child Development Centers continue to see remarkable results as they implement a \$3.5 million federal Early Reading First grant.

Research shows that good preschools improve children's performance later in school and life perhaps more than any other educational intervention. The CDCs began implementing the grant three years ago to support students' literacy.

LBUSD recently received data comparing the results of Early Reading First programs across the nation. The results show that Long Beach preschoolers outperformed the national average by 22 percent on gains in vocabulary and letter knowledge, both key indicators of a students' future success in school.

Last school year, Early Reading First preschooler participants completed their kindergarten year in LBUSD with 88 percent of them reading at or above grade level on the school district's Benchmark Book Assessments, compared to 77 percent for the rest of the district. Early Reading First students completing first grade also are more likely to continue reading at or above grade level compared to their counterparts in the rest of the district.

The reading grant serves LBUSD's statesubsidized preschools for low-income families, providing four years of intensive, researchbased professional development and coaching for teachers, plus family literacy activities.

CDCs serve students at 20 locations. Last

year the CDCs began training the rest of their teachers on the use of these effective instructional strategies to increase the academic achievement of their more than 1,000 at risk preschoolers. The training continues this year.

Long Beach Rotary contributes to the early literacy effort. The service club has donated thousands of books to the CDCs, beefing up classroom libraries and giving each child a book of their own to keep.

College Board Lists LBUSD on Honor Roll

The Long Beach Unified School District is among 539 school districts in the United States and Canada recognized this week by the College Board with a spot on the Annual AP Honor Roll.

The honor recognizes efforts to open Advanced Placement college preparatory classrooms to a significantly broader pool of students while maintaining or improving the percentage of students earning scores of 3 or higher (out of 5).

TALB Membership Voting on Agreement


The membership of the Teachers Association of Long Beach has scheduled a ratification vote on a tentative agreement for this Thursday and Friday, Nov. 15 and 16 at schools.

The tentative deal between TALB and the Long Beach Unified School District was reached Nov. 1 after more than 20 months of negotiations. Upon ratification by TALB's membership, the agreement will be considered for final approval by the Board of Education as soon as Nov. 20.

The tentative agreement includes changes to health plans. The school board at its Nov. 20 meeting may consider similar health plan changes affecting non-represented employees.

(Continued from first page) 539 districts, who are fostering rigorous work worth doing. These educators have not only expanded student access to AP course work, but they have enabled more of their students to achieve on a college level – which is helping to create a strong college-going culture," said College Board President David Coleman.

Improvement in AP results takes sustained effort, so the College Board examined AP data for students who took the exams in May of 2010, 2011 and 2012.

Honor roll criteria include at least a 4 percent increase in AP participation in large districts, 6 percent in medium districts and 11 percent in small districts. In addition, the College Board monitors AP participation by students of color.

To be honored, a school district's performance levels also must be maintained or improved when comparing the percentage of exams in 2012 with a score of 3 or higher to those in 2010, or the school has already attained a performance level in which more than 70 percent of the AP students score a 3 or higher.

As part of its Academic and Career Success Initiative, LBUSD has made a concerted effort in recent years to boost participation in AP courses. Last year, 5,062 students took one or more AP courses here, nearly double the number in 2003. Over the same period, students of all ethnicities saw significant increases in AP course enrollment. Meanwhile pass rates on AP exams have now increased to 55 percent, up 5 percent over the prior year.

"There has been a great victory among educators who have believed that a more diverse population could indeed succeed in AP courses," said Trevor Packer, the College Board's senior vice president of the Advanced Placement Program. "In 2012, AP scores were higher than they'd been since 2004, when one million fewer students were being given access. These outcomes are a powerful testament to educators' belief that many more students were indeed ready and waiting for the sort of rigor that would prepare them for what they would encounter in college."

Parents especially appreciate AP courses because their children can earn college credit while still in high school, saving thousands of dollars in tuition. Many LBUSD students earn an entire year of college credit before leaving high school.

Open Enrollment

Open enrollment, which continues through Nov. 30, is an opportunity for employees to change health benefits, add or remove dependents to plans, and enroll in a flexible spending account.


This classified staff development event is subject to manager/supervisor approval for release time, and participants must be permanent classified employees.
